# Ladies make history CHS girls make first trip to regional tourney in 50 years

The 2012 Lady Bronco team made history and gained valuable experience this season when they earned a trip to the Regional Tournament held last weekend in Levelland at South Plains College. The final score of 28-52 was not indicative of the Lady Broncos' season and despite the loss to the Sudan Nettes, the ladies have a lot to be proud of and will be strong again next season. The Lady Broncos got off to a great start with Sudan (who eventually won the Regional tournament over Panhandle) in the game Friday night with an impressive intensity in the first half of the game. Just before the buzzer to end the first half, the Nettes went on a scoring run that gave them the 16-7 lead at the break. They played hard against Sudan and stayed determined throughout, but their shooting went cold in the second half allowing Sudan to grab the momentum and the win. "From the beginning of the game, I just felt that we could not get in rhythm offensively, or defensively," head coach Molly Weatherred said. "We gave up offensive rebounds that allowed them to get some easy points and we were not able to score. We could not get the shots to fall and we stopped being aggressive towards the basket." Despite the loss, Weatherred spoke of her adoration for the team. "I am very proud of this team and group of girls," she said. "They have worked extremely hard and gave it a good run."



## Deadline nears for candidates

Potential candidates have until next Monday, March 5, to throw their hats in the ring for any of seven local boards scheduled to have elections this spring.

Those with openings include for the cities of Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardwick; Clarendon and Hedley schools; Clarendon College, and the Donley County Hospital District. The Clarendon College District has all three of its incumbents running for reelection. Jerry Woodard, Delbert Robertson, and Doug Lowe are all seeking to serve another sixyear term on the Board of Regents; and Tex Selvidge is running to continue to serve the remainder of the unexpired term belonging to the late Charles Deyhle, Sr. Four years are remaining on that term. The Donley County Hospital District has four two-year terms expiring on its Board of Directors this year. Those seats are currently held by Jan Farris (Place 4), Jeannie Owens (Place 5), Mark C. White (Place 6), and Laurie Howard (Place 7), and all incumbents are running again. The City of Clarendon has three two-year terms on the Board of Aldermen up for election this year. Incumbents are Ann Huey (serving the unexpired term of Kyle Davis), Jesus Hernandez (serving the unexpired term of Jeremy Powell), and Will Thompson. At press time, Hernandez and Thompson were the only candidates signed up.

Those seats are held by Lana Ritchie and Bobby Lindsey, filling the term originally held by Shelby Shipp. As of Tuesday, challengers Michael Metcalf, Sr., and Dee Smith had signed up for the election. Election Day will be Saturday, May 12.



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

Church of God in Christ in Harlem. Joined by a contingent of fellow Democrat politicians, Clinton reminded congregants why they were there:

Now, we all know why we're here .... But I want to talk to you about the people that aren't in this church tonight ... but they could vote. And they need to vote, and they need to know why they're voting. And that's really why you're here, because of all the people who aren't here. Isn't that right? ...

So what you have to think about tonight is, what is it you intend to do between now and Tuesday, and on Tuesday, to get as many people there as possible and to make sure when they get to the polls, they know why they're there, what the stakes are, and what the consequences are.... If you've got any friends across the river in New Jersey or anyplace else, I want you to reach them between now and Tuesday, because this is a razor-thin election.

Speaking to the Alfred Baptist Church in Alexandria, Virginia, Bill Clinton employed Scripture as justification to head to the polls: "The Scripture says, 'While we have time, let us do good unto all men.' And a week from Tuesday, it will be time for us to vote."

Clinton was joined at the Alexandria church by a prominent collection of Democrats. That talk came on October 29, 2000, at 12:40 p.m. Three hours earlier, at 9:40 a.m., he squeezed in another campaign talk to the congregation of the Shiloh Baptist Church in Washington, D.C. There, Clinton pitched various federal legislation and blasted Republican-proposed tax cuts before urging worshipers to go vote.

When Scripture was mentioned at these churches, it was for political purposes. It was a total infusion of church and state. And why not? shrugged Clinton. As he told a congregation in Newark, he and fellow Democrats were doing the Lord's work: "God's work must be our own." Overall, Bill Clinton spoke in churches 21 times as president, over half of which came in election years. For the record, his wife did 27 churches in just two months in 2000. The hypocrisy of the press on this issue is staggering. All a Republican needs to do is mention God and secular liberals go wild. Meanwhile, liberal Democrats can say anything they want about God - even while blatantly campaigning in churches - and their media allies will not utter a peep of protest.




# **Chamber making changes**

The Chamber of Commerce announced several changes to the organization during its first quarterly "Business After Hours" social hour last Friday, February 24, at Clarendon City Hall.



Campbell said the organization is formally changing its name back to the "Clarendon Chamber of Commerce" and dropping the "Clarendon-Donley County Chamber" name.



## **Desirable Benefit of Smoking Cessation Medicine**



According to the results of a study to be published in an upcoming issue of Alcoholism: Clinical & Experimental Research, a medicine used to help smokers quit may have a desirable but unexpected benefit of helping people who consume too much alcohol. The medicine is called varenicline (Chantix). It was first approved in the U.S. in 2006 for the treatment of nicotine dependence among those who smoke. Researchers assessed study participants in 3 sessions during which each participant was evaluated following administration of varenicline and a high or low dose or alcohol. They found that varenicline increased the unpleasant effects of alcohol and created displeasure over drinking it. More research is needed to confirm this finding.
