

Amarillo crash kills local lady

A 77-year-old Greenbelt Lake woman died in Amarillo Saturday as a result of injuries from a crash on Interstate 40, police said.

Merlene Hooker Scott died after a car struck her SUV, which rolled over at least twice down the embankment and onto the access road, police said.

About 6 p.m., a blue Pontiac G6, driven by 18-year-old Edwin Ortiz, and a maroon car with an unknown driver were racing while westbound on I-40, witnesses told police. Ortiz struck Scott's Chevrolet Suburban on the passenger side, said Traffic Investigations Sgt. Warren Gross.

Scott was driving in the rightmost lane when the accident happened, he said.

Scott was knocked off the interstate and landed on the access road near the 1600 block of South Bowie Street, police said.

Anthony Farley, who lives nearby, said he heard tires squealing and a loud bang before he rushed outdoors.

Farley saw the SUV roll down the embankment before coming to rest on its tires, he said. He said he saw Scott hit her head several times on the half-open window.

When the car came to rest, he and other witnesses rushed to her side, Farley, 34, said.

Kelly Barnes, 37, who lives in the same home, said she ran to grab her phone and call 911.

Farley climbed in through the back window while other witnesses pried open the driver's door, he said. They managed to pull Scott out of the SUV, and a nurse administered CPR until emergency responders arrived, he said.

Ambulances dashed Scott to a local hospital, where she died, Gross said. An autopsy is scheduled in Lubbock on Monday, he said.

Field officers later found Ortiz on West 16th Avenue and South Lamar Street after dispatchers called out the car's description, Gross said.



Truth about Postal Reform

Now that US Senate has passed a bill, S 1789, to reform the ailing US Postal Service, critics are trying to disable the bill on its way to the House of Representatives. Business Week recently catalogued unhappy stakeholders, including postal unions, postal management and some Republicans who wrongly think the bill burdens taxpayers.

Rep. Darrell Issa, R-CA, whose own bill awaits action in the House; blasted "special interests." But Business Week says, "Considering how many people are unhappy with the bill, it isn't clear which special interests Issa is referring to." Some see Senate bill as the inevitable product of the sausage machine. But it is neither a budget buster nor processed meat. It is the expression of a better vision of the Postal Service. If you consider that survival of the service means maintaining the circulatory system for a \$1.1 trillion mailing industry - or in other words, making sure cash, greeting cards, packages and newspapers and magazines arrive on time, the Senate bill is good medicine. Consider some of the alternative fixes. Issa's bill would let USPS immediately end Saturday mail, close half the mail processing centers and thousands of post offices, and put a new board of political appointees in charge. The new board would be expected to trim workers' benefits and maybe wages, and direct the Postmaster General to favor profit over service. At the other extreme might be Sen. Bernie Sanders, I-VT, who wanted to keep everything open. Labor unions backing him say that USPS will heal as the economy heals. Then there is the White House's notion: to raise postage rates. For Sens. Susan Collins, R-ME, and Joe Lieberman, I-CT, neither extreme is suited to long-term survival of USPS. To many experts, Issa's approach is likely to frighten away businesses that mail. The Lieberman-Collins bill agrees that USPS needs a more flexible, less costly workforce. It keeps mail flowing through today's network while cost-cutting is underway. For example, they would end Saturday mail delivery in two years, but only if USPS has taken other big steps toward financial viability. They would allow the closing of postal plants now, if USPS takes preserves local mail delivery speed. Is their bill the product of compromise, or of a different vision?

Very little in government is done because Democrats and Republicans hate each other so voraciously that they seem more intent on destroying each other than doing what is best for America. It's like their heads have exploded and they mindlessly spew forth vitriol at each other. Fanatical devotion to ideological purity has consumed any hope of rational thought. The art of compromise has been replaced by zero-sum ideological pettiness.

· Many Americans say they wouldn't miss Saturday mail. But USPS builds its system around senders, not receivers. Who would be hurt by a 5-day delivery regime? Anyone who depends on timely mail delivery. Shutting down the system two days a week-three when Monday holidays occur-would create delay, according to the Postal Regulatory Commission. Then there are those who need prescriptions delivered when they are at home; small-town citizens who get the newspaper by mail and businesses needing 6-day cash flows.

• Closing small post offices seems a no-brainer to city dwellers who spot those one-room POs at the roadside on the way to the beach. Surely not all are needed. But rather than closing them entirely, USPS could have circuit-rider postmasters to open them a few hours a day. That is affordable if worker benefits are brought into line with the private sector. For those communities, a circuit rider could continue their links to the world.

• The Congressional Budget Office says the Senate bill would cost \$33.6 billion, adding to the federal deficit. But postagepayers, not taxpayers, carry that burden. Taxpayers face a liability as the funder-oflast resort only if postage revenues dry up - which is more likely to happen if the mail slows to a crawl.

Finally, members of Congress may differ on how they see USPS. Is it a corporation? Is it a government agency responsible for binding the nation together?

Fact: it is a Government-Sponsored Enterprise or GSE, more like Fannie Mae than like IBM or the Defense Department. It has to use business tools, but carry out a public mission. And it has enormous power in the marketplace. Consider, for example, its new Every Door Direct Mail program, which directly competes with many private businesses. Members of Congress who mistakenly see postal reform as an exercise in deregulating a company may actually unleash a powerful federal agency, while those who look to raising postage so generous worker benefits can continue could pull the plug on the economic engine that keeps jobs alive. It isn't compromise that is needed, but a cleareyed vision based on a full understanding of the needs of all who the Postal Service serves. Postal management today has an impossible task, expected to accomplish business goals without the cost-controlling tools businesses have, and expected to achieve government ends without federal support. Congress owns this confusion. Only Congress can fix it and it will continue to need to fine-tune its solutions as communications cultures change. No bill passed today will avoid the need for legislation in the future. Neither "deregulating" it nor hiking rates will get USPS to stability. Nor will abrupt and disruptive approaches to labor costs. Senators Collins and Lieberman, along with cosponsors Tom Carper, D-DE, and Scott Brown, R-MA, have devoted endless hours to understanding the challenge and to crafting the next steps toward fixing it. . Their approach deserves considerably more respect than it is getting.

In the book of Joshua you have the recording of the great things that general tion was able to do because of their faith Then in the book of Judges, chapter two and following, you have the recording of their one great failure; they did not pass the importance of that heritage on to the next generation. Our heritage will only last as long as we retell it. Our heritage is only as important as we make it.

4. Thirty or so years ago the generation before mine would have done this without any hesitation. Some say we now live in different times. I ask, "Why are these different times?" They are different because we have allowed our heritage to slip away or be removed from remembrance. We no longer stress the importance of our spiritual heritage to our children and, indeed, they have become different times. The challenge to this generation is; are we going to stand up and reaffirm our heritage or sit down in silence and have the testimonial of our heritance relegated to some out of the way place, if at all?

Conference to focus on livestock and wildlife integration

AMARILLO - Cattle and deer can roam together on the ranch in a profitable operation if managed properly, according to Brandon Boughen, Texas AgriLife Extension Service agent for Potter County.

Boughen and the LX Ranch north of Amarillo will host a tour on June 2 to help interested producers learn more about livestock/wildlife management. The tour will feature Ken Cearley, AgriLife Extension wildlife specialist in Amarillo, who will address the integration of livestock and wildlife production with an emphasis on economic sustainability and good land stewardship. On-site registration will be held from 7:30-8 a.m. at the main entrance to LX Ranch, 13 miles north of Amarillo on the east side of U.S. Highway 87/287. Attendees should pull on to the LX Ranch and not stop on the highway, Boughen said. Online preregistration is required on or before May 30 at http://potter.agrilife.org/forms/. The registration fee of \$10 per person should be made payable to Potter Agriculture Committee and sent to AgriLife Extension, 3301 E. 10th Ave., Amarillo, Texas 79104. Topics to be covered during the three-hour program will include: quail habitat ergonomics/habitat evaluation; plants important to deer and quail; drought management of rangeland plants, livestock and wildlife; dietary competition versus dietary overlap; supplemental feeding and predator management. The tour will begin at the main gate and consist of four or five stops along the main road, he said. Fourwheel drive vehicles are recommended because of the sandy road conditions.

Chronic Migraine Sufferers: Botox May Help The FDA recently approved the use of Botox Injection (onabotulinumtoxinA) for the prevention of chronic migraines. Typically a physician administers Botox every 12 weeks by injecting multiple areas around the head and neck in order to dull the symptoms of future headaches. The effects of the injections are said to last up to 3 months. This novel indication for Botox gives individuals who experience chronic migraines a new preventative option from which they might benefit without the burden of taking daily medications. Medication overuse is a common concern in chronic migraine sufferers and can even complicate headaches. Stopping these medications and treating the withdrawal symptoms with alternatives may be helpful. Following physician directions regarding medication is imperative. About 3.2 million people in the U.S. are thought to suffer from chronic migraines. People with chronic migraines experience them during most days of the month (15 days or more) for four hours a day or longer. The pain is often accompanied by nausea, sensitivity to light or sound, and sometimes vomiting.
