Voters in the Hedley Independent School District Saturday chose Dana Bell and Mark Howard to be the newest members of the Board of Trustees there.

The two men bested a field of six candidates for the two open positions on the board. The seats are currently held by Lana Ritchie and Bobby Lindsey, but they chose not to seek re-election.

Eighty-one people cast ballots in the election, and complete results are as follows: Dana Bell 69, Mark Howard 32, Donnie Chambless 22, Connie Wheatly 17, Michael Metcalf, Sr. 12, and Dee Smith 4.

County allows marker

Donley County officially gave its approval for a Ten Commandments marker to be placed on the Courthouse Square during the regular session of the Commissioners Court Monday.

Commissioners voted 4-0-1 to allow the marker with County Judge Jack Hall and Commissioners Andy Wheatly, Donnie Hall, and Mark White in favor of the measure, and Commissioner Dan Sawyer abstain-

County officials and supporters of the marker both expressed surprise at a lack of public enthusiasm for the project, with commissioners saying they had been contacted by only 20 or fewer people. Most of those contacts were supportive of the project, but some were opposed to it

Earl Shields, Don Hillis, Guy Ellis, and Shawn O'Keefe spoke in favor of the marker, and Roger Estlack spoke in opposition to it.

Supporters of the marker say it will be a historical monument that, in addition to the Ten Commandments, will have quotes from the nation's Founding Fathers and will also address the history of Donley County and Clarendon and specifically the role of faith in the establishment of this community.

. Shields said he felt like the marker was important in order "to show the principles that we stand on" and he noted that the rules were good enough for the children of Israel and that Clarendon was founded by a preacher.

Ellis said the marker was important to him personally and that the Ten Commandments were "the basis for our law and our morals."

Hillis said the marker will be "a blessing" and said that it was going to be a historical and not a religious monument.

O'Keefe said he wanted something to show kids that the community does not agree with the policies of Barack Obama, particularly the president's stance on same-sex marпаде.

Estlack said he was opposed to the placement of any new markers on the Courthouse Square, urged commissioners to maintain their prior action to that effect, and reminded them that the Courthouse represents all the people of Donley County and that not everyone was in favor of the proposal.

All five citizens and the commissioners were given ample time to voice their opinions about the marker, and the vote on the matter came only after everyone had a chance to say all they wanted.

With the commissioners' approval, supporters of the marker will now present their detailed plans, specifications, and proposed locations for the marker to the county, which will submit that information to the Texas Historical Commission.

The THC will then take all the information into consideration and approve a final location for the marker.

Judge Hall told supporters of the marker that the state would not allow any marker or construction to be placed anywhere on the square that would detract from the view of the courthouse, which was restored largely with state funds.



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City must deliver on new streets

Without much fanfare or enthusiasm, the citizens of Clarendon gave the go ahead for the city to issue

\$700,000 in bonds to do some street work. The 12 percent turnout was not impressive, but

having a 58.8 percent approval was a solid majority. A total of 135 people took the time to go the polls on the issue. Seventy-nine of them can take partial credit if the project is a success; 56 of them can say "I told you so" if it flops; and 934 other eligible voters have no right to complain no matter what.

The apathy surrounding this issue was what was interesting. No one was actively pushing for the bonds, and there wasn't a lot of vocal opposition to them either. The matter generated no letters to the editor, two comments on the Enterprise's Facebook page, and 31 responses to an online poll on ClarendonLive.com.

It is interesting to point out, however, that the ClarendonLive.com poll accurately predicted Saturday's election results. The poll showed 56 percent of respondents in favor of the bonds.

The opinion of your humble editor even vacillated in the days before the election before finally deciding to support the measure. The reason for that support was simple: We made some progress in 2004, and we're used to financially supporting that bond payment, so let's keep moving forward.

With the election behind us, the city must now move forward to be good stewards of the trust that a majority of voting citizens have imparted to them. Screw this up, and it will be a long time before Clarendon supports another project of any kind coming from City Hall.

Of the two comments we received on Facebook, one said "\$700,000 won't touch the street problem," which is an excellent point - but it is a start; and another said, "I have no confidence in our city officials at this time," which likely sums up the feelings of many citizens and possibly 88 percent of possible voters.


The biggest problem with City Hall's street project is that it includes seal coating two streets on the college campus, work that the city estimates will cost \$50,000. Those streets are the responsibility of the Clarendon College District. Now that city voters have approved the bonds, the city should approach the college regents in the spirit of cooperation and ask them to come up with at least half the money to do those streets. If the college can't or won't do this, then the city needs to spend its money elsewhere.

City Administrator Lambert Little is on the agenda for the Board of Regents meeting this week, there to ask for an easement to allow the city to spend its funds on college property. Little really needs to ask for some money while he is there. Understandably, given Clarendon's track record, the regents may not want the city getting its hands on the streets at the college. But the regents bear some responsibility for not getting their streets sealed, and they are now showing signs of deterioration. The college has an \$8.9 million budget. If they can't find \$25,000 in there to help out, then they might need to consider their own bond elec-

Besides that, most of the streets Mr. Little has selected need to be worked on. Certainly those that bound three sides of Broncho Stadium are highly traveled and visible to by both locals and visitors, and the same can be said for Sixth Street at the ballparks.

The citizens have spoken, they have given the city fathers some slack to get something done, and hopefully they won't hang themselves with it. We have to keep moving forward, but we also need to hold our city officials and employees responsible for how these streets turn out and how they are maintained. There can be no more half-ass jobs. There can be no more shoddy workmanship, poor patching, and generally sloppiness.

It is time for progress, and it is time that we demand results from City Hall.



Evangelicals, Republicans and Mitt

The Republican Party is often referred to as "the party of Lincoln." The GOP began as a political movement dedicated to the abolition of slavery and to preventing the destruction of the Union by wayward Southerners. A less well-known characteristic of the GOP's early years was its grounding in evangelical Christianity of the Second Great Awakening.

Now, not all Republicans, were evangelicals, nor were all evangelicals Republicans. However, many of its supporters brought a religious zeal to the political issues of the time, including immigration and the extension of slavery into the western territories. A similar zeal is present today.

The Republican position on political issues resulted, largely, from their belief that America was God's Chosen Nation and before His blessing could be cast upon the people, the nation must be cleansed of its sins. That cleansing was the American Civil War.

The initial national Republican convention was held in Philadelphia in July 1856. It was a period of great strife and confrontation on the issue of slavery and increasing concern about immigration, often resulting in violent clashes between Protestants and Catholics in the burgeoning cities.

One of the attendees described the convention as "a Methodist conference rather than a political convention". Another participant characterized the party platform as "God's revealed Word." The convention delegates drafted a platform condemning the "twin relics of barbarism" - slavery and polygamy. Contrasting with today's national movement to legalize same sex marriages, there was no pending national epidemic of people choosing multiple marriage partners. "Polygamy" was a code word for "Mormon," another scorned religious group in the GOP's list of banned faiths.

The Mormons of the day possessed many irksome characteristics. Most Mormon converts were from Britain, both greater and lesser like the Irish. Anyone who

And they weren't shy in their efforts to point out the correctness of Mormonism and the incorrectness of the other Christian faiths. Evangelicals and other more serious minded Christians did not take kindly to their admonitions.

Most irksome was their propensities to romance, then convert, then marry; or, convert then romance, then marry fetching young women - regardless if they were single, betrothed, or married. Naturally, the men folk looked askance upon such behavior. In the back woods of Arkansas, an enraged husband, who took exception to Parley Pratt's attentions towards his wife, proceeded to dispatch Parley, who was Mitt Romney's great or great-great grandfather.

So, the people complained to their leaders in Washington. Things got so bad that the president sent an invading army to Utah in order to set things right by occupying the Utah Territory and arresting Brigham and the boys for their uncivilized behavior. The timely intervention of an influential Army Colonel, who had befriended the Mormons, was the only thing that prevented Brigham's

arrest and the subsequent occupation of Salt Lake City.

While the Republicans did not invent evangelical politics, they were, however, the most successful political organization to merge faith and policy. With Abraham Lincoln (who denounced religious bigotry and polygamy) as its standard-bearer in the 1860 presidential election, Republican rallies exuded an evangelical fervor that blended religious and military pageantry.

In 1856, the Republican Party platform included planks that were against expanding slavery into the western territories; Catholic (Irish) immigration, legal or otherwise; an expanded view of the definition of marriage (Mormon polygamy); and an unwillingness to compromise its core principles.

Not much has changed. In 2012, the Republican Party includes planks that disavow illegal immigration (mostly from Catholic Mexico and the Americas), an expanded view of the definition of marriage (same-sex marriage), and an unwillingness to compromise its core principles.

Even though the Republican Party's ticket is now lead by a Mormon candidate, many LDS fundamentalists secretly hope that same-sex marriage will gain national acceptance. If this happens, they believe that the expanding definition of marriage will ultimately lead the legalization of plural marriage, the next logical step.

I'm not sure the Republican Party fully understands the LDS Church's teaching that a Mormon leader will someday rise to power and establish a theocracy in which the United States is saved from ruination caused by our falling away from God.

Mitt's nomination is getting really close to that idea. The LDS Church has come a long way in the last 157 years.

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'Tax-mageddon is on the horizon

Unless Congress and President Obama can reach agreement by the end of this year, steeply higher taxes -amounting to about half a trillion dollars annually -- will slam the economy and most taxpayers, starting January 1, 2013. For starters, 25 million middle income taxpayers will be hit for the first time by the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT).

This "Tax-mageddon" looms because the President and the Democrat majority in the Senate have for the past . three years remained insistent on raising taxes. Congressional Republicans have fought to hold the line against higher taxes. But because the disagreement on tax policy so far is not reconciled, approximately one hundred tax cuts are set to expire at the end of this year and a half-dozen new taxes to pay for the Obama health law are set to take effect on January 1. Here is some of what's in

store: · Alternative Minimum Tax. As indicated above, 25 million more middle income taxpayers will be hit in 2013 with an estimated \$118 billion in higher taxes. (Note: the AMT was enacted in 1969 to ensure that a couple of hundred millionaires would pay their "fair share."). For instance, currently the exemptions are \$48,450 for individuals and \$74,450 for married couples filing jointly. If Congress fails to enact relief by the end of this year, the exemptions will return to \$33,750 for individuals and \$45,000 for married couples filing jointly.

· Deduction of state and local taxes. The deductibility expired at the end of 2011. It was put in place with amendments offered by Congressman Kevin Brady and myself. Because Texans aren't saddled with a state income tax, loss of the sales tax deduction will be particularly costly for Texas taxpayers.

· Marriage penalty. I sponsored S. 11, the Marriage Penalty Relief Act of

2011, which addressed the perverse tax penalty on married couples. But the previous income tax penalty on marriage is set

· Child tax credit. The credit will be halved from \$1000 to \$500 for 2013 · Estate taxes. The so-called "death

tax" reverts to a 55 percent rate in January of next year with a \$1 million exemption. Many of America's familyowned small businesses will be hit hard by this tax hike.

 Investment and Job Creation: Capital gains will increase to 20 percent, and dividends will be taxed at ordinary income tax rates. Specifically for those individuals and couples earning more than \$200,000 and \$250,000 respectively, two new healthcare reform surtaxes will force the capital gains and dividends tax rates even higher: capital gains to 23.8 percent and dividends to 43.4 percent. Raising capital gains and dividends tax rates will drain away critical private investment capital that entrepreneurs and startup businesses need to expand their enterprises and create jobs.

Also set to take effect in 2013 are a half-dozen new taxes that were enacted in 2009 to pay for the Obama Health Care Law. These taxes will increase taxes on affected small businesses, drive up costs of medicines and health insurance, and jeopardize job-based health insurance coverage for millions of working Americans and their families. (Note: The Supreme Court is expected to rule on ObamaCare's constitutionality in

June or July.) The risk of inaction on these tax

issues for our economy and our country is enormous. If you're employed, you will pay more in taxes in 2013. If you're unemployed, it will be harder to find a job. If you run a business, it will be harder to stay in business, much less hire more people.

Notwithstanding the truly catastrophic economic consequences, there has been a conspicuous lack of urgency from the President and Congressional Democrats about addressing these tax increases. The strategy at the White House seems to be: (1) do nothing until after the November election; and (2) blame a government shutdown and economic meltdown on Congress if it doesn't approve higher taxes before the end of 2012.

Speaker of the House John Boehner has wisely indicated that the House of Representatives will vote before the November elections to extend all of the current tax rates, credits, and deductions that are set to expire at the end of the year. Waiting until the last minute, as was done in 2010, is not a responsible way to govern. At best, delaying tax policy decisions puts businesses' and families' financial decisions on hold which is also bad for our weak economy.

A simpler, fairer income tax system, based on lower, flatter rates, would turbo-charge economic growth and private sector job creation. The alternative is more of the same turmoil that has pushed the national debt above \$16 trillion and is keeping unemploy-

ment above 8 percent. The right thing to do for our country is to call a truce in the election year political games. But we shouldn't just stop at preventing the end-of-the-year Tax-mageddon. The President and Congress should put comprehensive, progrowth reform of the entire tax code at the top of the legislative agenda for this summer.



Williams jumps to bronze at state contest



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







PROPERTY TAX PROTEST and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

*the market or special appraised value placed on your property;

*the unequal appraisal of your property;

*the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll;

*exemptions that may apply to you; *qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal;

*the taxable status of your property;

*which local governments should be taxing your property;

*the ownership of property;

*the change of use of land receiving special appraisal; *any action taken by the appraisal district that applies to and

adversely affects you.

Informal Review: Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property. The Appraisal Review Board hearings are set for July 3, 2012, at the Donley County Appraisal District office. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board. The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The law provides that before a hear-ing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 307 S. Sully or P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

Tax Payment: You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 307 S. Sully or P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P O Box 13528, Austin, TX 78711-3528.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you. Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information. Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you. If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.
