Producers need to report crop losses

USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Acting Executive Director James B. Douglass, reminds producers to report crop losses resulting from a weatherrelated disaster event within 15 days of the disaster or when the loss first becomes apparent, this includes crops covered by crop insurance, the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and crops without insurance coverage.

"Crop losses are acres that were timely planted with the intent to harvest, but the crop failed and could not be harvested because of a disaster related condition," said Douglass.

Producers who have NAP coverage will be required to report crop losses on an FSA form CCC-576 - "Notice of Loss and Application for Payment Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program."

According to Douglass, it is important that producers file accurate and timely reports before the crop is destroyed to prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

A question of how much government

Theoretically, the elemental political choice in a democratic system is between more government or less - more government control over our lives and livelihood, or less; more government spending and programs than the year before, or less; more government power, or less.

In practice, for as long as I can remember, the choice for Americans has been between the party that wants more government (the Democrats, or the party of Big Government) and the party that still wants more government, but a little bit less more (the Republicans, or the party of Big Government Lite). There never really seems to be a choice between a presidential candidate who unequivocally wants Uncle Sam to spend more money next year and one who wants the federal government to spend less; that is, "less" as in not a smaller increase, not a phantom D.C.-style budget "cut" from baseline projections, but a real, honestto-goodness decrease in the actual number of dollars flying out of the U.S. Treasury.

I thought of this not long ago when I attended a conference and heard some of Ron Paul's supporters wonder how Mitt Romney could appeal to them. Here's a suggestion: Offer them a genuine opportunity to vote for less government.

This proposal might strike some as radical, since it is outside the realm of the experience of living voters, but we face an unprecedented set of conditions today that make such a fundamental change of direction conceivable, though admittedly not likely.

Romney already has proposed cutting numerous federal agencies and programs that waste federal tax dollars more egregiously than your typical run-ofthe-mill federal bureaucracy. Why not attach a dollar figure to his budget cutting? How about campaigning on a nice round number? E.g., "My first annual budget will cap federal spending at \$3 trillion."

I don't know about you, but \$3 trillion for the wasteful, economy-crushing federal leviathan sounds to me like way too much money, but at least it's a step - a significant step - in the right direction.

The case for such a cut is simple: Under President Obama, we have fallen into a fiscal rut of adding at least \$1.2 trillion to the federal debt every year. Does anybody other than an economic illiterate think we can afford such massive floods of red ink? Even if we achieved the ambitious target of cutting federal spending to \$3 trillion a year, we still would have an annual deficit larger than any deficit in history before the panic-induced TARP bailout in 2008-9. If those who are on the conservative side of economic issues think it's "too radical" to propose an annual budget deficit of "only" half a trillion dollars, then perhaps we need to redefine "conservative."

There is another strong point to be made in support of capping the next fiscal year's spending at \$3 trillion: What were the benefits of Obama's quantum increase in federal spending? Did it stimulate the economy? Did it bring us prosperity? What did we get for adding \$5 trillion more debt during these last three years? Is there a Henry Morgenthau (FDR's Treasury Secretary) in the Democrats' ranks today with the candor to admit, as Morgenthau did in 1939, that all the administration's extra spending hasn't helped, but has saddled us with a massive debt burden? Romney should forcefully make the case that deficit spending is both wrong and dangerous, and that it's time for Uncle Sam to live within taxpayers' means.

Obama talked about various "resets" earlier in his presidency. Well, let's reset federal spending to what it was when Obama took office and engineered the worst fiscal nightmare in nearly 80 years. For the first time in seemingly forever, voters would have a real choice between voting for more government and voting for less government. That would give the Ron Paul supporters a meaningful stake in this year's election. It should also appeal to the long-suffering taxpayers who get stuck with the tab for federal profligacy.

One of the Democrats' greatest political strengths is their unity. They know what they want. They want more, as in, more government. There is no end to how much more government the "progressives" among them want, although most are too cagey to admit that openly. Just ask them where they want government spending to shrink (except on national defense), and you'll find the list either to be empty or to include a couple inconsequential token cuts offered only as a fiscal fig leaf.

Will the Republican Party ever coalesce around the principle of steadily working for less government as strongly as the Democrats have coalesced around the principle of more? Perhaps not, but I'd sure like to see Gov. Romney surprise everyone and move the GOP in that direction in this prodigiously momentous election year. Give us a real choice, Mitt: More or less?



terrorism against our citizens. Now, I abhor the killing of innocent women and children and think such behavior is an abomination.



American economy isn't recovering

June 20th marked the first official day of summer, which means we are now officially at the two-year anniversary of the "recovery summer" - meant to showcase that the Administration's economic policies were working. There isn't much need to point out that we're still looking for some economic sunshine.

The President forecast 3 percent economic growth in his budget proposal for the next fiscal year, but the bipartisan Congressional Budget Office recently lowered its 2013 growth estimate to an anemic 0.5 percent. Unemployment is stuck at 8-plus percent - for 40 straight months and counting. In fact, last month's jobs numbers were worse; unemployment is actually increasing.

The President recently said, "The private sector is doing fine." Most Americans, especially the 23 million who are unemployed or underemployed, are scratching their heads, thinking, "What is the definition of 'fine'?" And they look at his proposals for our economy - another round of federal borrowing to enable local governments and school districts to do more short-term hiring – and recognize that this costly, temporary approach has already failed

Full implementation of the health care law next year scares both workers and businesses. Families and individuals are worried about losing their current

health insurance coverage and losing their doctors. For businesses, the health care law is one huge uncertainty among several

and more over-regulation - that is forcing them to hold back on investing and hiring more workers.

I've heard from a small-business owner in Texas who was facing a 44 percent increase in health insurance premiums. This is nothing less than a hidden tax on hiring, and that is before the President's health care program is fully implemented. Almost half of small-business employers say that the health care

law has stopped them from hiring. Small businesses – the engines that are responsible for driving most job growth in the country - are also threatened with huge tax increases. Small businesses are usually organized so they pay income taxes at individual rates, and 53 percent of small businesses' income is subject to the top two individual income tax rates, which will rise to 36 and 39.6 percent on January 1st, unless Congress and the White House act before the end of this year.

About 25 million middle-income

taxpayers will also be hit in January by the Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT). The AMT was introduced in 1969 to target a couple of hundred millionaires who were avoiding taxes. Today it drives up tax bills for millions of Americans, and tens of millions more are threatened next year.

On January 1st, two middle-class tax provisions that I've fought hard to enact are set to expire: marriage penalty relief (so that married couples don't pay higher taxes than if they were single) and state sales tax deduction. The sales tax deduction is particularly important to Texas taxpayers - an average tax savings of \$500 per year - because we don't

have a state income tax. America's economy is trapped in a vicious cycle. The threat of higher taxes and higher costs holds back job creation by our entrepreneurs. Unemployment stays high, deficits soar and the economy continues to stagnate. The White House calls for higher taxes and more stimulus, the deficit goes up and the job-killing

environment flourishes. We cannot go on like this. We need a real, permanent economic recovery, led by an innovative, job-creating private sector. We need long-term solutions: repeal the ruinous health care law, end unnecessary regulations and reform the tax code to promote growth and job creation.



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Drugs in the News

Treatment Evaluated for Mushroom Poisoning


Sickness from the ingestion of poisonous mushroom can cause liver problems. Legalon SIL (Silibinin) is currently being investigated for the treatment of those who have eaten toxic poisonous mushrooms. The drug supposedly blocks toxins from entering the body's liver cells. Toxins from poisonous mushrooms shut down the protein-making part of cells in the liver, causing liver failure. Legalon is produced from the milkthistle plant seeds. According to the US National Institutes Health Clinical Trials, those studied were age 2 and older with a history of eating foraged mushroom, had symptoms of abdominal cramping and pain, nausea, vomiting and/or watery diarrhea that occurred within 48 hours of eating the mushrooms.

The American Association of Poison Control Center reported that in 2010 approximately 6,000 people came in contact with suspicious mushrooms. Of those 6,000 people over 1,300 became ill. From that data approximately 500 people reported injuries and there was one death. The Amanita phalloides (death cap) mushroom variety was responsible for the sickness in most of these individuals.

Weather Why

From Texas A&M University

Q: Is the saying "red sky at night, sailor's delight, red sky at morning, sailor take warning" really accurate?

A: Generally, the answer is yes, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. The saying has been around for thousands of years and is even mentioned in the Bible in the book of Matthew: "When in evening, ye say, it will be fair weather, for the sky is red; and in the morning, it will be foul weather today, for the sky is red and lowering." The saying, McRoberts notes, "may be the most famous of all weather lore. It goes back to the observations made by sailors who had a clear 360-degree view of the horizon from the ship's masts. In the northern hemisphere, most weather patterns move from the west to the east, so if a sailor could see a red sunset to the west, it meant that skies were clear in that direction and that tomorrow would likely be a nice day with few clouds."

Q: What is the science behind

the saying? A: When the sky is red at night or sunset, it is caused by the sun striking particles in the atmosphere. "But if a sunrise has a reddish tint or looks rosy colored, and you can see clouds over the horizon, it might mean the nice weather has passed and a storm system is headed your way," McRoberts adds. "It means an area of low pressure could be moving in, and low pressure almost always means clouds and often rain or thunderstorms."
