Efforts are still underway to "Bring Back the Mulkey Theatre" with the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation awaiting a report this month from architect Mason Rogers.

Rogers has been working with Amarillo-based contractors to prepare a scope of work for the theatre that would involve two stages. Cost estimates are expected this month.

The first phase would involve restoring the façade of the building, including replacing doors and windows, repairing stucco, painting, and adding more neon. After the first stage is completed, phase two would focus on interior renovations to make the theatre operational again.

The CEDC will turn the neon marquee on again for this year's Saints' Roost Celebration. The neon lettering was restored last summer thanks to several generous contributions to the Bring Back the Mulkey project.



Court runs roughshod over Liberty

The United States Supreme Court shocked many Americans last Thursday when it upheld the controversial Affordable Care Act, otherwise known as Obamacare, delighting liberal Democrats and infuriating Republicans and Libertarians because of the vast power that has now been vested in the federal government. It is a power that, left

unchecked, will forever change the relationship between the government and the People.

When the bill was passed two years ago, it was 2,700 pages long and chocked full of spending for new and expanded programs, mandates on insurance companies, and pet projects designed to completely overhaul the American

health care business. (By contrast the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights are six pages long and mostly places limits on the government and defines and expands the Liberty of the People.) But the linchpin of the Affordable Care Act is a provision known as the individual mandate.

That provision requires all Americans who can afford it to go buy health insurance. Of course, if you already have insurance, that's great. But if you're sitting around doing something un-American like saving your money for retirement or just using it to buy beer, then Uncle Sam now tells you to go buy health insurance. And if you don't, you'll face a penalty.

Phrasing is important here because the White House and the Congress insisted this is in no way a tax on the People but just a fine for failure to comply with a lawful order under something called "the Commerce Clause" – a provision of the Constitution that gives Congress the power to regulate interstate commerce. The clause was meant to keep states from putting up barriers to trade between themselves - and basically created a 13-state free trade zone. Unfortunately, it has since been perverted to allow the federal government to stick its foot in all our business on everything from how much water the washing machine you buy uses to what kind of light bulb you can put in your house, but I digress.

The court's ruling found that the individual mandate would in fact be unconstitutional under the Commerce Clause - because, well, heck the government could then make you buy anything. But five of the nine justices found that mandate was constitutional under Congress' power to levy taxes. A penalty is a tax, they said, even though the Supreme Court has never ever said that before.

Chief Justice John Roberts, who was appointed by a conservative Republican, President George W. Bush, cast the deciding vote and wrote the majority opinion, in which he basically asserts that Congress can in fact make you buy anything or face a penalty... oops... a tax. Roberts wrote: "Suppose Congress enacted a statute providing that every taxpayer who owns a house without energy efficient windows must pay \$50 to the IRS.... No one would doubt that this law imposed a tax, and was within Congress's power to tax.

I would doubt it was within Congress' power, and I would be squealing like a stuck pig about it. But Roberts wasn't finished with his brilliant ruling, writing that when the government makes rules under the Commerce Clause it brings about its "full weight" on the matter. "An individual who disobeys may be subjected to criminal sanctions. Those sanctions can include not only fines and imprisonment, but all the attendant consequences of being branded a criminal.

. . By contrast, Congress's authority under the taxing power is limited to requiring an individual to pay money into the Federal Treasury, no more."

Limited to requiring an individual to pay money? Is he flipping kidding us right now? People go to jail for tax evasion. If you don't pay your taxes, you can go to federal prison. If you resist arrest for this offense or try to escape from federal prison you risk being shot and killed. Limited to paying money... Balderdash! The Chief Justice has clearly lost his mind.

Two hundred and thirty-six years ago this week, our Founding-Fathers put their lives and fortunes on the line when they declared that all men are created equal and have certain natural rights from their Creator and that governments are established to secure these rights, and then they wrote:

"— That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government...'

The American people have a chance to stop this affront to our rights. They can vote Mr. Obama out of the White House this November and send all of his allies in Congress packing, too. But the odds are not good. Gov. Romney, who has been foolishly chosen as the Republican nominee by the party establishment, is not the most credible spokesman on this issue, and then, too, Republicans don't always vote the way they should in Congress. A full repeal of this act is necessary but not likely.

The consequences for either re-electing Mr. Obama or failing to repeal the act in its entirety are unthinkable. The federal government will be left unchecked in the role it can play in our lives. It will have become destructive of our Liberty, and we must ask, "What would our Founders think of this?"

As I grew older, I began to think more of our founding fathers and the sacrifices made while founding this great country. Independence Day has, for me, become a time to reflect on the enormous cost of keeping this great republic free.

Our freedom was purchased with the blood and suffering of countless soldiers, sailors, and their families. Throughout the ensuing years our free-

dom has come at a terrible cost, in the blood and lives of our military men and women, many of whom continue to suffer from grievous and soul.



A taxing decision on health care

The Supreme Court's decision to uphold most of the Administration's health care law is disappointing, but with the vast majority of Americans voicing deep misgivings about the law, the debate is far from over. In fact, the Court made a point of writing that while the law is constitutional, it was not deciding on its fairness or wisdom. The qualms about the law have grown as Americans have learned more about how it will affect them and affect the economy. The law contains over \$500 billion in new taxes, cuts nearly \$500 billion out of the Medicare program to fund a new government entitlement and puts the federal government between patients and their doctors.

The American people do not want this law. American business does not want this law. And quality American health care cannot survive this law - at least not as we know it.

The Supreme Court made one thing very clear: this is a tax. As the majority said, it was not ruling on fairness, or the wisdom of health care policy, but on the power of Congress to levy taxes. At a time when many Americans are struggling to make ends meet, hitting them with a massive tax is indefensible.

When the health care law is fully implemented, most Americans won't be able to keep the coverage they have now. Their health care choices will be made for them in Washington, D.C., and there will also be new regulations to disrupt the doctor-patient relationship.

Businesses are struggling too. A

Gallup poll in February asked small businesses why they aren't hiring, and nearly half of the respondents said it was because

by sen. kay bailey hutchison they are worried about potential health care costs. Another survey released this year, by the US Chamber of Commerce, found that 74 percent of small-business respondents say the health care law has made hiring

more difficult. If you own a business and don't buy government-approved health insurance for your employees, health care reform imposes a new tax. If business owners want to grow their business and hire new employees, health care reform imposes costly federal regulations if their payroll exceeds 50 workers.

When given the choice between creating new jobs or facing unprecedented levels of federal regulation and higher taxes, the smart money is on businesses freezing hiring. America cannot afford that kind of stagnation in an already faltering recovery, and the 23 million unemployed and underemployed Americans simply cannot wait for a light at the end of the tunnel.

And then there is the cost to America's health care system. This law puts government between doctor and patient. It allows unelected bureaucrats

to decide who gets what treatment and how. It delivers a blow to the foundation of our system: the cutting-edge research and technology, and access to new drugs, treatments and technologies that are the hallmark of American innovation.

This law does not address the very real issues in our health care system. It imposes growth-killing taxes on job creators and a financial burden on American families. It inserts government between doctors and patients and takes away patient choice. The process by which it was built was opaque and the American people's voices were not heard.

Republicans in Congress want a common-sense, step-by-step approach to health care reform that is transparent and that respects the will of the American people, who have said again and again that they do not approve of this law. We want an approach that is fair and economically responsible. We want a plan that does not burden small businesses, that does not create more innovationrestricting red tape and that does not try to make Americans' medical decisions

for them. The solution is for Congress to repeal the law, and start over with common-sense, step-by-step health care reform that Americans want and need - reforms that build on the strengths of our health care system, increase quality and choice, and lower costs. I hope the President and my colleagues on both sides of the political aisle will listen to our constituents, and work together on practical, sensible reforms.

This year's campaign highlights Sean Carter who suffered a massive brain injury when a car in which he was riding spun out of control and slammed into a tree. Both Sean and the driver were legally drunk.

"July Fourth is the deadliest holiday of the year for alcoholrelated crashes in the United States," said Carol Rawson, TxDOT's Traffic Operations Division director. "Texans need to hear Sean's powerful story and know that law enforcement will be out in force. It's important to make the right choices. Stay safe and enjoy the holiday. If a celebration involves alcohol, don't drive."

"No Refusal" means just that. Motorists suspected of driving while intoxicated must provide a breath or blood sample to law enforcement. Should they refuse to comply, law enforcement officials can take the suspect to jail, where a judge then signs an expedited search warrant that calls for a mandatory blood sample to be taken by a qualified health-care professional. 

"We get however many we can grab on the morning after, but the tide takes out a lot of these plastics."



Meningitis Vaccine Approved

The FDA recently approved MenHibrix, a combination vaccine to prevent meningitis caused by two bacteria, Neisseria meningitides and Haemophilus influenza type b (Hib). The vaccine is provided in a four dose series. It is approved for infants and children from six weeks through 18 months of age. Health experts claim that the availability of this new vaccine will allow for expanded protection of infants and children without increasing the number of vaccine shots an infant or child receives during recommended immunization schedules.

Meningitis is an infection that may be caused by bacteria and can progress rapidly in children and infants following the first symptoms. Early symptoms often include irritability and a sudden high fever. A rash (purple or red spots) may develop on the trunk, palms of the hands, legs, and soles of the feet. At one time Haemophilus influenza type b (Hib) was the leading cause of meningitis in children younger than age 5. Currently,

most cases of meningitis due to Hib disease occur because the child has not completed the initial series of immunization.

Fannin Battleground is renovated, reopens

FANNIN - An important site in the Texas War for Independence is once again open to the public with improvements that include an expanded interpretation of events that took place there 175years ago.

Fannin Battleground memorializes the Texas soldiers who fought and lost the Battle of Coleto Creek in 1836. Outrage at the subsequent execution of the captured troops under orders from Mexican General Santa Anna became a rallying cry at the Battle of San Jacinto, where Texas won its independence.

In addition to the enhanced interpretation, visitors will discover a new flag area incorporating the historic entrance gates and memorial stones, a restored bandstand with original windows, door openings and roof, and a new exhibit on the Battle of Coleto Creek, as well as outdoor interpretation panels and new restrooms.

Fannin Battleground is one of the Texas Historical Commission's 20 historic sites representing compelling examples of the Texas mystique throughout the Lone Star State. Rehabilitation projects an interpretive plans are currently being completed at most of the sites, offering heritage travelers and opportunity to experience these real places telling the real stories of Texas history.
