City Hall reminds about water rules


The City of Clarendon' is reminding everyone that Stage 4 Drought Contingencies are still in place and all outdoor watering restrictions still in force.

Hicks wins re-election

HISD voters oust two incumbents

Clarendon Mayor Larry Hicks narrowly won re-election Saturday, beating Alderman Tommy Hill by a 20-vote margin, 244-224; and two longtime incumbents on the Hedley school board were defeated.

A total of 468 voters cast ballots in the city election, representing a 43 percent turnout.

Sandy Skelton was the top vote getter among candidates for two positions on the Board of Aldermen with 329 votes. Alderman Debbie Roberts lots. was elected to a full term with 231 votes, and also running were former alderman Janice Knorpp, 187, and Trevor Leeper, 99.

Challenger Aaron Harper led all candidates with 108 votes in the six person race for two seats on the Hedley ISD Board of Trustees, and former trustee Lana Ritchie was also trustees James E. Potts and Bonnie people voting.

Brown lost their positions with 53 and 52 votes each, and also running were Kevin Smith, 29, and Michelle McCann, 9.

HISD had a total of 170 voters, representing a 41.1 percent turnout.

In Howardwick, Mike Rowland was elected mayor with 57 votes over David Cafferatta with 29. Jim Cockerham and Gail Leathers were elected to two-year terms on the Board of Aldermen with 69 and 54 votes each, defeating William R. Jordan, 41. Gene Rogers and Cory Longan were elected to one-year terms on the board with 61 and 52 votes, defeating H.L. "Buster" Baird, 34, and Sandy Sanders, 18.

Howardwick had a 38.6 percent turnout with 86 people casting bal-

Challenger Chuck Robertson was the top vote getter in the race for three positions on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees with 455 votes, and incumbents Jim Shelton and Robin Ellis were re-elected with 444 and 376 votes respectively. Also running was Linda Rowland, 153.

Shelton wins gold at state track meet

Clarendon High School senior Audrey Shelton's track career could have not had a better ending as she sprinted to a gold medal at the State Track Meet in Austin last week.

She not only won the gold in the 3200-meter run, she also annihilated the old record in that event. Shelton ran the race in 11:31.84, beating her personal best by 37 seconds according to coach Alton Gaines.


Shelton did not stop at one medal. She also went on to a third place finish in the 1600-meter with a time of 5:21.63 to add the bronze to her collection. Shelton bested the field by almost fifteen seconds in the 3200 and was a little over a second off the pace in the 1600.

She ran the 1600 on Saturday

and knew it would be a tougher finish for her, so her strategy was to stay up with the pack. While at CHS, Shelton has posted many accomplishments in both cross country and track.

Fellow senior Jentry Shadle also participated in the state meet in the 100-meter hurdles finishing eighth with a time of 16.94.

"Wow, what a race," Gaines said. "I am very proud of the girls. You have to understand that you are competing against the top eight athletes in your event in the state of Texas. That is big time. I'm so very proud of what these two young ladies accomplished their senior year. This is what you work so hard for in track or any other sport. Thank you for letting us be a part of it."

A welcome mat for prosperity

How many new immigrants should the United States allow each year? How many guest workers? These are not easy questions, which is why there is as much fierce debate within the two parties as between them.

A little history and a few facts are useful in thinking through the problem. The United States did not even have an immigration law until 1875. There were no quotas or passports - people just got on a boat and came here. As a result, America became rich with the highest wages in the world. The system worked fine given that the United States was trying to increase the population (at least, of European origin) and had not yet created a welfare state.

The two main reasons given for restricting current immigration are the myths that immigrants take away American jobs and that immigrants are more likely to go on welfare, thus putting an additional burden on the taxpayers. Rather than taking away American jobs, good economists understand that immigrants who work create wealth in America, which in turn creates more and higher paying jobs for everyone.

To explain the economics of this adequately would take more space than this entire commentary, but the truth of the assertion can be seen in the fact that high-wage countries with many immigrants such as Switzerland, Australia and Canada tend to have much higher labor force participation rates and lower unemployment rates than low-wage countries. It has been well documented that there are not enough Americans who are willing to do labor-intensive agricultural work to meet the needs of, in particular, fruit, vegetable and nut producers. At the other end of the wage scale, the United States has a substantial shortage of people trained in computer science and many of the other physical and medical sciences to meet the demands of employers. If employers cannot bring such needed workers into the United States, they will move their operations to other countries or concede the business to their foreign competitors, either of which will depress U.S. employment.

Do immigrants utilize Medicare, food stamps and other health and welfare programs more than native-born Americans? A recent study by Leighton Ku and Brian Bruen of George Washington University, which is consistent with similar studies, shows that immigrants consistently utilize welfare benefits less than their native-born counterparts. A recent static analysis by the Heritage Foundation concluded that immigrants could be more costly. However, the study assumed that immigrants will fail to move up the economic ladder, and did not account for restrictions in the proposed "Gang of Eight" bill and the benefits of immigration, so the analysis is not relevant for the current debate. What is clear is that immigrants who are working, self-supporting and paying taxes are a net benefit. Laws need to be changed or enforced to make sure that people who are not U.S. citizens do not receive welfare and free medical services (other than in emergencies), including "Obamacare."

Polls show most Americans are in favor of immigrants who come here to work, particularly those who are willing to do jobs that Americans will not do, or those who are highly skilled and add to the competitiveness and productivity of the United States. America would be far poorer today if many of our immigrant ancestors - even the unskilled ones - had not been admitted.

The proposed immigration bill is flawed by having a quota system for guest workers rather than one based on employer demand. If the quota is lower than the demand for workers, then foreign workers and some employers will have a strong incentive to violate the law (as they now do). The push has been to make "our borders more secure," and it is true that more needs to be done. But it also true that other than by creating a Soviet-style "Iron Curtain" and a police state, our borders can never be totally secure.

Fortunately, Helen Krieble, a businesswoman who faced the problem of not being able to hire sufficient U.S. workers for one of her operations, came up with a very practical solution to the guest worker problem. Her basic concept has been endorsed by leading economists and political leaders, including Newt Gingrich. She understood that many foreign workers do not want to live permanently in the United States or become citizens. They would prefer to be legal and to be able to go home and come back again without difficulty. Under the Krieble proposal, a database that matches workers and employers would be created, which would be open to all who need work permits, including those who are already in the country illegally. Employers would have to show that the need is not being met by U.S. workers. An applicant would have to go through a security check, and then be issued a secure photo I.D. (once a job is secured) as a legal worker. This would not be amnesty for those who are in the U.S. illegally, but would enable them to start the process for a green card and possibly, eventual citizenship on an equal basis with those who are applying to come to the United States for the first time.

The beauty of the Krieble proposal is that it is humane without giving an unfair advantage to existing illegal immigrants. It will add to U.S. prosperity while greatly reducing the incentives for people to come here illegally.

Hopefully, the newly constituted boards and councils will understand that having self control is better than having

control over others. There have been enough petty that resulted in divisive factions between our

disagreements politicians. Some of our board members

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

Another group for IRS scrutiny

In a press conference last week, White House press secretary Jay Carney fielded insistent questions from a variety of news agencies regarding the Internal Revenue Service's alleged actions toward tea party organizations. There should be more where that came from because the IRS has cast its net wide enough to catch a pro-Israel group in its haul of organizations that appear not to align with the executive branch's policy preferences.

By now everyone knows that Sen. Mitch McConnell has called out the Internal Revenue Service for its "thuggish practices" involving intensive scrutiny and extended delays of decisions in cases where an organization included the words "tea party," "patriot," or "9-12" in its application for federal tax-exempt status. Apparently at McConnell's request, the matter is now being investigated by the IRS Inspector General. The House Ways and Means Committee initiated its own investigation into the agency's policies and practices.

Michigan Rep. Mike Rogers said publically on Sunday that the IRS had "agents who were engaged in intimidation of political groups."

He added, furthermore, "I don't care if you're a conservative, a liberal, a Democrat or a Republican, this should send a chil! up your spine. It needs to have a full investigation."

Indeed there will be an investigation. To grant Rogers his "full investigation," however, will require Congress to look well beyond the tax enforcement agency's policies related to tea party organizations. Consider:

In a move that is astounding because it so obviously chills political speech in the United States, the IRS has delayed and may deny the awarding of tax-exempt status to Z STREET because its mission and goals contradict President Obama's Middle East policy.

When the nonprofit, educational Z STREET, a self-described Zionistorganization, applied for tax-exempt status in 2009, the IRS demanded in writing to know "Does your organization support the existence of the land of Israel?" Where the president "strongly supports" the two-state solution, Z STREET was founded to support the state of Israel as currently recognized by the international community.

Court documents filed by Z STREET verify that the IRS maintains

a special policy for organizations that are connected with Israel. The IRS informed the nonprofit organization that its application had been forwarded to "a special unit in the D.C. office to determine whether the organization's activities contradict the Administration's public policies."

Z STREET should be praised for pushing back. The small organization has taken up the cause of defending itself and other organizations that may find themselves at odds with particular political beliefs of a future administration. Z STREET's initial hearing is scheduled for July 2 in federal district court in Washington, D.C.

What is lamentable is that any nonprofit educational or charitable organization would find itself pressured by the federal government to prove that its charitable, religious, or educational goals are not incongruent with the foreign or domestic policy agenda of a sitting president.

The Post Adjutant will read the roll call of the 231 Veterans buried in the Rowe Cemetery.


The program will be concluded with the laying of the memorial wreath and the play of Taps.

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

OTC Overactive Bladder Drug for Women

The U.S Food and Drug Administration recently approved the first over-the-counter (OTC) treatment for overactive bladder (OAB) in women. Oxytrol for Women is a patch reapplied to the skin every four days and according to its manufacturer will be available in the Fall of 2013. Oxytrol for Women contains the medication oxybutynin. Oxybutynin has been available as a prescription medication for years and will remain available as a prescription only produut for use in men. Oxybutynin treats OAB by relaxing hyperactive muscles in the bladder. The most common side effects noted during OTC treatment are mild and included skin irritation at the patch site, dry mouth and constipation.

OAB is characterized by an increase in both urgency and frequency of urination. It affects over 20 million American women, most between the ages of 45 to 60 years old. Many women who may have waited several years to seek treatment for OAB may now have an alternative treatment Individuals treating overactive bladder with OTC products should contact their physician for additional information and guidance.



Sadly there are the "combat boots" that seem to be in every church. They make up a small group but try to force their way on the rest of the crowd. If there is a disagreement, you will find this bunch in the middle and not helping to make peace.


