Wood to be interim super at Hedley ISD

A veteran educator with 43 years' experience is taking the helm of Hedley ISD following a meeting of the Board of Trustees Monday.

Bill Wood will serve as the school's interim superintendent following the resignation this month of embattled superintendent Bill Sanders.

Wood grew up in Claude and worked at several schools before retiring as the superintendent at Cisco about 13 years ago. Since then he spent four years as an "interim" at Claude and five years as "interim" at Silverton.

"I could be (in Hedley) for a year or longer depending on how things go," Wood said. "My immediate goals are to get a budget set, get people hired, and get school going."

Wood said he will be employed under a "one day contract" situation, which he said means the "one day they don't like me or the one day I don't like them, I'm gone."

He also said as soon as the board knows who they want as a permanent superintendent, he will act quickly to get that person on board.

Wood said prior to taking the job he had had a frank conversation with the board about issues he had heard regarding the relationship between the board and Sanders.

"I will be working directly with the board president; and I told them if they want me to do the job, I will do the job. I will run the school."

Wood also said he has two granddaughters attending Hedley ISD, and he wants to see the school run well.

Snake cuts power to Lelia Lake, Hedley

A fried snake plunged residents of Hedley and Lelia Lake into darkness Monday night, according to a spokesman with AEP/Southwestern Electric Power Co.

Big Brother is watching everyone

Edward Snowden is on the run. And he should be given that he has made a lot of powerful enemies in the United States government. If you watch enough movies or television, it's easy to see how this guy could have "an accident" while trying to avoid extradition back to the US. But if you keep up with current events, it's even easier

to think he might just get droned.

Snowden took a job with a government contractor apparently for the sole purpose of finding out what all nasty business the government is up to. He then took that information to the press, and a foreign newspaper shined the

light on secret surveillance activities being conducted on American citizens and others in the name of national security.

One of the biggest revelations was that the government had obtained a secret court order forcing Verizon Communications to turn over tons of "metadata" on millions of cellular phone users. Basically, every Verizon customer, including your humble editor, has had their Fourth Amendment Rights violated by our government.

And that was just the tip of the iceberg. Below the surface there are now other known surveillance activities being conducted against the American public for our own good.

We likely would never have known about much of this except for the actions of Mr. Snowden. We can't be sure what his personal motivations were or are, but he has found himself demonized for his actions. He's been called a traitor and accused of treason, and you can be sure the federal government has a stack of criminal charges lined up against this guy if they ever get their hands on him.

Or, as has already been mentioned, the administration might just declare him an enemy combatant, blow up his taxi, and trumpet the whole thing on the evening news.

Rather than condemn Snowden, someone ought to give this guy a medal. And all these high-ranking DemoRepublicrats who are calling for his criminal prosecution need to take a good long look in the mirror at what they and this government are becoming.

Snowden and a few allies in the press have pulled back the curtain and exposed some pretty ugly government cockroaches to the sunshine. But rather than scurry off into the shadows, government officials have thumbed their noses at outraged citizens and pledged to continue these "necessary" programs.

It is disgusting what has happened to our government. And it's been a bipartisan track that has led us here. President George W. Bush's administration fueled by the attacks on 9-11 got sweeping powers to violate civil liberties under the guise of pursuing terrorists with the passage of the PATRIOT Act by wide majorities of both parties. President Obama first criticized some of those policies... but has continued them and apparently expanded them. We should be reminded that power corrupts, and freedoms lost are hard to regain.

As we approach the anniversary of our nation's independence, it is a good time to ask what we have become. It's already obvious that our government is largely unrecognizable from the small, limited federal republic described by our Constitution. But now we have examples of a bureaucracy and power culture that truly appears to be growing out of control to the point that no president can even know what's happening under him much less be in command of all the forces of the Executive.

We see examples of Internal Revenue agents giving extra scrutiny based on political motives. We see agents of the press harassed and intimidated for crossing the administration. We see federal employees refuse to answer basic questions from the elected Representatives of the People. And now we know that our National Security Agency considers We the People to be the enemy... or at least possibly the enemy and worthy of scrutiny.

There is probably little about our present government that our Founding Fathers would recognize, and they would certainly be appalled to learn what we've given up in order to be "safe."

Imagine if you will what would have happened if government officials had approached Postmaster General Benjamin Franklin with a secret court order. "Mr. Franklin, we don't want to know the contents of people's mail. We just want to know who is writing to whom, where they are when they write the letter, where the recipient of the letter is when they get it, and how long the letter is. Is all just for safety's sake. After all, the Brits still have friends here in America and you never know what they might be up to."

I'm sure old Ben would have told the government agents to go to hell, and then he would have done just what Mr. Snowden did and blow the whistle so every American could know just what was happening.

Far from condemning Snowden, America should be thanking him. It is time to roll back the power of the federal government. It is time for the People to demand that our representatives pull the plug on these activities, and it is time for those who continue to defend these policies to find other lines of work. It is time for Americans to be free again.

Playing both sides of the Feds' fence

Texas politicians are well known through the land as folks who are diligently working to reduce the size and scope of the federal government. Good for them and a big "Amen!" to their efforts. The federal government has become so big and powerful that absolutely no one can control it, not even our inept Congress, the people that are most responsible for this dreadful state of affairs. The federal bureaucracy has become a gluttonous beast that is completely and totally out of control.

Even so, Texas politicians tend to speak with a forked tongue; even lie about their ties to the federal government. On the one hand, Texas political types wail and gnash their teeth while whining about the enormous cost of running the federal government, while simultaneously putting their other hand out for federal funds to offset the costs of various man-made and natural disasters, along with other perks.


For example, take the recent tragedy in West, Texas. The terrible blast that leveled much of the city, and killed 14 people, including 10 fire fighters and first responders, exacted a terrible human toll. Additionally, the financial cost of the blast continues to rise, and now exceeds well over \$50 million.

Governor Rick immediately appealed to the federal government for disaster relief. However, when the feds declined to give Texas officials all the disaster relief that they requested, it not only outraged the local leaders of West, who are trying desperately to rebuild the city, it raised another - thornier - issue.

Why did Texas ask for federal dollars for aid when it has plenty of its own dollars? In his request for federal aid, Governor Rick fudged the numbers more than a bit. He wrote in his letter to President Obama that the magnitude and severity of the disaster exceeded our state and local resources. Because President Obama had already authorized the federal government to cover 75 percent of Texas' costs for

debris removal and emergency response, Governor Rick's request amounted to a fairly small amount, say \$17 million, in uninsured and underinsured damages

to public



buildings, equipment, and utilities. So far, the feds have paid, or agreed to pay much more than \$25 million to Texas and to the families affected by the blast. Even, they decided not to pay another \$17 million that should be covered by other sources. Therefore, Texas' request for the extra funds was denied because Texas -ahem- neglected to provide evidence that it lacked the financial wherewithal to pay the aforementioned \$17 million. Really? Governor Rick actually claimed that Texas could not cover a miserly \$17

million? Hmmm? So, what to do? Governor Rick, consummate politician that he is, along with our Attorney General, disingenuously cried foul. How could President Obama be so callous as to refuse to help the Lone Star State cover the cost of a bona fide man-made disaster? Naturally, the much aggrieved citizens of West, along with like minded Texans scattered across the parched plains immediately raised a great hue and cry, declaring the feds (mostly President Obama and his administration) to be a foul bunch of insensitive louts.

In Austin and in West, the denial of aid has been cast in simplistic terms with many expressing shock that the federal government found that an explosion that killed 14 people and destroyed or severely damaged 193 of the town's 700 homes did not qualify as a major disaster. The double-decker headline in The West News read, "FEMA rejects West, 'Says it was not a

Never mind that Texas, perhaps the most prosperous state in the union, has over \$8 billion in rainy day funds. Doesn't an explosion caused by a fertilizer company qualify as a rainy day? If not, what does? In short, Texas has the funds available to help the fine folks of West recover from their terrible losses. Yet, our politicians would rather blame the enormously expensive federal bureaucracy for their miserly support than pay the funds that are available for such disasters.

I'm a bit miffed that our state politicians, who are quick to berate the federal government for wasteful spending, yet get in a snit when they think we are not getting enough money from the feds. The first thing that all state governments do after a disaster, natural or otherwise, is appeal to the federal government for financial help. This behavior includes our representatives in Washington, DC.


Meanwhile, these very same to add yet another layer of intrusive behavior to the state bureaucracy. They are hell-bent on requiring recipients of Medicaid and unemployment insurance to be drug tested. Regardless of the merits or demerits of the proposed action, adding drug testing will add to Texas government.

We can't have it both ways. We either ask the federal government for help or we don't ask for help. If we ask for help we then have no rational basis for complaining that it spends too much of our money. If we don't ask it for help, we can rationally criticize it for spending too much of our hard earned money.

The same goes for our state government. If we want to reduce the size and expense of state government perhaps we should spend less time spending state funds to intrude upon our personal lives, including drug testing people in less fortunate circumstances.

New laws will protect Texas seniors

Austin is more than the "live musical capital of the world," a vibrant high-tech hub and home to one of the top universities in the country. Decisions made there by those same legislators we elect back home have a profound impact on our everyday lives.

This year was no different. When the dust settled at the end of the 2013 regular legislative session, Texans had gained some important wins and in many cases avoided some painful losses. Throughout the 140-day period AARP was there, working with bill sponsors, testifying before committees and mobilizing our members and the public on key issues and concerns for older Texans.

Older Texans can cheer about improved access to medical services thanks to a new law helping Texas recruit the next generation of doctors by establishing incentives for training primary care physicians and encouraging more doctors to participate in Medicaid and Medicare. The law will also make it easier for advance practice registered nurses to see patients and write prescriptions, providing more Texans of all ages with access to health care professionals.

Long-term care at home, an essential service for many of our seniors, has also been improved and expanded. More low-income seniors will be able to receive community-based long-term care through Medicaid, the primary payer for long term care services for seniors. This will allow them to stay in their homes

and communities with their families while also saving taxpayer dollars.

Moreover, community-based attendants, those hard-working folks who help care for our parents or grandparents on Medicaid, will receive a pay increase--bringing starting pay up to \$7.86 per hour and exceeding the state minimum of \$7.25 per hour.

Texas seniors who live in nursing homes also got a win when the Legislature adopted measures to greatly improve these facilities. Texas Medicaid nursing home reimbursement rates have long been among the lowest in the country. The legislature passed a 6 percent increase over two years, making it easier for nursing homes to retain quality staff, a significant indicator of care quality.

In addition, Medicaid-funded nursing home stays throughout Texas will soon fall under STAR+PLUS managed care. This will encourage higher quality care by rewarding the best plans with more enrollees and by creating higher standards.

Another key issue where good things happened and bad things were kept from happening was the definedbenefit pension program essential to the financial security of Texas teachers as well as other school district and state employees. Earlier this year, some groups argued that the state pension programs should be converted to individual--and more uncertain-401ktype programs. This could have spelled disaster for workers who have devoted their lives to public service.

In the end, the Texas Legislature decided to preserve pensions for state and school employees while granting cost-of-living increases to those who have been retired the longest. To help strengthen the system, both state government and current employees will contribute a bit more to the pension system, and new employees will have stricter requirements on when they can retire.

Payday and auto title loan businesses prey on economically vulnerable Texans, by offering them "fast cash" loans that can carry fees in excess of 500% APR. Families often pay many times over the original amount borrowed for these small dollar loans, leaving them with long-term financial problems.

The Legislature also acted to bolster protections for older Texans from financial abuse by clarifying powers of attorney. These essential tools are used to delegate authority to someone else to handle your financial decisions but can also give dishonest people a license to steal. Power of attorney forms will now be designed to make it easier for consumers to clearly detail the duties

and responsibilities being authorized. Of course, tough decisions are made at our state capitol each time the legislature meets and not all of them are popular to say the least. But at least in these particular areas in 2013, the voices of older Texans were heard loud and clear and their lives were improved. And that's good news for all of us. 
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



· Streets - The Public Works Department continues to assist Scott Wampler Construction with the replacement of sewer and water lines on portions of 3rd, Allen and 5th streets and eventually the same work will be completed on 6th street. This project is necessary as the old lines are in poor condition and need replacing prior to paving. Estimated completion date is late summer. Additionally, city work crews are busy patching holes in streets as time permits as well as many other routine duties.

• Paving - Since the sewer/ water line replacement project will not be completed until late summer, paving of 3rd, Allen and 6th streets will have to be delayed until spring or early summer of 2014, about 11 months from now. Paving cannot be done in winter months.

· Downtown Improvement Grant - Clarendon's Economic Development Corporation (CEDC) will submit a grant application to the US Department of Agriculture next month for the purpose of obtaining funds for improved handicap accessibility and new street light installation on downtown sidewalks. If news of funding for this project comes in October, the improvements will be made to both sides of the three blocks of Kearney Street. The CEDC hopes to obtain approximately \$150,000 for this

project. · Farmers' Market - The CEDC is also exploring grant opportunities through the US Department of Agriculture for the establishment of a Farmers' Market next spring. This project would give area producers an outlet to sell their products, as well as provide a venue to purchase locally grown produce and other items. The proposed site would be the city owned lot across from the post office, and will hopefully aid in the continued efforts to bring

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

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
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Clarendon Church of Christ WHY NOW?


Migraine Management with an Inhaler

A recent review of a large clinical study showed that inhaled dihydroergotamine (DHE, Levadex) helped relieve and control migraine symptoms which included nausea, light-, and soundsensitivity. Another previous clinical trial (FREEDOM-301) demonstrated that this medication, when inhaled, helped migraine pain and symptoms. DHE is available as an intravenous and intranasal dosage forms, but the inhaled form in a metereddose inhaler has not been approved by the FDA. Scientists believe that the inhaled form will help stop migraines faster and keep pain away longer than other dosage forms.

Migraine is a disorder of the nervous system characterized by severe, pounding headaches that typically affect one side of the head. Ergotamines (Cafergot) are a class of medications used to help stop a migraine attack from being severe; these are often combined with caffeine as a tablet or suppository form. Ergotamines alter chemicals in the brain to tighten blood vessels. The triptans (Sumatriptan, Rivatriptan) are another class of medications that may reduce migraine attacks and symptoms.
