City plans to fog seal **58 blocks**

The City of Clarendon will fog seal approximately 58 blocks of paved streets next week in an effort to protect those roads from water damage in the future.

The \$40,000 project will focus on streets that were paved in the last ten years with 45 blocks on the west side of town and parts of 13 blocks on the east side.

The project will take two days, and the contractor will do about half the project each day, beginning Tuesday, October 1, and starting on the west side of town.

City officials are asking residents on the streets depicted on the adjacent map to move any parked vehicles off those roads next Tuesday and Wednesday so the project can be completed. Cars left on those streets may be towed.

County approves budget, tax rate

Donley County Commissioners approved a \$2.1 million budget for fiscal year 2014 during a called meeting Monday.

No members of the public showed up during an open hearing prior to the vote.

Commissioners unanimously approved setting the county's total tax rate at \$0.632279 per \$100 valuation, which is an increase of a little more than three cents over the current rate.

Among the changes in this year's budget is the creation of a \$20,000 Preservation Maintenance Program for capital improvements to the Courthouse. County Judge Jack Hall briefly addressed items of concern regarding the 1890 building, which was the completely restored ten years ago. Hall said the county would need to replace a rusted electrical conduit in the Courthouse basement and also need to address moisture that is seeping through the south basement wall.

of Pampa says a fog seal is a mixture of 40 percent asphalt and 60 percent water that is sprayed on the pavement surface to seal cracks.

Although not as longlasting as a traditional tar and gravel seal coat, this more economical measure will provide some protection for the streets to keep water from getting into the pavement.

The seal sprays on like water, but the water evaporates out of the mixture leaving the asphalt behind, James said.

The affected streets will be barricaded as they are sealed, and the mixture dries in about four hours, city officials say.

Commissioners were also expected to consider a tax abatement for Cielo Wind Power for a proposed wind farm in the northeastern part of the county. Cielo was not ready for this week's meeting, county officials said, but they expect to be ready to appear before the court next month.



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Most of the city's day-to-day functions have been undisturbed though, and for the citizens' part, we have probably welcomed the quietness that resulted from not having one or more city meetings every month.

There are still hard feelings from the arguments that arose in the months leading up to the mass resignations. Time may heal those, but a pesky issue has arisen with regards to the city's tax rate.

The law prescribes that if a city doesn't set a tax rate, the cheaper of the current or the effective rate will become the new rate. In Clarendon's case, that rate is 65 cents per \$100 valuation, which has been the rate since 2008. But the law was written for cities where councils were deadlocked or refused to act. Here we don't have a council to act, and the rub is that even though the rate is set, it still has to be ratified by a supermajority (four of five members) of the board.

And that's when City Hall blew the dust off the state constitution and found a "holdover provision" which basically stipulates that these aldermen who resigned are actually still in office until their successors are appointed or elected. Therefore if two "former" members would agree to meet with the two remaining aldermen, the city could ratify its tax rate and move on about its business, and the Donley Appraisal District could send its combined tax notices out on time next month.

But, as Alderman Will Thompson said this week, there is too much bad blood for this to happen easily. To her credit, "former" alderman Debbie Roberts showed up at City Hall Monday night to try to help resolve this issue. But two other "former" aldermen were no shows. One is out of state attending college and can't just drop everything to come to Clarendon. The other, unfortunately, has had very unpleasant conversations with the mayor and will only come to a meeting if the mayor resigns.

The American Humanist Association has renewed the efforts of some atheists to remove the words "under God" from our Pledge of Allegiance. The organization argued recently in the Massachusetts Supreme Court that the inclusion of these words is a violation of atheists' religious liberty and equality.

In "A Farewell to Arms," Ernest Hemingway claimed that, "All thinking men are atheists." Yet his characters, when faced with threats and struggles, often turned to prayer. To whom do atheists pray, given that they do not believe they are "under God?" Why do atheists pray? Is there not an inherent inconsistency between prayer and atheism?

Theistic behavior among those who claim to be atheists is common in literature. In his novel "The Cardinal of the Kremlin," Tom Clancy penned, "God knows, was his unconscious reply. So strange that after a few days of war even the most adamant atheist invoked the name of God."

In "The Weight of Water," Anita Shreve marked, "I rhythmically recited the Lord's Prayer over and over, even

though I am not a religious woman. I found the words soothing."

"You see: I don't believe and I call on Him in whom I don't believe. It's a form of madness," wrote Henry Roth in "Requiem for Harlem."

Scott Turow, in his novel "Presumed Innocent," inscribed, "And now, dear God, I think, dear God in whom I do not believe, I pray to you to stop this."

In "Bread and Wine," Ignazio Silone wrote, "I didn't believe in God anymore, but I began to want God to exist with all my being. I had need of Him to escape the fear of chaos."

It is a common literary approach that those who claim to be atheists easily become inconsistent atheists when faced with threats, struggles and existential chaos. It does not surprise Christians that atheists struggle to be consistent in their own form of faith, the faith that God does not exist.

We need the presence of God in our lives and in our cultures. In fact, faith in God depends not on work, but in God's working in us. In "Snow," Orhan Pamuk wrote, "People can't ever really be atheists, because even if we wanted it, God would never abandon us here."

Alas, we as Christians are also often inconsistent in our faith. During times of struggle, we depend upon God and our church. During times of plenty, however, we frequently forget our faith.

In "Last Days of Ptolemy Grey," Walter Mosley penned, "Do you believe in him? If things goin' good, not too much. But when I'm in trouble I can pray with the best of 'em."

Sometimes we consciously rebel against our faith and turn our backs to our previous declarations of faith. Fortunately, this sort of rebellion is often temporary. God's existence does not depend on our faith. God's existence does not depend on our recognition that we are "under God." Again, from "Esther and Ruth," Iain Duguid says that though people, "do their best to ignore his existence, he refuses to be written out of the script. Between the lines and behind the scenes, out of focus and incognito, the Lord continued to work to accomplish all his holy will."

Victor Hugo said it so well in an essay. He reflected, "God remains calm and does His work."

Adolf Hitler is credited with saying: "By means of shrewd lies, unremittingly repeated, it is possible to make people believe that heaven is hell-and hell heaven. 


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New Blood Clot Drug Evaluated

The FDA has accepted the marketing application of a new blood clot medication named vorapaxar. This medication appears to have enough support to be approved by the FDA to help prevent heart attacks and strokes in those who have already experienced a heart attack. There is caution regarding the use of this medication by those who have had a stroke, because it may increase the risk of bleeding. Vorapaxar works differently from standard blood clot medications on the market. It is reported to bind very strongly to a particular section of the platelets. This action blocks the early effects of clot formation. In the body, blood clots to help prevent excessive bleeding that could be life-threatening. However, when blood clots form in certain organs like the heart, brain, leg veins, and lungs, it can become extremely dangerous and immediate medical supervision is often necessary. Certain conditions may cause an increased risk of getting blood clots, such as an abnormal heart rhythm, obesity, high cholesterol, pregnancy, smoking, and certain drugs like oral contraceptives.


