Hall, who has served as county judge since 1997, said it has always been his pleasure to serve, but it was time to let it be known.


"It's that time in my life," he told commissioners during their regular meeting.

an increase of 18.14 percent over the same period in 2012 when \$26,327.62 was collected.

Clarendon is now up 24.41 percent for the calendar yearto-date with total sales tax revenue of \$341,422.30 compared to \$274,415.32 at this point last year.

Hedley was up 57.46 percent for the month at \$274.90 and is now ahead 35.53 percent on the year-to-date at \$5,469.57.

Howardwick was down 5.29 percent this month with collections of \$1,472.69 but remained slightly ahead for the year, up 2.82 percent at \$14,533.42.

Combs said statewide sales tax revenue in September was \$2.01 billion, up 2.7 percent compared to September 2012.

"State sales tax revenue collections continued to grow at a moderate pace," Combs said. "Growth was led by collections from the construction, telecommunications and retail sectors. State sales tax revenue has now increased for 42 consecutive months."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in August.

Panhandle veterans take honor flight to DC

Two Donley County men were among several Texas Panhandle veterans recently who were able to see firsthand just how appreciated they are for their service to America

In September, an Honor Flight made up of area veterans made the trip with family members to Washington, DC, to lay wreaths at war memorials, fellowship, swap war stories, and make new friends. Among those honored veterans were Joe Robinson and Bufford Holland of Donley County, both of whom fought in World War II. The trip was made possible through America Supports You trip. Texas, an organization committed to supporting American troops currently serving in the military and military veterans. The organization spends time throughout the year raising money for honor flights, which are designed to take veterans on a trip to Washington, DC, to visit the war memorials there and enjoy the camaraderie of other veterans. Government waste stifles the world

The International Monetary Fund announced this past week that it expects world GDP growth to be only 2.9 percent this year. This is below the 3.2 percent in 2012, which was below the 30-year average of about 3.6 percent, and far below the one-of-the-best recent four-year periods, from 2004 to 2007, when it averaged 5.1 percent. The differences may seem small, but the rate of GDP growth determines how quickly global poverty declines and real incomes rise.

From the end of the recession in 2009, real economic growth in the United States has averaged less than 2 percent, which means that it will take around 35 years for real income to double. Contrast this performance with the last four years of President Clinton's administration and the four years under President Reagan after the end of the 1981-82 recession, when growth averaged more than 4 percent per year. If those rates had been sustained, real incomes would have doubled in a mere 17 years. The Chinese have been doubling real incomes about every seven years because their growth rates have been ranging between 7 percent and 12 percent per year. Global economic growth was negative in 2009 because of the almost worldwide recession. It quickly bounced back to 5.2 percent in 2010 as would be expected - but the sharp decline in the past two years is disturbing. Coming off a recession, growth rates normally are higher than average for several years, but not this time. In America, and now in most of the rest of world, people naturally assume that they are going to live better than their parents; but until the beginning of the Industrial Revolution less than 250 years ago, this was not true for most of mankind. The only way one could expect to get richer was if someone else got poorer ---and so deep was that mindset we still see the remnants in those who have socialist leanings today. It was not until the later part of the 19th century that the average European city dweller lived better than those who lived in Rome 1800 years earlier. It has only been a few decades since much of Asia has enjoyed sustained real economic growth, and less than two decades since much of Africa has been on a growth path. So, looking into the reasons for the current slowdown in economic growth is much more than an academic curiosity, because slower growth means more people with inadequate food and shelter and with lack of real opportunity.

Fear and loathing in the Tea Party

I often wonder about what Dr. Hunter S. Thompson, one of my favorite journalists, would have to say about the tea party types if he were still alive today. When it came to journalism, Hunter was not shy about putting forth unpopular articles, especially if they rang true, and he felt like the reading public needed to know something, even if it made them uncomfortable. The same could be said of Mike Royko, of Chicago Sun-Times and Chicago Tribune fame.

We need them today, to make it perfectly clear that you when it comes to tea party types, you can't fix stupid. Actually, I've long suspected that the tea party types are a clear and present danger to American economic prosperity. They are simply concerned about lowering their taxes, cutting business regulation, and destroying as much of the government as they can. They do this without regard, or concern, about what is best for the rest of America. Make no mistake about it, given the chance, the right wing (Tea Party) of the Republican Party will drastically cut Social Security of Medicare. The tea party movements around the country are primarily funded by enormously wealthy individuals. Wall Street, hedge fund operators like J.W. Childs, James Simons, and Robert Arnott are among the chief contributors to these tea party groups, which actually think they are a grass roots movement, but are really honest folks who are being manipulated by the super rich. Most of these funders (the Koch brothers) espouse an extreme libertarianism. These wealthy men stand to benefit enormously from the kind of drastic reduction in government regulations and taxes that the tea party groups and their candidates advocate. These are the same type of predatory industrialists that President Theodore Roosevelt had to deal with.

libertarianism. They are "champions of economic freedom" who are for "limited government," primarily so they will be able to gouge the American consumer and rape the environment.

Here it is, the 15th of October and our Legislative and Executive Branches of government are still dysfunctional, at the peril of the total destruction of the American economy. You don't think so? Go ask a banker about what would happen if the full faith and credit of the United States was besmirched. All of them need to be taken out and horse whipped. If I was younger and still coordinated, I'd do the whipping myself. This includes the president, who has lost all credibility. Of course both houses of Congress never had any credibility to begin with and have now lost what they never had.

However, the question then becomes what would be the Republican base? How would Republicans win elections? Are there enough rational Republicans to make up for the loss of the radical ones? Not likely.


Why is this so, because the American tea party jihadists have taken over the Republican Party and refuse to negotiate or compromise? 
government spending growing faster than the private sector in much of the world, mounting environmental and financial regulation whose costs far exceed the benefits, and monetary policies forcing misallocation of capital in the major economies.


Almost all of the developed countries are members of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), and with the exception of China, they account for most of the world's GDP. Government expenditures as a share of GDP declined in all but three OECD countries between 1995 and 2006. This period was associated with an increase in growth in most of the developed and developing countries. After 2007, average real government spending as a percentage of real GDP rose sharply in the OECD countries; and even though it has dropped back some, it is still well above the earlier level.

Bigger government has not led to higher growth and more employment as those of the left continue to preach. In fact, just the opposite has occurred, because all too much of government spending wastes resources and discourages productive economic activity.

Extreme environmental regulation in Europe has led to a sharp increase in energy prices, causing Europeans to pay two to three times as much for electricity as Americans. High energy prices have led to lower growth, more unemployment and virtually no environmental benefit. The Obama administration, having learned nothing from the European experience, is pushing these same destructive environmental policies in the U.S. The new financial regulations spewing from the U.S. and Europe have reduced crossborder investment, thus misallocating capital from its highest and best use. Most of these regulations have not even met elementary cost-benefit tests.

The majority of the world's currencies are tied directly or indirectly to the U.S. dollar, the euro or the Japanese yen. During the past five years, all three central banks that manage these currencies have engaged in policies that keep interest rates at artificially low levels, which become, in effect, a tax on savers. The central banks are engaged in capital allocation where governments and large businesses get cheap money, which encourages them to misspend. At the same time, small and entrepreneurial businesses, which are major job creators, are starved for capital. The reasons for the global economic slowdown are not hard to understand, and the solutions are obvious. The tragedy of our time is that most of the global political leaders have a narrow and short-term outlook, where they seek to maximize their own power at the expense of the governed. The solution to that problem is not so obvious.







Steroid Nasal Spray May Soon Be OTC

An FDA advisory panel recently voted that triamcinolone acetonide nasal spray (Nasacort AQ) can be used safely without a prescription, thereby making it an over-the-counter (OTC) medication. Nasacort AQ is a nasal spray that contains corticosteroids to primarily help reduce nasal passageway swelling associated with seasonal allergies. If the FDA approves, this will be the first corticosteroid nasal spray available over the counter in the United States. A concern that was brought up by some panel members included the lack of adequate safety information about the possible use of Nasacort AQ in children. A warning on the label may be related to potential risks for children. Corticosteroids can be used in many different forms to help reduce swelling and inflammation. This medication can cause many bothersome side effects such as upset stomach, high blood sugar, high blood pressure, mood swings, hunger, and difficulty with falling asleep. Corticosteroids may negatively impact disease states such as diabetes, heart failure, high blood pressure, and kidney disease.





*March 12, 2013, employee of Midnight Rodeo in Amarillo shot in back. March 25th, gunshots were fired in the parking lot of Midnight Rodeo. An arrest was made with the shooter and there were underage drinkers involved. April, 2013, two people are shot, one dies at Rounders Club in Amarillo. Records show that 40 calls to police over the last 3 years at this establishment alone for: disorderly conduct ranging from fighting, assault with deadly weapon, shooting, etc. July 2010, Shooting at Sorority House nightclub. Fighting led to police called and 17 year old (underage drinking) waving a gun at police until shot 4 times in parking lot. Neighbor told reporters they were scared to live near there as there is fighting and shooting frequently. Records show that from January to July at this establishment there were 20 calls for the police.

Sept. 14, 2012, four were arrested at Tatum's Night Club. Police were attacked and a riot ensued. Many officers were struck until riot was put down. August 12th, 2013, police respond to a call from Las Chakalozas Night Club. Two men were beaten, one of them died. August 2011, police were called to Wild West Tejano Club. A fight was in progress during the call. One of the men leave the scene, thought to be carrying a gun. Later the man was picked up with 3 bags of Ice (illegal drugs) and a pistol.

I could have gone on and on. These are facts, not innuendo. You can Google this, call the police station in Amarillo as I did, go on news' outlet sites, online, and get tons more of this garbage. And, this is what you want in Clarendon? God help Butch and all of his deputies who will have to put their lives in danger for a few to have a drink. I beg someone to defend this in print, don't cower in the shadows. Let your voice be heard! Even better, maybe some of the proponents of this will ride with Butch and Randy or others when they respond to "shots fired" at one of our new bars. Sarcasm, you bet! I don't want to attend a funeral or go to visit folks at the hospital who are innocently hurt or just doing their job. Remember this, most of the shootings take place in the parking lots. Bullets don't have GPS and don't care who they hit. Now, if you believe that you can defend this and that the Lord is ok with it, you're fooling yourself. You didn't read about fights, assaults, or shootings in Fred's commentary on the Lord attending a wedding feast, did you? Folks do what's right for your community and your own loved ones. 
Hedley Owls shred Kress Kanagroos
