
"I'm excited to get there and get started," Riza said.

The in-coming president said several factors attracted him to Clarendon, specifically the college's reputation.







ests have long feared that if the federal agency decides to list the bird as "threatened," their activities would be limited on the millions of acres across the American West on which the prairie chicken roams. But now that the federal government has officially endorsed a conservation plan, known as the Range Wide Plan, many hope any effects will be minimal and easy to manage.

Under the plan, anyone whose activities might harm the prairie chicken's grassland habitat - namely oil and gas drillers, utilities or pipeline companies - could pay other landowners to conserve the habitat they own,

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his theology if he is going to call me a blasphemer. The biblical definition of

blasphemer is much different that the dictionary definition. For a moment there, I thought I was in some sort of space, time warp in which I was actually conversing with a Jewish Pharisee. system, I feel much better and am ready to point out that alcohol consumption is usually a pleasant endeavor, filled with joyous good cheer, and pleasant conversation. People drink for a reason.

To put this in perspective, if

Clarendon could increase its sales tax revenue just ten percent over 2012's total, it would be a net gain of \$33,594.74. For that to happen, local merchants and restaurants would have to see higher sales of more than \$1.7 million. But maybe our sales tax revenue only goes up three percent, and the city nets just over \$10,000. Even that would take an extra half a million dollars in sales. Wouldn't that be nice?

And as for crime, one study of Angelina County in East Texas could find no correlation in DWI statistics as the county went from "dry" to "wet" because it was "functionally wet" already since residents only had to make a 10 to 15 minute "trip to the river" to get alcohol.

That's our situation. Alcohol is in Donley County, and it will still be in our midst regardless of the vote. The only difference is in where it's available and who gets the economic benefit.

At the end of the day, it is about rights and responsibilities, actions and consequences, and jobs and revenue. And for some people it's a moral question.

No matter which side you are on in this issue, you need to vote. Don't get mad at the results of the election if you didn't go to the ballot box to make your voice heard. This is your opportunity, so make the most of it.

Meanwhile...

Donley County voters have several other choices on the ballot besides the alcohol question. Nine amendments have been proposed to the Texas Constitution, and many people have no idea what they're being asked to vote on. So here is the Enterprise voter's primer on the subject. Feel free to disagree.

Amendment No. 1: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in

Clarendon as it now is.

Granted, I'm not sure about the three who tarried - those three "winos" who were discovered sleeping in Claude's nice city park. That sure won't happen here, lest those who sleep it off in our park end up with a backside full of goat heads and grass burrs. Anyway, as usual, I digress.

Back to the less civil and cordial discussion of the issues. Last week, while seeking sober solace from the trials of the world at a local establishment, I was actually verbally accosted by a person whom I had always assumed was a good, level-headed man. Our recommendation: Vote no. Too many exemptions are already in place for property taxes.

Amendment No. 2: The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational.

Our recommendation: Vote Yes, unless you like obsolete requirements.

Amendment No. 3: The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.

Our recommendation: Vote Yes. It would seem to be a rare circumstance and control is left to local officials.

Amendment No. 4: The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization.

Our recommendation: Vote No. Too many exemptions are already in place for property taxes.

Amendment No. 5: The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan.

Our recommendation: Vote No. Too much opportunity for scammers.

Amendment No. 6: The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

Our recommendation: Vote Yes. Texas needs water, and this measure has enjoyed bi-partisan support.

Our recommendation: Vote Yes. If Hidalgo County wants a hospital district, let them have one.

Amendment No. 9: The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.

Our recommendation: Vote Yes. Let's have more options to hold judges accountable.



New Diabetes Drug Shows Promise

A recent international clinical study released early results showing that a new add-on medication to those with uncontrolled type 2 diabetes is promising. The findings come after six months of use. Empagliflozin was added as the third diabetes drug for type 2 diabetics who were already taking metformin (Glucophage) and a sulfonylurea type drug. In this group, the blood sugars, total body weight, and blood pressure were all significantly lower than they were in the group that was not getting Empagliflozin. This medication works in a unique way. It blocks the sodium glucose transporter in the kidney to remove extra glucose through the urine. It was well-tolerated. The most reported adverse effect was urinary tract infections in some individuals. Type 2 diabetes is a chronic condition characterized by high blood sugar levels. Insulin is not released properly from the pancreas to clear the high blood sugar that remains in the blood after a meal. If blood sugar is not lowered to a normal level, severe complications may occur such as blood clots, kidney disease, stroke, heart disease, and nerve damage.
