## Jeffers, Burrow win city vote

Three new members will soon join the Clarendon Board of Aldermen following Tuesday's election.

Larry Jeffers and Beverly Burrow were the top vote getters in a field of three candidates vying for two terms that expire next May. Jeffers got 414 votes, and Burrow received 270. Wayne Cole came in third with 227 votes.

Doug Kidd received 497 votes and was unopposed for the term that expires in May 2015.

The Donley County Commissioners' will canvass the election results November 15, and the new aldermen will be sworn in at a later meeting.

Filing begins Saturday, November 9, for people interested in running for county or state offices in the 2014 March primaries. The final day to file is December 9

# aldermen sue Hicks

A lawsuit filed in district court by three former members of the Clarendon Board of Aldermen last week seeks to remove Mayor Larry Hicks for official misconduct.

The suit was brought last Friday, November 1, by Debbie Roberts-Hillis, Jesus Hernandez, and Tommy N. Hill and names Hicks as the sole defendant. The plaintiffs are asking the court to remove Hicks from office and order him to pay their costs of the suit.

The filing lists several complaints against Hicks, but the suit calls the "most egregious" action of misconduct when Hicks on September 17 of this year allegedly threatened to have Hernandez arrested if he did not attend a board meeting.

The suit also says Hicks acted without board approval when he damaged rented equipment while demolishing and burying an old water tank and says he acted without board approval in installing an exterior elevator at City Hall. Both of those actions occurred in 2012.

The suit claims Hicks in September 2013 also acted unilaterally to purchase a new lawnmower for the city with funds appropriated for summer employment and claims he gave employee raises without approval. The suit also alleges that Hicks "on or about 2012 or 2013" appointed a funds investment officer and emergency management coordinator without board approval.

Hicks has less than three weeks to file an answer to these complaints with the court.

Roberts-Hillis and Hernandez both resigned from the board in June. Hill's term as alderman expired in May, and he lost his election bid that month to unseat Hicks as mayor.

## Two charged with attacking local woman

A Clarendon woman was severely beaten and stabbed after she was allegedly assaulted by two men early Sunday morning, November 3.

Donley County Sheriff Butch Blackburn said the 17-year-old was walking home from a birthday party when she was attacked in a vacant lot near the North Ward Park and beaten and stabbed in the neck.

Social media sources identified the victim as Shantel Harris.

The woman identified her attackers as Devonte Hardaway, age 20, of Clarendon and Tyler Lee Smith, age 19, of Memphis.

The victim was transported to Amarillo and stabilized before being transferred to a Lubbock hospital for surgery, Blackburn said.

Hardaway was arrested, and Smith turned himself in. Both were charged with Aggravated Assault and with bond set at \$50,000 each.

Friends of Harris have set up a fund for her at Pilgrim Bank to help with her medical and other expenses following the attack.

# The vote is in, time for us to move forward

A new era in the history of Donley County began Tuesday night when voters set aside 111 years of history and legalized the sale of all alcoholic beverages.

The 597-501 election wasn't a blowout by any means. The final tally showed a 96 vote margin of victory and translated into a little more than 54 percent approval. In fact, about 53 percent of registered voters apparently didn't care about the alcohol issue one

way or the other because they didn't vote. Still a win is a win.

So what's next? Earlier this year, this column printed a series of installments on "The Way Forward," a collection of visions, ideas, and principles to move Clarendon and Donley County ahead in a broad number of categories. Sup-

porters of the alcohol measure would probably agree that its passage is an opportunity for our community to move forward on a number of fronts.

First and foremost would be economic opportunities that will allow expansion of current businesses and possibly attraction of new businesses. We can't make this happen, but by removing the barrier of prohibition we've at least made it possible. It is now up to the private sector to take advantage of that opportunity or not.

Secondly, there is an opportunity for increased tax revenues. How much that generates remains to be seen and is dependent heavily on how many people take advantage of the aforementioned economic opportunities. Increased business also isn't just about tax receipts. It's about more job opportunities, more development, more choices for consumers, and more money circulating in our local economy.

The third opportunity is for sponsorships from the makers and distributors of alcoholic beverages. There is no way of knowing how much this could amount to for local events and organizations. But if it amounts to anything, that's a step up of what it was before Tuesday's election, which was nothing.

The fourth opportunity is intangible – quality of life. Some people, including your editor, enjoy an occasional adult beverage with a meal at a restaurant, and they place a value on being able to enjoy that pleasure. No one wants to force anyone to drink who doesn't want to, but they want the right to enjoy a drink like a responsible adult without having to drive an hour from their home to do so.


The ability to sell alcoholic beverages can be a tool in economic development. It is not a cure-all, and by itself it won't transform Clarendon. It does, however, open doors and gives us a chance to try some new things.

There can be no doubt that opponents of Tuesday's measure have strong feelings and thoughts about alcohol. But the beauty of our system is that we can work through these differences and come to a conclusion at the ballot box. Not everyone will be happy with it, but we'll learn to live with it and continue to be a community that cares for one another.

With three new city aldermen coming onboard later this month, now is a good time for the community to rally together, put bitterness aside, and focus on what we can do that is positive. While the alcohol issue may have split some people, it united others in a common cause for a time. The Mulkey Theatre, which no doubt has a few naysayers, is another example of the community coming together to accomplish a great thing earlier this year.

There is no end to what Clarendon and Donley County could be, but we have to want it. We have to move past hurt feelings or hand wringing and see what good can be accomplished. We have so many opportunities. We just need to grab them and move ahead.





# The people have spoken - loudly

In most off-year elections, when most state and federal elections are absent, the voter turnout is paltry. This isn't the case in Donley County this year. The early voting is complete, and over 700 people have cast their early ballots, a remarkable feat since almost one-third of the registered voters in Donley County have already voted. At this writing Tuesday afternoon, voters are currently going to the polls to decide two really important elections and a few ho-hum, house-keeping type decisions that need to be made on the Texas Constitution.


Hopefully, everyone who possesses the sacred privilege of voting has done their civic duty and voted. It's important that everyone's voice be heard, regardless of their position. The liquor election is important, but the election of new city aldermen is perhaps even more important. We need for good citizens to step-up and help guide our town into a new period of economic prosperity and promise. As far as I can surmise, all the candidates for city aldermen are good, intelligent people who have answered the call of service. They should receive our respect and admiration simply by being willing to serve, regardless of who is elected.

Of course, plenty has been said about the liquor question, along with an unfortunate amount of name calling and other disparaging remarks that were crass and lacked class. Regardless of which side wins, the issue will be solved.

Which brings me to another question: Why do we hold our elections on the first Tuesday in November? Turnout would probably be much better if we held elections on Saturdays, when most people are off work, the crops are in, and most of our yard work is done for the year. If we moved Election Day to a Saturday, weekend turnout would probably be much better, which is important.

Back in the 1840s, farmers needed to travel to cast their ballots at the polls, which were located in the county seats, and usually required an overnight trip. Of course, they didn't want to interfere with their religious meetings and responsibilities, so they scheduled their travel day for Monday, the day after church, and arrived at the county seat on Tues-

day. Yet, over 150 years later Election Day remains on Tuesday, and it now takes the farmers about an hour, at most, to get to the polls.

Or, we could follow the example of folks down under, who fine voters who don't vote. If we don't show-up for jury duty, the judges can toss our behinds in jail for skipping our civic responsibility. Why not voting? Isn't voting as important as a jury of our peers to democracy? If folks don't show up to vote, let the judges' fine 'em or toss 'em in jail for a day or two. That would certainly shore up the needed voter participation to insure a healthy democracy. Of course, then you'll have to ask the touchy questions about whether or not coerced democracy is actually democracy. I'll leave that can of worms for Roger and his libertarians to sort out.

This brings me to yet another election question, namely: term limits. Forget term limits for our representatives, governors, and senators, etc., both state and federal. If they can get re-elected, let 'em keep their jobs. That way, they will not be wasting brain cells and time laying the ground work for their next jobs - as lobbyists. They can focus on doing the people's business and forget about what they are going to have to do when their term limit expires. After all, most of them are unsuitable for gainful employment after serving "their constituents" back home.

Instead, have term limits for the Supreme Court justices. Give them one term of 18 to 20 years, and stagger them so that the presidents would consider nominating older justices, who usually have more wisdom and judgment. Right now, the emphasis is on nominating younger justices, who can influence our


society much longer than older justices, who are apt to die or become disabled. If both parties believed that they would get a fair shake when it comes to nominating Supreme Court justices, perhaps a little of the ptomaine poisoning would leech out of the current political discourse.

We can also take the political parties out of elections by instituting open primaries, which would allow anybody to vote for any candidate, regardless of party. Set it up to where the top two vote-getters run against each other in the general election - even if they are from the same party. The Californicators are now doing it this way, with good results. As a matter of fact, their legislature has become less partisan, and who knows, perhaps they are even more productive. Perhaps similar reforms at the federal level would produce similar results.

Also, let's do all we can to encourage the return of the small political donors. The financial power of big money, Wall Street, and other industrialists has completely snatched away the political voice of the people. The super PACs are a bane to society, spending billions of dollars to insure their voice alone is heard. Creating a political system that welcomes small donors offers more diversity, increased participation, and greater visibility of the small donors to the politicians who profess to represent them.

Finally, let's get rid of gerrymandering, a truly disgusting and unfair power grab by the political party that happens to be ascendant when the latest US Census numbers are counted and revealed. Few election campaigns or even excellent candidates can effectively combat gerrymandering. Our latest political mess was mostly created by the Tea Party Republicans, and is a direct result of gerrymandering. To add insult to injury, most Americans - including most Texans - disagree with their agendas. Gerrymandering only strengthens radical districts and makes it much more difficult to get rational political candidates elected.

In this era of political dysfunction we have an opportunity to fix the current electoral system. What is holding us back?

# Website may not work, but NSA does

When it comes to Healthcare.gov, President Obama and his minions look like the gang that couldn't code straight. But don't fear for American ingenuity: Other parts of the federal government remain capable of tremendous technological feats.

In one month in late 2012, for instance, the National Security Agency quietly sucked up data on some 60 million phone calls in Spain, and the agency has had a tap on German chancellor Angela Merkel's cellphone for years now — all without alerting Obama.

That's what NSA officials told the Wall Street Journal, anyway: The agency "has so many eavesdropping operations under way that it wouldn't have been practical to have briefed him on all of them.'

"These decisions are made at the NSA," a "senior U.S. official" said.

Ordinarily, I wouldn't take the NSA or the president at their word, but I find this denial fairly plausible. Our post-9/11 surveillance state has grown increasingly inscrutable, expensive and out of control.

As the Washington Post's Dana Priest and William Arkin document in their book, "Top Secret America: The Rise of the New American Security State," since 9/11, Americans "have shelled out hundreds of billions dollars to turn the machine of government over to defeating terrorism without ever really

questioning what they were getting for their money."

Answers are hard to come by, because the "intelligence-industrial complex" operates behind a veil of secrecy, and because, even at the top, "the officials themselves don't actually know."

"I'm going to be honest, I don't know how many products we produce," a top intel official admitted to Priest, noting that projects he'd deemed useless lumber on: "Like a zombie, it keeps on living,' the official chuckled."

"There's only one entity in the entire universe that has visibility on all SAPs [Special Access Programs] that's God," Director of National Intelligence James R. Clapper told Priest. (And, despite what you sometimes hear on MSNBC, Obama is not God.)

Meanwhile, the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court has just reauthorized the continuing bulk collection of hundreds of millions of law-abiding Americans' calling records — a serious privacy risk given how revealing mass metadata can be.

On "Meet the Press" on Sunday, New York Republican Rep. Peter King, a serial defender of federal spying, insisted that Obama "should stop apologizing," because "the NSA has saved thousands of lives, not just in the United States, but in France, Germany and throughout Europe."

Europe aside, the claim that the

NSA has saved "thousands of lives" in the U.S. is almost certainly false. In a valuable analysis, ProPublica looks at NSA defenders' talking point that "at least 50" terrorist plots have been thwarted thanks to the disputed programs. "There's no evidence that the oft-cited figure is accurate," ProPublica concluded.

The NSA has released information on only four of the 54 cases. They include a Somali-American cab driver convicted of sending \$8,500 to the Somalian terror group al Shabbab and a plot to attack a Danish newspaper (actually foiled by a tip from British intelligence).

Another case, which an FBI official ominously described as "nascent plotting to bomb the New York Stock Exchange," involved three Muslim-American wannabe jihadis who sent thousands of dollars to al Qaeda contacts in Yemen who "may have been scamming [them]."

The "plot" consisted of a one-page report containing "public information easily available from Google Earth, tourist maps and brochures" — the plotter's "contact in Yemen 'tore up the report,' 'threw it in the street,' and never showed it to anyone."

Is this the best they've got? If so, it's not nearly enough.



## Clarendon Church of Christ IN SEASON AND OUT OF SEASON

Not quite 20 years ago, the alcohol proposition wouldn't have stood a chance of passing. At the time of writing this article, no one knows the outcome of the vote. I do know some have fought the good fight. Many on both sides have gone to the polls. Some went to the polls but kept their own counsel and remained quiet. Sadly, many religious people came to me and said their pulpits and church leaders remained silent. This wouldn't have happened just a few years ago. What has changed? The same reason we have a government that is dysfunctional and more socialistic than ever. Whatever you think of Rush Limbaugh, he made a very astute comment right before the presidential election of 2012. He basically said that we, as a nation, could survive 4 more years of Obama, but couldn't survive if the nation was at the point that it would vote for such a man twice. I think that on a community level you've seen that play out in the alcohol debate.

I and others were accused of being alarmists. I was accused of playing "twister" with the scriptures because I don't agree that the Bible only condemns drunkenness. I'll prove that with a couple of scriptures, but it won't matter to those who don't want it to be so. First: 1Peter 4:3 "For we have spent enough of our past lifetime in doing the will of the Gentiles--when we walked in lewdness, lusts, drunkenness, revelries, drinking parties, and abominable idolatries." Please go do a word study on the three words: drunkenness, revelries, and drinking parties. I don't know why a high school educated person would need to, but for some, please go to some other sources. Second: (Galatians 5:19-21) "Now the works of the flesh are evident, which are: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lewdness, idolatry, sorcery, hatred, contentions, jealousies, outbursts of wrath, selfish ambitions, dissensions, heresies, envy, murders, drunkenness, revelries, and the like; of which I tell you beforehand, just as I also told you in time past, that those who practice such things will not inherit the kingdom of God." Once again, another apostle, same message. Drunkenness is condemned as is revelries and the like. Revelries translated by many dictionaries especially when translating the word from its Greek counterpart means: Festivities or parties involving alcohol (often large amounts). So, I stand by the Bible when I say that drinking alcohol in a manner that doesn't involve medicinal purposes is wrong. And, just because someone wants to believe Jesus was at a "drinking party" after a wedding doesn't make it so. Just because some want to believe that Jesus made even more alcohol when the people at the party were already allegedly "festive" or "lit" or whatever adjective you want to put with it, doesn't

make it so. Jesus would have sinned in doing those things. Years ago, all the ministers knew what I'm talking about. Many still do. But they've remained quiet, some anyway. Why? (2 Timothy 4:1-3) "I charge you therefore before God and the Lord Jesus Christ, who will judge the living and the dead at His appearing and His kingdom: Preach the word! Be ready in season and out of season. Convince, rebuke, exhort, with all longsuffering and teaching. For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine, but according to their own desires, because they have itching ears, they will heap up for themselves teachers;" The preaching in the world we live in has definitely not been "in season and out of season." It's only been "in season." People will lose their positions if they preach too much truth. I'll use the concept behind what Rush said and say this: Clarendon will survive with beer joints, dives, and bars. How long can we survive IF our citizenry changed so much in such a short time? How long can we survive if the "guard dogs" of the churches will not bark anymore?

## **Judicial District Court** convicts Pampa man

The 100th Judicial District Court met in Panhandle on October 22 and heard one Donley County related case.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Willie Ballard, a 41-year-old resident of Pampa, pleaded true to allegations listed in the State's Motion to Adjudicate and was convicted and sentenced to nine months in the State Jail Division of the TDCJ.

On February 25, 2009, Ballard originally pleaded guilty to the state jail felony offense of forgery that occurred on September 19, 2007, in Donley County.

The State filed the motion to adjudicate on August 8, 2012, alleging five violations of community supervision.

Ballard pleaded true to the violations contained in the State's motion and was sentenced to nine months. Ballard is also required to pay \$390 in court costs to Donley County, a \$1,000 fine, and \$130 restitution.
