An election to raise property taxes may be on the horizon following last Thursday's regular meeting of the Clarendon ISD Board

Facing a projected budget deficit of \$358,000, trustees acted on Superintendent Monty Hysinger's recommendation and froze salaries for district employees and unofficially gave the administration the okay to pursue a timeframe for a June tax ratification

The election is just a proposal at this time; but if pursued and approved, Clarendon's school taxes would increase 13 cents from the current state cap of \$1.04 per \$100 valuation to \$1.17.

Hysinger said the problem is twofold state funding cuts and declining enrollment.

Second Stroke Prevention: New Approach

Researchers in China may have found a solution that may reduce second strokes after a person has had a minor stroke. Currently, the risk of having a second stroke after a minor one may occur within up to three months of having the first stroke. Many doctors advise the taking of aspirin everyday to help prevent a second stroke from happening. The results of a clinical trial in China shows that having a second stroke may occur less in people who take clopidogrel (Plavix) in addition to aspirin than taking aspirin only. These results may change the traditional method of care for those who suffered a minor stroke. There is ongoing research in the United States to help confirm or deny these findings.

Aspirin helps prevent platelets from sticking together which may lead to a blood clot. Plavix also helps prevent platelets from sticking together by blocking a chemical that causes platelets to clump together. Genetic testing may be performed before a person starts Plavix to ensure that the medication will work properly. Both of these medications can cause bleeding inside
