#### 2013 property taxes are due in January

The Donley Appraisal District is reminding those who have not paid their 2013 taxes that those taxes are due this month.

Statements were mailed last Tuesday to taxpayers still owing 2013 taxes.

Taxes not paid on or before January 31 will incur penalty and interest of 7 percent if paid in February. The amount increases each month thereafter until the tax is paid. Accounts unpaid on July 1 will incur an additional 20 percent collection penalty in addition to the regular penalty and interest of 18 percent. Texas state law prescribes the penalty and interest amounts.

Delinquent notices will be mailed in May to those who still owe 2013 tax at that time. Partial payments will be accepted.

Taxes are payable to the Donley Appraisal District, PO Box 1220, Clarendon TX 79226.

#### City experiences brief power outage

Electric power service to Clarendon and nearby communities was disrupted briefly last Tuesday, January 14.

AEP/Southwestern Electric Power Co. spokesman Tony Barley said the outage was due to maintenance that needed be performed by Xcel Energy north of Jericho.

Xcel, which interconnects with AEP/SWEPCO, found a transmission breaker that was low on gas and if the breaker tripped, they would not be able to close it back without a prolonged outage. It was determined that the best course of action was to take a short outage to allow Xcel to recharge their breaker.

Barley said SWEPCO normally has an alternate back-up feed from the east from Childress, but it had been taken off-line Monday for routine maintenance.

The outage lasted about 15 minutes and affected Hedley, Clarendon, Lelia Lake, and Howardwick.

"We tried to call as many critical customers as we could in the short time window that we had," Barley said. "SWEPCO is sorry for any inconvenience that this outage may have caused our customers."

## City should take its time on street plan

Life is often a matter of "hurry up and wait" with any number of subjects and in a wide array of circumstances. But in two issues currently before the Clarendon Board of Aldermen, city leaders need to both "hurry up" and "wait" but not at the same time.

Aldermen made good progress on an alcohol ordinance at last week's regular meeting, and board

members seemed to pretty well be in agreement when they adjourned. Now they are set to meet again next Tuesday to finalize the ordinance. As Clarendon Economic Development & Tourism Director Chandra Eggemeyer told the board, the sooner this is done, the sooner Clarendon will start seeing the benefit of last fall's election.

To put it more simply, every day a local store can't sell beer is a day they are losing money. City leaders need to forge ahead without delay next week, finish whatever rules they are going to adopt, and authorize City Hall to begin signing permit applica-

But on another issue - the pending street project, the city needs to take its time and act carefully. An alcohol ordinance can be amended in the future if needs to be, but street projects are long term investments. When done right – like our brick streets, they can serve the citizens for decades. When done wrong or hastily, citizens will likewise live with those decisions for a long time.

Any way you slice it, the street project has changed substantially from what former city administrator Lambert Little sold citizens when they voted. At that time there was no talk of narrowing streets, but now that's what the plan calls for - reducing streets to 32 feet across mostly bordered by ribbons of concrete known as "rollover" curbs as opposed to full curb and gutter that we saw in the last project seven years ago.

Narrowing the streets is always done as a costsaving measure, but city officials need to consider what that's going to look like and exactly what the plan is. In the case of Third Street, the plan is to essentially ignore up to eight feet of currently paved street that will be behind the new rollover curb. People will still be able to park there, and the city will repave that area "later." Unfortunately, "later" has a habit of never getting here.

In the last project, the city was going to go back and tie in cross streets like Allen, Sims, and others that were eliminated from the last plan to save money. That isn't on the drawing board. We were also going to see Seventh and Fourth streets from Koogle going east paved. That isn't being talked about. "Later" means "probably never." If a future city council has an extra \$50,000 to spend ten years from now, they aren't likely to spend it behind a curb where someone is parking. Why not just keep the streets wider today and allow enough room to park on both sides of the street?

The city engineer admitted last week that he has never seen another city do what Clarendon is planning to do. We therefore have no idea what this is going to look like, but we can be sure that it won't a proper street that might be seen in other communities.

Third Street in particular, again, is a major thoroughfare for local people and visitors to our city that connects downtown with Bronco Stadium and our beautiful college campus. When paved, it needs to be nothing less than professional and a source of pride.

The city also needs to think about timing. We've seen what a disaster occurred when the water and sewer project was going on during football season. It was a muddy, sloppy, embarrassing mess. And that will look like a walk in the park compared to what might happen if the street project isn't finished before school starts.

City crews are intended to do all the dirt work for the curbing and all the base work for the streets. Our city workers have plenty to do without being tasked with staying ahead of a paving contractor, who could probably more efficiently do the job themselves. This isn't to say our guys aren't capable of doing base work. It's simply pointing out that they already have fulltime jobs to do.

What thought, if any, has been given to how this project will impact activity around the ballparks this summer? What thought, if any, has been given to making sure this project is over and done with before school starts this fall so that we avoid the congestion and mess at Clarendon ISD that we've seen this school year?

And then there remains the idea of seal coating Clarendon Avenue and Regents Avenue on the college campus. How will the city time its work so that it doesn't interfere with activities at the college this summer or, heaven help us, after classes start in the fall? All of Donley County pays taxes to Clarendon College to keep up maintenance on college property. The estimated \$50,000 the city proposes to spend on the college campus is really and truly needed elsewhere to make sure that city streets are paved in the same professional manner that we see with the college streets.

The Board of Aldermen needs to takes its time on this. Ask the right questions. Get satisfactory answers, and above all, don't be rushed. Clarendon will live with these streets for a long time. Let's make sure we're happy with what we're getting and not just "poor boy" this deal for expediency and the sake of saving a buck.

## Trend of rich getting richer continues

For many years I had the pleasure of working closely with some very talented people, people who have achieved the pinnacle of success in their various fields of endeavor. These people, Robert and Kim Kiyosaki of Rich Dad Poor Dad fame, Mark Victor Hansen and Jack Canfield of Chicken Soup for the Soul, and even the Donald (Trump), all made basically the same claim. The first responsibility of the President of the United States is to help the rich get richer.

They never backed off this outrageous claim. Almost as importantly, they also claimed that the role of the Congress is much the same, to help the rich grow richer. If you look carefully at the record for the last hundred plus years, there seems to be a lot of truth in their claims. Going back to the days of one of my favorite Republican presidents, Theodore Roosevelt, it is possible to see how easily the rich are able to manipulate the system to enrich themselves at the expense of the middle and lower classes.

Right here, right now, American financial inequality is growing worse and does not appear to be growing weaker anytime soon, at least with the current president and Congress. Since I graduated from college in the early 1970s, real wages for the bottom half of the work force have remained flat or decreased slightly, while the incomes of the top one percent have almost quadrupled (outrageously, the incomes of the top 0.1 percent have risen even more.) We desperately need to have a serious debate about this horrid state of affairs, yet the simple fact is - American capitalism as currently being practiced is now undermining the foundations of middleclass society. This is an absolute truth. Congress and the current administration

are destroying the middle class - period. They have been doing so for

over a century. Like it or not, class warfare in the **United States** is now in full bloom, and the plutocrats

are on the offensive and winning. The wealthy are not only lying about how well they are doing, they are outright fal sifying the data cover up their greed and avarice. They are even creating myths about why the rich deserve to be rich, even at the expense of the middle class.

The rich have a long history of intentionally carrying out a campaign of statistical concealment. Consider a recent article by the Wall Street Journal. In his column Bret Stephens wrongfully accused the president of making a factual error (of which he has made many). However, Mr. Stephens then proceeded to claim that our rising inequality was no big deal, because everyone has been making big gains. He even claimed that the bottom 20 percent of the U.S. population has risen by 186 percent since 1979. Well, folks this is an outright lie. If you find the inflation corrected number, which is in the same Census Record table; it shows that the incomes of the bottom 20 percent have actually fallen. Yet, the Wall Street Journal has not yet corrected this falsehood.

Unfortunately, many tea party types seem fixated on the notion that poverty is basically the result of character defects among the poor. This may have once contained a modicum of truth, but for

the past three decades or so, the main obstacle facing the poor has been the lack of jobs paying decent wages. So, ues, as does its counterpoint myth, that of a deserving rich.

affluent are rich because they made the right lifestyle choices. They got good educations; they got and stayed married, and were consistent in making good life choices. Basically, their wealth is a reward for following Victorian virtues.

So? What is wrong with this story? Well, for one thing it suggests opportunities that do not exist. For example, how are poor children, or children of the working class, supposed to get a good education in an era of declining support for and sharply rising tuition at public universities and even community colleges? The resulting lack of employment opportunities takes an enormous toll on family stability and values, driving the family into poverty.

Most importantly, this myth misidentifies the winners from growing inequality. White-collar professionals, even if married to other successful, white-collar professionals are only doing just okay. The really big winners are a much smaller group. The Occupy Wall Street movement gave rise to the concept of the "1 percent," which is a good name for the rising elite. Even so, like anything, if the top group includes too many people; the real elite have grown even smaller - the top 0.1 percent.

Who are these people? Mostly, they are executives of some type, most often financial executives. They did not get to where they are simply by being prudent, clean, and sober. They are the wolves of Wall Street.

# Drugs in the News

## New Treatment for Hepatitis C Approved

The FDA recently approved a new medication to help treat a chronic infection of the liver called Hepatitis C. Sofosbuvir (Sovaldi) is considered a "breakthrough" medication because, unlike other treatments for hepatitis C, it does not require additional interferon therapy to be administered at the same time. Interferon therapy has been the standard of care, but it is difficult to tolerate in many people. Sovaldi blocks the production of a specific protein that the virus needs in order to continue the infection. The safety and effectiveness of Sovaldi in combination with other antiviral medications have been demonstrated in six clinical trials in people who have never been treated for hepatitis C, those who did not respond to previous treatment and people who were infected with HIV and Hepatitis C. The results showed that hepatitis C infection was reduced in people who had taken the Sovaldi-containing medication regimens.

Hepatitis C is an infection of the liver that is caused by a virus which may lead to liver inflammation and failure. Some people may be infected for years before the virus is even detected.



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
