Hedley citizens selected three school board members and two city aldermen during elections last Saturday.

Mayor Leon Ward was unopposed and received 33 votes, and Aldermen Carrie Butler and Lonnie Roby were returned to office with 28 and 23 votes respectively. Challenger Diana Postma received seven votes.

Hedley School Trustee Ted Wright was re-elected with 47 votes, and he will be joined on the board by Holly McCleskey, who also had 47 votes, and Troy Monroe, who received 38 votes. Challenger Michelle McCann received 19 votes.

HISD will install trustees during their next meeting on May 19, and City Hall says its officials will be installed May 22.

CHS athletes in top ten at state

Three Clarendon High School athletes earned the right to compete in the State Track Meet in Austin last weekend, and they all represented their school and community well, finishing in the top ten of their events.

Charles Mason is the fifth best long jumper in the state as he went a distance of 21'51/4" on his second attempt. Track coach Johnny Nino had a lot of praise for the junior's comeback.

"I was very proud of what he accomplished this year and what he did at the meet this past weekend," Nino said. "He pulled his hamstring in the first meet of the year and didn't jump again until district."

Mason jumped over twenty-two feet earlier in the season that earned him the right to participate in the state meet.

Abby Johnson ran the 400meter dash and finished seventh with a time of 1:01.74. The first place time was just over fifty-eight seconds. Johnson is also a junior and will be back to try again next year.

Senior Sarah Luttrell has proved herself as a great sprinter throughout her high school career and competed in the 100-meter dash a state. Luttrell finished a respectable eighth place in that event with a time of 12.85. The winning time posted was 11.51.

Both Lady Broncos had a stellar year running track and competed in several other races, including relays. Luttrell has been instrumental in the Lady Broncos' success the last four years and will be greatly missed next year. Coach Alton Gaines realizes the impact both of these athletics have had on the track program.

Early vote in runoff starts on Monday

Donley County voters will go back to the polls soon to make a final decision on who will be the Republican nominee for County Judge.

Randy Bond and John Howard were the top two vote getters for that position during the March primary, but neither man got more than 50 percent of the total vote in that fourperson race.

Early voting by personal appearance will begin Monday, May 19, at the Donley County Courthouse Annex and continue through Friday, May 23. The Republican Runoff Election will be held Tuesday, May 27.

Voters who cast ballots in the Republican primary may vote in the runoff. Voters who did not vote at all in the primary election may also vote, but voters who cast ballots in the Democratic primary cannot vote in the Republican runoff.

The winner of the Republican runoff is facing no opposition in the November General Election and will succeed County Judge Jack Hall, who is retiring at the end of his term.

Several statewide races are also on the runoff ballot, and a Voters Guide for those positions is now available to the public online at the League of Women Voters of Texas website, www.lwvtexas.org. The nonpartisan Guide includes candidates in several contested statewide races and their answers to questions posed by the League.

Voters can also go to www. VOTE411.org for the Voters Guide information. By entering their address, voters can review the answers of candidates they can vote on as well as any ballot initiatives specific to that address.

Statewide runoff races include Democrat candidates for U.S. Senate, Republican candidates for lieutenant governor, Republican candidates for Texas attorney general, Democrat and Republican candidates for commissioner of agriculture, and Republican candidates for railroad commissioner.

There are also candidates, for the State Board of Education but not for the position from the Panhandle district, which is not up for election this year.

As we all know, two years ago, Chief Justice John Roberts changed the Affordable Care Act's individual mandate into a tax and thus rescued President Obama's signature legislation. What you may not know is that with this slight of hand – or flick of the wrist – he actually sent Obamacare flying from the constitutional frying pan into the constitutional fire.

That is, if you accept the Great Alchemist's transmogrification of a penalty-enforced regulation into a mere tax on the condition of not owning health insurance - in other words, a "unicorn tax," a creature of no known provenance that will never be seen again - if you accept that, you torque up the ACA's constitutional tension vis-à-vis the Origination Clause.

Article I, Section 7, Clause 1 says: "All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with amendments as on other bills." This clause was put in to ensure that that most awesome federal power was lodged in the political body most sensitive to public opinion.

"The power to tax is the power to destroy," John Marshall wrote in the foundational 1819 case of McCulloch v. Maryland, so the Framers wanted to ensure that any such destruction came from the people themselves.

Fast forward to December 2009, immediately before the ur-Tea Party state of Massachusetts expressed the nation's displeasure with Obamacare by electing a Republican to the Senate. That's when the Senate took a bill giving benefits to members of the military who were first-time homebuyers and, as George Will put it recently, "'amended' this bill by obliterating it." Harry Reid renamed it and replaced its entire contents with the ACA.

While the Origination Clause doesn't apply to situations where the Senate creates a government program and then institutes taxes to pay specifically for that program, the Obamacare tax isn't earmarked to pay for anything in particular. Similarly, taxes that are "analogous to fines" are exempt from the clause's requirements, in that they enforce compliance with a law passed under one of Congress's other enumerated powers - not the taxing power - but John Roberts foreclosed that interpretive option here.

Of course, the Senate can amend House-passed revenue bills, but only if the amendment is "germane" to that bill's subject matter. That loophole has turned out to be wide enough for the Kentucky Derby to be run through, but still what was done with Obamacare was breathtakingly unprecedented: If a bill to fundamentally restructure the national health care system is a germane amendment to a bill regarding housing tax credits for servicemen, then the word "germane" has no meaning. (I'm reminded of that great line from Princess Bride, best read in a vaguely Spanish accent: "You keep using that word. I do not think it means what you think it means.")

Finally, Obamacare's defenders argue that the Obamacare tax isn't a tax because its purpose isn't to raise revenue but instead to encourage certain behavior. (I guess that means it's no longer a Roberts unicorn tax but instead a Schrodinger's cat tax.) But if any tax with a behavior-changing purpose or effect - so, all of them - were exempt from the Origination Clause, then that's one more liberty-protecting clause that's read out of the Constitution.

In any event, all of these arguments were made to the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit last week by Pacific Legal Foundation attorney Tim Sandefur (also a Cato adjunct scholar, and my friend), in Sissel v. Department of Health & Human Services. This lawsuit was brought by an Iowa artist and smallbusiness owner who neither has nor wants health insurance, preferring to invest his limited resources in his business.

I have no illusions that the hostile judicial panel will enforce this (or any) limitation on federal power - Barack Obama's gambit to pack the D.C. Circuit is already paying dividends - but Sissel keeps open yet another front in the ideological battle of our time: are we to enforce the Constitution's structural provisions (which stand in the way of much of the progressive project) or relegate our founding document to the status of a relic under glass that we observe in the breach.

Although President Obama recently declared that the debate over his health care law "is over," to quote John Belushi, "nothing's over till we decide it is." It should be no surprise that a law forced on the American people against their will is still unpopular, or that its implementation continues to hit snags - you can only defy basic economic laws and human nature for so long - and this isn't the last we'll hear of lawsuits against it. Stay tuned.

Now, many folks consider the report from the U.S. Government to be jaundiced because it was published during the president's term of office. Anything associated with President Obama is immediately considered to be nonsense because of the Tea Party's fanatical hatred of the president. Even though he had no input into the results of the report, the conservatives in the land will automatically look upon the results with suspicion and disdain simply because it is remotely associated with his administration.

Even so, scientists have been claiming that the climate was changing as far back as the 1980's. The Iron Lady and close friend of President Reagan, Margaret Thatcher, spoke on the issue at the United Nations in 1989. A few countries actually listened to

Part of the problem in the U.S. is that we have not had much movement on climate change policy in a generation - primarily because many Americans do not believe that climate change is a serious problem. Therefore, the only significant federal action was forced upon us as a result of a 2007 Supreme Court decision that charged the EPA with regulating greenhouse gases. This decision resulted in the regulation of power plants and other greenhouse gas emitters.

Of course, greenhouse gas regulation by the EPA is regularly questioned by congress and many in the energy industry. They believe that the Obama Administration is overstepping its regulatory authority since congress has not passed legislation on greenhouse gas management. Of course, congress is so dysfunctional that it is doubtful that any meaningful legislation is possible in the current political climate.

In the absence of clear U.S. energy guidelines on greenhouse gas emissions, a few states have aggressively tried to address the problem. The Californicators, for example, passed a series of laws on climate change

dating back to 1988. Its most recent law requires electrical providers to provide one-third of their energy from renewable sources by 2020.

Actually, most states do very little. Take Florida, for example: once in the group of states trying to achieve ambitious greenhouse gas goals, the current governor once stated that he has not been convinced that climate change is actually real. He then commenced to dismantle all of the efforts that were underway prior to his election.

In other words, U.S. greenhouse policy is sparse. We lack clear leadership or coordination at the national level. There is no congressional guidance on the issue. State and local governments implemented an assortment of policies ranging from imaginative and bungling (California) to non-existent (Florida). Generally, state and local plans are not in line with each other. We cooked up a rancid stew of largely useless schemes.

Unsurprisingly, we are still producing massive amounts of greenhouse gasses.

Of course, the climate change doubters are pleased with this policy chaos. Charles Krauthammer, the conservative attack dog, recently called climate change a "superstition" from his perch atop the Fox News animal house. Astonishingly, in 2012 North Carolina banned making sea level change forecasts.

What remains surprising is the absence of a clear national policy coordination, and the continuing political and social acceptance of climate change denial within our national media and political dialogue, despite overwhelming evidence.

We are probably on the verge of a major national disaster, and yet national media and political leaders continue to hinder serious efforts to solve the problem.


Medicine Approved for Use in Hip and Knee Replacment

The FDA has recently approved a new use for apixaban (Eliquis) based on the results of three large clinical trials. Eliquis may be taken to help prevent blood clots in the legs after hip or knee replacement surgery. There were three clinical trials that looked into this new approval with over eleven thousand patients. The results of the ADVANCE-3 trial showed that there were significantly less people who experienced a blood clot in the vein

after a hip replacement compared to the standard of care. Eliquis is a factor Xa inhibitor. It is taken orally and helps prevent a clot from starting by limiting the chances of platelets from clumping together. This medication is taken twice a day to help prevent blood clots in people with an abnormal heart rhythm called atrial fibrillation. Close attention to signs and symptoms of bleeding should be monitored as that is the most common adverse reaction. Eliquis carries a warning of lifethreatening conditions and an increased risk of stroke in some individuals when it is discontinued and when it is used with spinal epidural anesthesia.

Public notices in your newspaper take some of the guesswork out of what your local governmental bodies are planning to do with your tax dollars. It's your right to know what they're up to.

If it is not in the newspaper, how will you know?

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about:

*the market or special appraised value placed on your property;

*the unequal appraisal of your property; *the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll;

*exemptions that may apply to you;

*qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal;

*the taxable status of your property;

*which local governments should be taxing your property;

*the ownership of property; *the change of use of land receiving special appraisal;

*any action taken by the appraisal district that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review: Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property. The Appraisal Review Board hearings are set for July 3, 2014, at the Donley County Appraisal District office. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the county appraisal district (CAD) staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board. The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD will use to uphold their determination. The law provides that before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD shall each provide the other with a copy of any written material intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person to present evidence or you may send notarized evidence for the ARB to review at your hearing. The CAD representative will present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. In most cases the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 304 S Kearney or P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court or an Arbitrator: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. As an alternative and within the same time period, you may file a request for binding arbitration with the county appraisal district in certain cases.

Tax Payment: You must pay either the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute or the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at 304 S Kearney or P O Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P O Box 13528, Austin, TX 78711-3528.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you. Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information. Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of

determination was mailed to you. For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you. If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.





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
