City turns focus to street job

The city's Fifth Street water improvement project has been successfully completed, and workers will now turn their attention to street improvements.

Public Works Clarendon Director John Molder told city aldermen last Tuesday, May 27, that his crew would soon remove old fireplugs and repair some broken concrete in the project area.

The project, which replaced water lines and fireplugs between **Bugbee Avenue and Collinson Street** was estimated to cost \$14,000, and the final cost was \$14,370.

Cuts across paved streets have been repaired, but there was an issue with the Bugbee cut after the rain. Molder said everyone along the new line has good pressure and reports clear water.

"I haven't heard any complaints," Molder said.

City workers this week began work on the long-awaited paving plan that was approved by voters in 2012. Work began on Sixth Street, in keeping with what city aldermen were told last Tuesday that the order of work would be Sixth, Parks, Carhart, Jackson, and Third streets.

The city expects the job to take 120 days during the months of June, July, August, and September.

Alderman Sandy Skelton said his confidence in the program had improved since the project's preconstruction meeting was held, and Alderman John Lockhart inquired if the city would be keeping the new gutters clean. Mayor Larry Hicks said the city will need to look at getting a street sweeper.

In other city business, the board elected Skelton to serve as mayor pro-tem, and city officials passed out budget worksheets. Alderman Doug Kidd said worksheets from employees would keep the board from having to guess what the city actually needs.

US isn't in control of the climate

The U.S. is not in the driver's seat when it comes to charting the future course of global climate change that may result from carbon dioxide emitted by human activities. That seat is occupied by the world's developing countries, with large populations seeking to improve their standard of living through better access to energy. The world's developed countries, like the U.S., have been relegated to the backseat. And like most backseat drivers, they may think that they exert some influence, but mostly they are powerless and annoying.


The U.S. can spin its imaginary steering wheel and stomp on its imaginary brake all it wants, but those actions won't change the direction or the speed of approach of the climate changes that are to come. Case in point: The mid-range estimate from the latest United Nations' climate assessment report is that the earth's average temperature will rise by about 2.2 degrees Celsius between now and the end of this century. The same computerized climate models used to make those projections indicate that the U.S.'s contribution to that rise is about 0.14 C. But even this minor amount may be an overestimate. A collection of scientific evidence has been published recently that suggests that these computer models predict too much warming from greenhouse gas emissions. Over the past 25 years, for example, the earth only warmed up about half as much as was predicted to have occurred by the climate models. So the 0.14 C is probably closer to 0.10 C. That value — one tenth of a degree — is the most climate change that the Obama administration and the Environmental Protection Agency would be able to mitigate even if they were able to eliminate 100 percent of carbon dioxide emissions from existing coal-fired power plants and from everything else as well, including cars, trucks, lawnmowers, backyard propane grills, home furnaces, natural gas electrical plants and on and on. No matter how successful they are in reducing emissions, the impact on the weather and the climate from global to local scales, will be scientifically undetectable and environmentally meaningless.

The Democrats and other naïve types are peeing into the wind if they think otherwise. Therefore, they can expect the same unpleasant results if they continue to ignore the obvious: in Texas, the tea partiers continue to hold sway while their fortunes in other states, excepting the Mormons in Utah, are declining rapidly.

Even in Utah, home of little Teddy Cruz's buddy, Mike Lee, the Saints have changed their election laws in such a way as to weaken future tea party gains in the Beehive State. Like in Texas, the faith and values voters have been a great boost for the tea party types, even though most of these voters are usually more in line with establishment Republicans.

They are unable to understand the difference in spending and investing. This obtuseness will hurt the Texas economy as well as the vital education of our children.

Now don't get me wrong. For the most part, I agree with the sentiments of the tea party types. I just think that they are short-sighted and take things to outlandish extremes, with little or no regard to the valid positions of others who are not quite so extreme.

The only way that the EPA's emissions limits will have any climatic impact at all will be if they engender new, carbon-free energy producing technologies that are reliable, safe and widely adopted. There is no guarantee that these particular regulations will lead to those outcomes. Nor is it clear that government involvement is the best way forward. But in the meantime, Americans will have their energy choice limited, their pocketbooks lightened, the reliability of their energy supply threatened and more government intervention in their lives. Undoubtedly, the climate road ahead will be a bumpy one, marred by strong hurricanes, major floods, prolonged heat waves and rising seas. The degree to which such occurrences will be marked by our own hand may never be known. Nature is pretty good at roughening the road on its own. But one thing that we can be sure of is that any attempt by the EPA to mitigate these effects through carbon dioxide emissions restrictions will be negligible at best - at least to the climate.



Local senior citizens center in jeopardy

The financial crunch that hits all of us has hit the center hard. For 40 years the Donley County

Senior Citizens Center has served homebound and inhouse meals on a non-profit basis. The current deficit in finances is about \$3,000 per months. This is due to decreased numbers of participants caused by choices and deaths. (More than 1,000 names grace our memorial wall.) Fewer than an average of 30 eat in the dining room daily and about 100 meals go out on wheels (with only 10% making any

contributions). Our volunteers are fed without charge and the Area Foundation as cut funding by 65% since last year. So, despite all of our grants and lesser donations, fundraisers and donations for meals, the decreased funding and increasing expenses have drained our resources in both the Operating Fund and S.O.S. Fund to a balance that will only carry us about 4 months at \$3,000 loss each month. With carful cuts and good

management the situation continues to spiral downward. So, our last resort is

to appeal to our local supporters (while we continue to seeks grants and others revenues) to both participate in our program and to help us find committed sources of local revenue. Our greatest mission is to continue taking about 100 meals on wheels five days a week to those who cannot afford to pay.

God bless you and our center. The need is critical. The food is nourishing and tasty. The fellowship is warm. Come and see.

New Drug Approved to Lower Blood Fat Levels

The FDA recently approved a new medication for adults to help reduce high blood levels of triglycerides. It is called Epanova. Triglycerides are a particular type of fat molecule needed for energy. If the levels are too high, the fat may clog up arteries which can lead to coronary artery disease. The FDA states that anyone taking Epanova must also be on a diet. Epanova is made up of fish oil which contains a mixture of eicosapentanoic acid (EPA) and docosahexaenoic acid (DHA).

High triglycerides (called hypertriglyceridemia) is commonly a result of other conditions such as obesity, diabetes mellitus, or a sedentary lifestyle. Lifestyle management that may help lower the blood fat level includes improved nutrition, routine exercise, and weight loss. If those measures do not work, medications that belong to the class of fibrates to help lower triglycerides may be prescribed. Gemfibrozil (Lopid) turns on a receptor that increases the amount of protein that will clear the fat from the blood. Niacin is another medication that is available as a prescription or over-the-counter (OTC) to help reduce triglycerides in the blood.

Commemorating 75 Years of Soil and Water Conservation

"May 29, 2014 marks the diamond jubilee of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB) and the beginning of Texas soil and water conservation districts (SWCDS). The date is also the official kickoff date for many celebratory events around the state throughout the year commemorating the event," said Rex Isom, executive director of the agency.

The problems of wind and water erosion in the 1930s (which was the reason for the creation of the TSSWCB and SWCDS in Texas as well as in other states) caused great land devastation in Texas and throughout the Great Plains region of the country. The era was marked by a period of drought from 1931 to 1939 that was coupled with severe winddriven soil erosion of overgrazed rangeland and soil exposed by the use of farming practices not adapted to the semiarid U.S. Great Plains. "In addition, this catastrophic display of nature caught public attention at a time when the state and nation was in the throes of a great economic depression. Nature just added additional woes to the suffering of the people because some of the worst dust storms that had ever been seen in the history of the country were occurring at that time," added Isom.

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO or Company) publishes this notice that on May 7, 2014, it filed its Statement of Intent and Application for Authority to Implement a Transmission Cost Recovery Factor (TCRF) with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT or the Commission) in Docket No. 42448. The filing was made in accordance with the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA) § 36.209 and Commission Substantive Rule 25.239. The TCRF will recover SWEPCO's reasonable and necessary costs for transmission infrastructure improvements, as well as changes in wholesale transmission charges under a tariff approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC). In this application, the time period for SWEPCO's transmission capital investments, to be recovered through the TCRF, is December 31, 2011 through February 28, 2014. SWEPCO also seeks to recover through the TCRF approved transmission charges that are not otherwise being recovered through current rates.

This notice is being published in accordance with PURA § 36.103 and Commission Procedural Rule 22.51(a)(1).

STATEMENT OF INTENT TO CHANGE RATES

SWEPCO requests that the Commission approve a TCRF that would result in an increase in revenues of \$14,729,466 per annum, an increase of 5.01 percent in overall annualized revenue. SWEPCO has proposed that its requested rate change become effective 35 days after the filing of the Statement of Intent and Application. The proposed effective date is subject to suspension and extension by actions that may be taken by the Commission. All customers in SWEPCO's Texas retail rate classes will be affected by this change. The impact of the rate change on various customer classes will vary from the overall impact described in this notice.
