Sales tax revenue declines

The absence of the pipeline crew that boosted local sales last year continues to be reflected in sales tax revenues for the City of Clarendon.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs delivered her monthly allocations last week, and the July figure for the city dropped 19.87 percent from \$37,876.11 down to \$30,347.33, and dropping the city's year-to-date total 3.68 percent to \$223,654.33. Boosted by the economic miniboom of visiting pipeline workers, last year's July allocation was up more than 41 percent compared to the same period in 2012. The city's allocation this July is 13 percent higher than the \$26,853.96 that was received in July 2012. Hedley's allocation this month dropped 50.94 percent to \$246.07, but that city is still slightly ahead for the calendar year-to-date at \$4,132.85, up 1.58 percent. Howardwick's figures continue to slide, down 41.99 percent for the month at \$948.18 and down 17.47 percent for the year-to-date at \$7,801.59. The sales tax figures for the July allocations represent monthly sales made May. Combs said that statewide sales tax revenue this month was \$2.24 billion, up 3.7 percent compared to 2013. "Sales tax revenues continue to grow at a moderate pace," Combs said. "The increase was led by remittances from the wholesale trade, services, and restaurant sectors. Fiscal year-to-date collections have now grown by 5.2 percent."





Traffic stop leads to 3 drug arrests

Three people were arrested Tuesday, July 1, after a traffic stop led to the discovery of more than a pound of heroine.

According to arrest reports at the Donley County Sheriff's Office, Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Darrin Bridges stopped a black 2005 Jeep Liberty for speeding west of Clarendon on US 287 near mile marker 166 and observed "several indicators of criminal activity."



Just this past June, the Supreme Court largely struck down the state's most recent attempt, and declined to hear appeals of two other cases that Texas lost.

Oklahoma became a state and Adair became a county in 1907, but the town of Stilwell was thriving a decade earlier, when visionary and committed citizens laid groundwork for churches, schools and civic undertakings.

Members of the Kiwanis Club kicked off the "Strawberry Festival" in 1948. It has expanded every year since, now boasting "wow" participation and --far-flung notoriety. The Kiwanians still sponsor it, but now have additional help, what with hordes of people descending on the second Saturday in May for "all things strawberry."

They parade, crown a queen and kick up heels with much merry-making in the town of 4,000.

And "hordes" will have to do, because accurate attendance numbers are hard to come by. Conservative estimates are 20,000, some claim 30,000 and a few "upwards of 40,000." Whatever, the one motel in a town with five traffic lights in the foothills of the Ozarks can't begin to accommodate the masses. Folks with extra beds in Stilwell and Adair County wind up hosting relatives they didn't know they had

Puts me in mind of Brownwood, Texas, my hometown. In May, 1948, it hosted the State Democratic Convention. Hotels and tourist courts displayed "no vacancy" signs early on.

Front page appeals in the Brownwood Bulletin urged residents to "sleep Democrats at your house." (Later in the year, Lyndon B. Johnson became the

industry that relies heavily on extracting fossil fuels from the ground, we have substantially increased our vulnerability to its consequences. The Texas Republican leadership points out that even if the science is true (which it is) Texas can do nothing meaningful without hurting our economy. Reducing these emissions will drive up electricity prices and eliminate jobs, they note.

However, many scientist disagree, and I'm absolutely certain that our scientists are much, much smarter that our politicians. Actually, it's not even close. Most of our politicians, led by Governor Rick, have proven beyond a shadow of a doubt that they are s.t.u.p.i.d, as in "a stupor of thought." Anyway, the aforementioned scientists from our finest universities suggest that Texas is missing a wonderful opportunity to be a leader in global efforts to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and that state agencies cannot continue to ignore the effects of climate change on our water resources and coastal development, especially because they are already here. Yikes!

According to Katharine Hayhoe, a Texas Tech University scientist who studies the effects of climate change on regions across the country and says, "Texas is really at the forefront of this

tions of Texas' Gulf Coast have already risen as much as two feet in the last century, which scientists partly attribute to climate change and global warming.

Those very same scientists say that Texas officials have not asked them for climate projection data or any comprehensive studies on how global warming is affecting the state. Well, surprise-surprise. Why aren't we shocked? Unfortunately, regarding brain capacity our governor and state legislators are several sandwiches short of a banquet.

"I call Texas a 'state of denial,"" said John Anderson, a professor of oceanography at Rice University and a global expert on sea levels. "And that denial is becoming less tolerable as times goes along." He added, "the rate of sea-level rise on the Gulf Coast was six times higher today than it was a century ago and would only continue to increase, but that state officials were not planning for such a scenario."

State regulators have expressed skepticism about global warming, and both Governor Rick and Attorney General Greg Abbott, the Republican candidate for governor, have refused to regulate greenhouse gas emissions, and have fruitlessly sued the Obama administration over its major climate change initiatives. Texas has wasted more than

Now, isn't that a lovely scenario to plan and prepare for?

Stilwell newspaper distribution is unique. They print about 5,000 copies, with some 500 mailed to subscribers. The rest are sold in businesses around the


Donations in the past have been down due to the economy, and we need the support of the community more than ever. In the near future we are looking to fix the roads at the cemetery, remodel the





This clinical trial showed significant improvement in the blood flow through the forearm in adult volunteers with heart disease, compared to people who were taking a sugar pill. Forearm blood flow helps clinicians identify whether or not there is limited blood flow from blood vessel narrowing in heart disease. Tomato pills did not affect blood pressure, vessel stiffness, or levels of harmful fat in the blood. This two month study only looked at the effects of seventy-two volunteers. Researchers at Cambridge University insist that more studies should be conducted before a clinical recommendation can be made.

AUSTIN - Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reminds shoppers they can save money on certain items priced under \$100 during the state's annual sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 8 -10.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school supplies and backpacks priced under \$100 from sales tax, which could save shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"Families gearing up for the new school year will not pay any sales tax for many back-to-school items ranging from pens to blue jeans," Combs said. "When the backto-school list is long and the money is short, it can be difficult for Texas families. We hope this tax break will help ease that burden."

First, second, and third place winners will receive cash prizes during the Cottle County Pioneer Day Celebration on September 13, and entries are now being accepted.


Entries must be labeled with the owner's name, the farm or ranch name, the name of the block, and the type of animal that licked the block.


