Meter tampering drawing citations

City Hall is reminding citizens this week that it is illegal to tamper with a water meter and doing so can result in a fine.

Four citations have been issued in July for violating Section 13.03.006 of the Code of Ordinances. In each case, the residents' water had been turned off for nonpayment and the residents turned the water back on.

Even paying water customers can be cited for turning the city's water meter on or off. City officials encourage everyone to have a licensed plumber install cutoff valve on the residents' side of the meter to be able to turn their water on or off when needed without having to get a public works employee to do it.

Sen. Seliger to lead education study

AUSTIN - On Friday, State Sen. Kel Seliger (R-Amarillo) was appointed by Lieutenant Governor Dewhurst to serve as co-chair of the Joint Interim Committee to Study Education for a Skilled Workforce.

Scotta Faulkenberry of Stephenville, Texas, and Cody Shannon of Royse City, Texas, along with two students from Garden City Community College in Kansas, placed first over 13 other international teams from Australian universities, the United States, Japan, South Korea and Indonesia.

The All American team placed first with 4385 out of a possible 5020 points to win the competition and the Roy McDonald Shield at the Australia International Meat Conference last week. The team bested the second place team from Charles Sturt University Wagga by 46 points. The University of New England placed third.

Wyrick gets 21 months for burglary

A Howardwick man connected with the April burglary of the Sandell Drive-In was one of six people sentenced when the district court met in Clarendon last Wednesday, July 16.

Jeffery Lynn Wyrick was convicted for the state jail felony offense of burglary of a building and was sentenced to 21 months in the State Jail Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Wyrick, 32-year-old of Howardwick, was arrested in Donley County by Donley County Deputy Sonny Marasco for the offense that took place on April 23, 2014. Wyrick was later indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury on June 25, 2014.

According to published reports, Wyrick was one of two people arrested after Donley County deputies executed a search warrant at their home at 258 Palacia Drive in Howardwick. Among the items found in the home was a large amount of candy and a trash can believed to have been stolen from the Sandell on either April 23 or April 24.

"Deputy Marasco and other Donley County officials pieced together this excellent investigation that lead to several arrests and this conviction today," said Inman. "With excellent investigations we are able to successfully remove defendants like this from the community."

ENTERPRISE files show Wyrick was also arrested in 2013 in connection with three burglaries, including one at the Clarendon Country Club from which a large safe was stolen.

His foggy summation is brief: "She said 'I will,' then I said 'I will', and now we've spent nearly 70 years together 'wilting'."...

the idle A current story is set out in West Texas--specifically, american Alpine, the Big Bend country's by don newbury crown jewel.

The area's grandeur is beyond the imagination of the many Texans who've never visited, or taken deep breaths of the mountain air.

Yet, bigger than the expanses of the Big Bend are stories of its people, strong of handshake and steeped in the bedrock of things good....

Forty years ago, when Ray and Rita Hendryx were married, they danced to the fiddle and band of the late Hoyle Nix and his West Texas Cowboys, a highlight of Alpine's July 4 observance in '74.

How could Ray forget? His late father, Gene Hendryx (a Marine at 15 and survivor of both World War II and malaria) initially moved to Alpine for his health and was previous owner of Radio Station KVLF. "Everything Alpine," he served three terms in the state legislature and was a part-time announcer as a Sul Ross college student when the station began operation 67 years ago. Gene seemed always to be "mike side" promoting Alpine and the Big Bend area. He talked up the Independence Day celebration 40 years ago "big time." And the Nix band booking was big news.

Little wonder, then, that memories flooded-- 40 years later--when Ray learned this year's July 4th holiday plans. There'd be a street dance led by another Nix band—this time Hoyle's son Jody, with his Texas Cowboys, playing a street dance at nearby Fort Davis. Wow, thought Ray and Rita, after celebrating in Alpine, they'd top it off dancing to Nix band up the road....

It was déjà vu. Like his dad, Ray was in promotion mode for weeks-his "leather-lung" promotions of upcoming events ever evident, as one listener put it, "'til the world looks level."

Ray and Rita could hardly wait. Their extended family would all be in town for the holiday and anniversary folderol.

Having worked at KVLF since his teen years, he contacted Jody to make sure Silver Dew on the Blue Grass Tonight still is in the band's repertoire. "Of course," Jody responded, "It's still a favorite."...

The Hendryx clan, almost all of 'em, were "all in" for multiple events in both towns. (Ray believes the fireworks embroidering skies above the Davis Mountains each year are the best in West Texas.)

Luckily, there was beautiful weather, grand food, parades, high school reunions and more. The Hendryx family partook of it with gusto. As reporters have stated across the years, "a good time was had by all." However, Ray and Rita "tuckered out" before the dance, as he put it, "plumb out of time and energy." They stayed home.

Maybe they can drop by The Stampede—The Nix's home venue for 60 years--one of these days in Big Spring for a "rain check" dance to Silver Dew. Shucks, it's less than 200 miles away, not a "fer" piece in West Texas....

Ray has worked many seven-day weeks, holidays and all, since he first went on the air during the 1967 Middle East War. His idea of retirement was to "back off' to 40 hours a week by the time he hit 65.

Health issues are taking precedence now, and now Ray is in the process of selling the radio station holdings. The couple will re-locate to Kansas, where their two sons and their families live.

Ray and Rita are "public service" people who've earned transition to "live like the Waltons." Soon, no more early morning news casts, trading posts, local government meetings and athletic broadcasts. Instead, story time for four grandchildren, many about KVLF - the "Voice of the Last Frontier," an Alpine street dance, and another one almost attended 40 years later in Fort Davis

FDA Approves New Breathing Form of Insulin

The FDA recently approved an inhaled form of insulin called Afrezza. This new insulin is designed to help lower high blood sugars in people diagnosed with type 1 and type 2 diabetes. This insulin comes as a powder. It is packaged with an inhaler. When properly used, it helps lower high blood sugars that occur immediately after meals. This new insulin is approved to be inhaled immediately prior to a meal or within 20 minutes after a meal. Afrezza should be taken along with long-acting insulin that is injected into the body. People with breathing conditions such as asthma or chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) should not take Afrezza because it carries a strong warning about the risk of bronchospasm, or tightening of the muscles around the breathing passages of the lungs.

Type 1 diabetes is an inherited condition where the pancreas cannot produce insulin. Insulin is an important hormone created by cells in the pancreas. In type 2 diabetes, the insulin producing cells do not make enough insulin. Insulin is a required medication for those who have type 1 diabetes.

Gov. Rick Perry, leaping again into the national spotlight on illegal immigration, announced Monday he is sending up to 1,000 National Guard troops to the Texas-Mexico border, where an influx of young Central Americans has overwhelmed the federal government.

Democrats blasted the decision as a political stunt by a governor with presidential ambitions. But Perry, who has the power to call up Guard troops to deal with a broad variety of crises, said Texas had to act because the federal government has offered nothing but "lip service and empty promises" while the border is overrun with illegal activity.

"I will not stand idly by while our citizens are under assault and little children from Central America are detained in squalor," Perry told a packed press conference at the Texas Capitol. "We are too good a country for that to occur."

Monday's announcement marked the second time this month that Perry, who is considering another run for the White House said. in 2016, has thrust himself into the center of national debate about the crisis along border. He met with President Obama in Dallas on July 9, in part, to press his demands that the feds send — and pay for — a National Guard deployment.

Absent a federal activation, Perry said he acted on his own, meaning that Texans will pick up the \$12-million-a-month tab authorities say the deployment will cost.

Inspection sticker will soon be a thing of the past

Texans will have one fewer state stickers on their windshields beginning next spring.


The state will stop issuing vehicle inspection stickers beginning March 1, 2015. In order to register your vehicle, you be required to pass a vehicle inspection not more than 90 days prior to the date of your registration expiration.

After passing an inspection, the inspection station will update your electronic inspection record with the results and issue a paper vehicle inspection report. When you go to register your vehicle, your inspection will be verified electronically to determine if your vehicle is eligible for registration at that time.

Transitioning to this new process will require every vehicle's inspection and registration to expire at the same time. In order to do this in the first year, you will be allowed to register your vehicle if your vehicle registration is valid the day you register.

The Texas Department of Motor Vehicles is working with the Department of Public Safety and the TCEQ on the implementation of this program, and once program details are finalized, that information will be made available to the public. At this time, additional information about the program can be found on the TxDMV website at www.txdmv.gov.
