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**City sales** taxes drop in August 2014 tally second best in five years

By Roger Estlack, Clarendon Enterprise Clarendon's sales tax receipts are down for the fifth straight month, but the city is still showing its second highest returns in the last five years. Texas Comptroller Susan Combs reported August sales tax allocations last Wednesday and showed Clarendon as being down 15.12 percent for the month at \$37,353.16 compared to \$44,009.31 last year. Local sales in 2013, however, were bolstered by temporary workers living here as part of a pipeline crew, with some months reporting sales tax receipts greater than 40 percent above similar periods in 2012. Compared to 2012, this month's city sales tax revenue is up 4.92 percent. And while the city's year-todate figure is currently down 5.50 percent at \$261,007.49, the total for the year thus far is 19.1 percent ahead of the same point two years ago. August year-to-date sales tax totals for the city over the last five years are as follows: 2014 - \$261,007.49; 2013 -\$276,214.96; 2012 - \$219,134.53; 2011 - \$225,853.82; and 2010 -\$207,357.53. Also in Donley County, Howardwick saw its monthly figures drop 40.31 percent to \$1,069.09, and that city's year-to-date total is down 21.11 percent at \$11,244.80. Hedley, however, shows some modest growth with a monthly figure up 9.61 percent at \$982.32 and a year-to-date total up 3.03 percent at \$5,115.17.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in June as well as April, May and June sales by businesses that report tax quarterly, all of which were reported to the state in July.

Statewide Combs said that state sales tax revenue in July was \$2.34 billion, up 6.3 percent compared to July 2013.

"The growth in sales tax revenues reflected strength in both business and consumer spending," Combs said. "The increase was led by remittances from the construction, services, and oil and natural gas-related sectors, as well as from retail trade and restaurants.

"Fiscal year-to-date, state sales tax collections are now up 5.3 percent."

## A monumental mystery on the square

As you all may well know, a monument suddenly appeared in front of the Donley County Courthouse Annex a couple of weeks ago. Most folks knew it was coming, so it's not a great surprise. On it, many statements were attributed to several Founding Fathers, along with others, including the Ten Commandments. Anyway, with all the engraving that was done on the monument I wonder if it is, in effect, a graven image? Just kidding - well, sort of.

Even though the monument is a weighty thing, I wonder what the point of it is. What is its purpose? What are the people behind the monument trying to say? For example, the monument includes statements attributed to George Washington, James Madison, John Jay, and alas, Patrick Henry, among others. Why, "alas" Patrick Henry? Because the monument uses a bogus quote attributed to Patrick Henry, in a 1956 magazine article. The quote is as follows, "It cannot be emphasized too strongly or too often that this great nation was founded, not by religionists, but by Christians; not on religions, but on the gospel of Jesus Christ!" Several respectable sources dispute that Patrick Henry actually wrote or said this. Unfortunately, according to the Huffington Post, "the quotation still appears regularly in Facebook and Twitter posts, and, remarkably, in presidential aspirant Newt Gingrich's 2011 book, A Nation Like No Other (p. 76). And this from the only candidate with a history Ph.D.!" "It is what it is, a totally inaccurate statement," according to my publisher Roger Estlack. It is puzzling as to why the quotes on the monument were not properly vetted. Actually, it is highly

also a misspelling or misuse of a word included in the history of Clarendon at the back of the monument. The history reads, "...purchased large tracks of land ... " Actually, it should read, " ... purchased large tracts of land ... " Of course, they could have been referring to dinosaur, train, or animal tracks that can be found in the neighborhood. The monument also mistakenly uses the word and privately.

For example, Thomas Jefferson counseled his nephew to subject the authors of the New Testament to the same textual scrutiny he would give to other ancient historians like Tacitus or Livy, and to treat the supposed biblical miracles with suspicion. Jefferson himself edited a version of the New Testament that left out every miraculous and supernatural event, leaving only Jesus' moral teachings.

George Washington, on the other hand, rewrote the presidential addresses crafted for him by his speechwriters so as to omit all references to Jesus Christ. And James Madison, who was quoted on the monument, gave his opinion that, "Religious bondage shackles and debilitates the mind and unfits it for every noble enterprise, every expanded subject.'

Sunday morning trip. Plenty of time was allowed for the leisurely 70-mile jaunt across the Metroplex. We wanted to hear Dr. Richard Jackson, a lifelong friend who was to preach three sermons on his 76th birthday.

A woman, neatly dressed, approached me. Her face was not familiar, but her request was.

"Do you have two dollar bills?" she asked. I felt the hovering of providence, recalling an \$8 purchase the night before that resulted in exact change - \$2. The two bills, folded around charge cards, prevented my being flat broke ....

Thoughts raced. I resisted the urge to lecture her. "Has inflation moved into panhandling, too?" I pondered. I recalled dozens of other similar requests along the way, usually in teeming cities. Typically, though, requests were for extra change, or maybe a dollar. But she wanted two.

I smiled, asking her why she needed the two dol-

"purposed" instead of "proposed."

Finally, I get the feeling that the people who placed this monument may have intended it to suggest that our nation was founded on Christian values. If so, nothing could be farther from the truth. While many of the Founding Fathers were Christians, the Constitution and structure of the country were based strictly upon Enlightenment principles.

Most Americans seem to be under the erroneous idea that the Founding Fathers were pious, prayerful men. That is not the case. They were skeptical men of the Enlightenment who questioned each and every idea that they were taught. They were very well read in political philosophy and science, and were well versed in theological matters. They continually challenged the religious teachings they heard, both publicly

was not an age of faith but an age of science and skepticism, and the Founding Fathers were in the lead. The American Revolution, and the subsequent founding of the United States of America, embodied the Enlightenment values that had been formulated over the previous hundred years or so. Our American experiment was originally an Enlightenment experiment.

I think the monument would be better placed in front of a church or even on private property. It has no place in front of our magnificent courthouse, a true monument to local government, and a temple of justice. I agree with Jefferson and the Founding Fathers that there must always be a wall separating church and state. The mystery monument is located in the wrong place, for the wrong reasons.

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

junkie friends ever saved anything for later and smoke all they could get their hands on as quickly as they could. #### **Promising Treatment for Pulmonary Fibrosis**

Currently, there are no approved treatments for idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis (IPF) available in the US. However, pirfenidone and nintedanib, drugs manufactured by two separate companies, have both recently shown promising results in clinical trials. Pirfenidone has been shown to reduce inflammation and fibrosis by reducing the production of inflammatory mediators in the body. Recent phase III clinical trials have shown pirfenidone to significantly decrease IPF disease progression. Nintedanib targets growth factors, which have been shown to possibly be involved in IPF. Currently in undergoing phase III trials, ninetanib has been granted priority review by the FDA in order to speed up the approval process. Idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis is a lung condition characterized by scarring and hardening of the lung tissue. There is a progressive worsening of lung function. Ultimately, it is a fatal condition. IPF typically affects individuals aged 50 to 70 years old with a history of smoking. Treatment in the past has centered around reducing symptoms, slowing down disease progression, and prolonging life.




