He took great pride in the work of The Clarendon Enterprise, and I have no doubt that, if he were here today, he would be bragging on his grandson, The Cub Reporter, every chance he was given.

Growing up in my family, the importance of the community newspaper was well understood. But it bears reaffirming in this modern age of iPads, smart phones, Facebook, and text messages. This week marks National Newspaper Week across America, and our industry's theme this year is "Newspapers: The Foundation of Vibrant Communities."

As graduate student at Texas Tech, I spent part of one summer studying the economies of 14 rural communities in the Texas Hill Country. I made it a habit to pick up the local newspaper everywhere I went, and I noticed one common thread right away. The strongest communities and the ones that had the most going on were the towns with the best newspapers. This was true regardless of the population of the town. The vibrancy of the community was reflected in the quality of the newspaper.

If you look around the Texas Panhandle, I think you'll see that the same is true here. If you want to look at towns that are growing or are making things happen, you will likely find a strong voice in the local newspaper.

This is your newspaper. We cover your life from childhood and right up until they lay you to rest. It is in these pages that you find out not only about football games, pancake suppers, and cotton festivals, but also about tax notices, important meetings, and decisions that will impact your daily life. We also want you to think, and we therefore put forth opinions and editorials that are meant to drive positive change, improve our community, and give us all a better quality of life.

For the most part, however, any significant harm to us will have to cross two large oceans and the great distances of the North American continent, before doing us much harm. The Ebola virus comes to mind, along with other panworld diseases, like the bird-flu from Asia or a resurgence of a long dormant biological agent of some sort - either occurring naturally, or through an intentionally delivered means by our enemies.

In short, we are pretty safe here, so long as we stay close to home, within our natural borders. Of course, there is a

Luckily, we do have some extra protection from the Ebola virus that has now spread to Dallas, something that I never dreamed would happen. Should any infected Dallasites decide to head north up highway 287 to procure medicinal ganja in Colorado, our virtual forest of sewer-pipe crosses and "end of the world is nigh" signs will likely cause them to think twice before stopping for fuel and grub. They will likely think that they have driven into a Stephen King novel and drive straight through town, grateful that they survived their encounter with the obvious religious fundamentalists that surely must reside here. We will, of course, be protected from the Ebola scourge.

Now, it is true that the ISIL types continue to behead Americans and Britons, in addition to Muslims, who are foolish enough to intervene in the

fail to do so, then we will unnecessarily subject Americans to threats that could be prevented, or significantly reduced.

Perhaps it would be beneficial to seriously reduce, stop immigration from Islamic and countries which are enduring Ebola outbreaks, as well as other disease infested lands. Of course, we should do all we can to seal our southern border first.

We have the technology and ability to seriously reduce threats from other lands, whatever the cause. Now is a good time to make it as difficult as possible to enter this great land. If we don't, shame on us. It's not a matter of political correctness, it's a matter of doing all we can to protect Americans.

**Promising Study about Cholesterol-Lowering Medications** A recent study showed that people who were taking one of the cholesterol-lowering drugs commonly called "statins" while in the hospital after experiencing a stroke resulting in bleeding in the brain, were four times more likely to survive the condition than people who were not taking the statin. Also, it was determined that people on the statins were more likely to be released from the hospital after thirty days. Those conducting the research caution that more studies are needed before the current standards of practice related to statin use are revised. Statins lower cholesterol by blocking an enzyme in the liver called HMG-CoA Reductase. This leads to less production of the bad cholesterol particles. Highly prescribed statins include simvastatin (Zocor), rosuvastatin (Crestor), and atorvastatin (Lipitor). Since statins work in the liver, serious side effects might include liver damage and even muscle damage. Routine lab work is sometimes performed to make sure that the liver enzymes and blood markers are within normal limits.
