Man robs CEFCO store early Saturday

The Donley County Sheriff's Office is investigating the Saturday, November 22, burglary of the CEFCO convenience store at US 287 and Taylor Street.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn says a white male entered the store about 5 a.m. that day, showed a pistol to the clerk, and had the clerk hand over money from the register. The suspect also stole lottery tickets from the store before fleeing south on Taylor Street and then west on Third Street.

Blackburn said one identifying factor of the suspect is that the man had a fresh black eye. Anyone with information about the robbery is asked to call the sheriff's office at 874-3533.

Grand Jury hands up five indictments

The Donley County Grand Jury handed up indictments against five individuals on November 13, 2014.

Colby Clay Hill was indicted for Assault on Public Servant, third degree felony, for the offense occurring September 27, 2014.

Wesley Don Williams was indicted for Driving While Intoxicated (third or more), a third degree felony, for the offense occurring July 8, 2014.

Mitchell Daniel Machin was indicted for the state jail felony of Possession of a Controlled Substance for an offense on March 12, 2014.

Silvester Raymond Rowe-Hodges and Justin Rose Lane were both indicted for Possession of Marijuana for offenses on December 30, 2013.

Clarendon lines up Christmas festivities

Christmastime activities are lining up quickly in Clarendon, and local merchants are getting ready for a busy season with plans for a Courthouse Lighting Celebration, Late Night Shopping and the second annual Chili Challenge.

Local stores will kick off the holiday season with Black Friday and Small Business Saturday specials this weekend. Details on local sales were printed in the Holiday Gift Guide included in last week's Clarendon Enterprise and now available at ClarendonLive.com.

This weekend's activities will culminate with the Courthouse Lighting Celebration Saturday

evening, November 29, when organizers throw the switch on thousands of lights adorning the Donley County Courthouse Square.

The Courthouse Lighting Celebration will get underway at 5 p.m. with an appearance by Santa Claus and then a program will follow.

Retiring Judge Jack Hall will give the welcome followed by a prayer by Judge-elect John Howard. Music will be performed by the Community Children's Choir, Cub Scouts, and Girl Scouts; and then the lighting will be held with caroling led by Charles Clinton.

After the ceremony, the public is invited to the Lions Hall for hot

cocoa and cookies.

In a move from the traditional Thursday schedule, Late Night Shopping this year will begin next Friday, December 5, at downtown merchants and continue every Friday until Christmas.

The "Great Bowls of Fire" Chili Challenge returns for its second year on Friday, December 12, with this year's event being held from 6 to 8 p.m. at the Crossties Ministry Center and hosted by the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce.

Steve & Jesse will provide musical entertainment as businesses and organizations go up against one another for bragging rights and their chance at the 2014 title.

Monday, December 8, is the entry deadline for chili teams. The cost is \$25 per team. The winners will be selected on a "people's choice" basis, and admission is \$5.

Challenge details and entry forms are available from Bonnie Campbell at the Clarendon Visitor Center inside the Mulkey Theatre.

Howard steps down from CC post

Dr. John Howard formally stepped down from his position as head of the Clarendon College Board of Regents last Thursday, November 18.

Howard presided over most of the meeting before reading his letter of resignation from the board. State law prohibits county officers from holding two elected offices, and Howard will be sworn in as the Donley County Judge on January 1, 2015.

Regents named former CC

employee Darlene Spier to fill Howard's position on the board.

Regent Jerry Woodard was elevated by the board from vice chairman to take over as chairman, and he was presented with a special gavel by Howard. Spier was elected as the board's vice chairman.

In other college business, the board approved changes to the CC personnel handbook, financial investment policy, and semester credit hours policy.

A lease on the college's Carson

County farmland was also approved for three years.

CC President Robert Riza updated the board on a power survey being conducted for the college by Trane and said the school had signed an agreement with Texas Tech University to allow first year CC students to enroll at Tech and access Tech advisors.

Ashlee Estlack revealed the Clarendon College's new website design to the board and gave a brief overview of its benefits and

features, including more faculty-driven content and more user-friendliness for students who are using tablets and smart phones more than computers.

In personnel, the board ratified the hiring of Mona Hennessey, Health Science Service Center Coordinator; Dustin Hennessey, Student Success Coach; and Tashell Kingston, Financial Aid Assistant, and acknowledged the reassignment of Jana Oliver as Cosmetology Program Director.

CISD names Lemons as interim superintendent

Former Bushland superintendent John Lemons will take the helm of the Clarendon Independent School District on an interim basis when Monty Hysinger leaves for Dumas in January.

CISD Trustees hired Lemons last Thursday, November 20, after meeting with him in closed session for about an hour.

Lemons will also assist the district with its search for a new superintendent for a fee of \$4,000. Hysinger is leaving the position after 16 years.

Lemons said he will work with Hysinger

to get the job posted and suggested a closing date of December 19 for accepting applications. The interim superintendent will then review the applications over the holidays, and the board will plan a December 29 meeting to review applications also.

The district would then start the interview process during the first week of January, according to Lemons.

Hysinger told the Enterprise that the district plans to have a public forum on Monday, December 8, at 6:30 p.m. to take feedback on what residents want to see in the next school

superintendent.

CISD is also conducting online surveys of employees and residents ahead of the public forum to help guide the selection process. That survey is available on the school's homepage at www.clarendonisd.net.

In other school business, CISD Trustees approved an application to request a Maximum Class Size Exception Waiver from the state. In the last couple of weeks, both Kindergarten classes have taken new students and now have enrollments of 23 students each, which is one student over the maximum class size of 22.

District Court hears pleas in several local cases

Pleas were heard in five local cases when the 100th District Court met in Clarendon on Monday, November 10.

District Attorney Luke Inman, assisted by Greg Buckley, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Paul Alexander Rodgers was placed on probation for a period of two years for the Class

A misdemeanor offense of assault family violence. Rodgers pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Rodgers, 53-year-old resident of Clarendon, was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place May 9, 2014 by Chief Deputy Randy Bond. Rodgers was indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury on August 6, 2014.

Pursuant to the plea agreement,

Rodgers was required to pay a fine of \$1,000 to Donley County, \$398 in court costs, and successfully complete 100 hours of community service. If Rodgers violates probation, he could face up to one year in the Donley County Jail.

Michael John Herman was placed on probation for a period of one year for the Class A misdemeanor offense of deadly conduct. Herman pleaded guilty and was placed on

deferred adjudication for the offense.

Herman, 57-year-old resident of Fort Worth, was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place March 11, 2014, by Donley County Deputy Jay Logan. Herman was indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury on April 1, 2014.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Herman was required to pay an upfront fine of \$1,000 to Donley County upfront and \$488 in court

costs. If Herman violates probation, he could face up to one year in the Donley County Jail.

Gary Dale English was placed on probation for a period of two years for the Class A misdemeanor offense of theft. English pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

English, 57-year-old resident of Clarendon, was arrested in Donley County

Farewell to Kitty, a cat and chicken

I've never been a cat fan. I hate cats. And yet... I'm mourning... a cat.

Perhaps my dislike for cats stems from my allergic reaction to them. Perhaps it has to do with my distinct dislike for finding feline feces in flowerbeds. Or perhaps it's genetic – my father hated cats, too.

He always hated them from the time he was a boy right up through my formative years.

So imagine my surprise when I came home from college one day to find that my Dad had a cat of his very own. It was living in his barn; and the first time I saw it, he was sitting in a lawn chair, drinking a beer, and petting this cat in his lap. Was this the Twilight Zone?

Dad explained that this wasn't really a cat. It was more of a chicken, he said, which didn't make any more sense.

It seems that an old momma cat had chosen the barn behind our house at some point as the place to birth her litter of kittens. Soon after, the momma left and so did all the kittens except for "Kitty," who chose to stay behind, hanging out with the chickens and eating nothing but chicken feed and the occasional mouse.

Dad soon gave her a proper name, Kitty Laverne, and she became a permanent resident at our house for the next couple of decades. It was several years before Dad broke down and started buying actual cat food for Kitty. But, even with the change in diet, she stayed true to her chicken roots and remained a loyal friend and, I think, defender of her feathered companions. Through the coldest winters, she stayed in the barn with no heat other than the light in the brooder on which she slept.

Over the years, it was common to see Kitty in my Dad's lap as he sipped a beer and enjoyed the beauty and tranquility of his backyard oasis. Kitty didn't have much use for the rest of us, although she would let us pet her occasionally. She was mostly interested in Dad, and she showed him the most affection.

Given all that, I think Dad's death in 2006 probably affected Kitty in some way that we will never understand. She stayed on, guarding the chickens and doing her own thing, and she still never paid me much attention.

Unless, that is, I put on a pair of work boots, some blue jeans, and one of Dad's blue work shirts to go work in the yard. And then, Kitty was all over me, getting in my lap, rubbing against my legs, and generally getting underfoot. I think she was looking for something familiar, and anytime I wore that outfit, the results were the same.

My brother got the same reaction when he wore Dad's boots, and it was he who became Kitty's primary caretaker, seeing to her health and wellness over the years.

As our kids grew and after my Mom's passing, Kitty Laverne was a constant at our house, tying us to the past and something special from a time that we cannot recapture. Russell and I could spend time with Kitty, and in some strange way, we were spending time with Dad... or maybe just something connected to Dad.

Kitty developed a tolerance of children right away. She initially would shy away from kids, but she grew to enjoy their occasional petting although she never really wanted to play.

There were times that Kitty would disappear for days. We would begin to think she was lost or worse, and then she would show up... usually looking pretty rough and having been in a fight... sometimes for her very life apparently.

As the years went by, we began to joke that Kitty must have eaten the mouse from the movie The Green Mile. She seemed almost immortal this cat who thought she was a chicken.

Immortal perhaps... but not indestructible. Last Thursday, one week before Thanksgiving, Kitty met her end. She was hit by a car or truck in the alley behind our neighbor's house. She had just gotten over her latest injury and was doing what she loved... prowling around not far from the barn she called her home.

Kitty Laverne, as best we can figure, was about 22 or 23 years old. That's like 107 for a human. That's a remarkable achievement for an outdoor cat... or a chicken.

My kids and my nephews were very sad to see their sweet Kitty pass on. My brother especially and I were harder hit... losing a member of our family and a link to our Dad. And yet we believe she's probably happy that she's finally found that guy in the blue shirt she's been looking for these past eight years.

This Thanksgiving we'll say a prayer for the one cat that could ever call our house home, and we'll give thanks for family and the memories that we all cherish for those who have gone on before us.

Rest in peace, Kitty. The barn will never be the same without you.

I could recommend a hair stylist to "re-design" her locks, and she could leave the salon with a new throw pillow stuffed with her own hair.

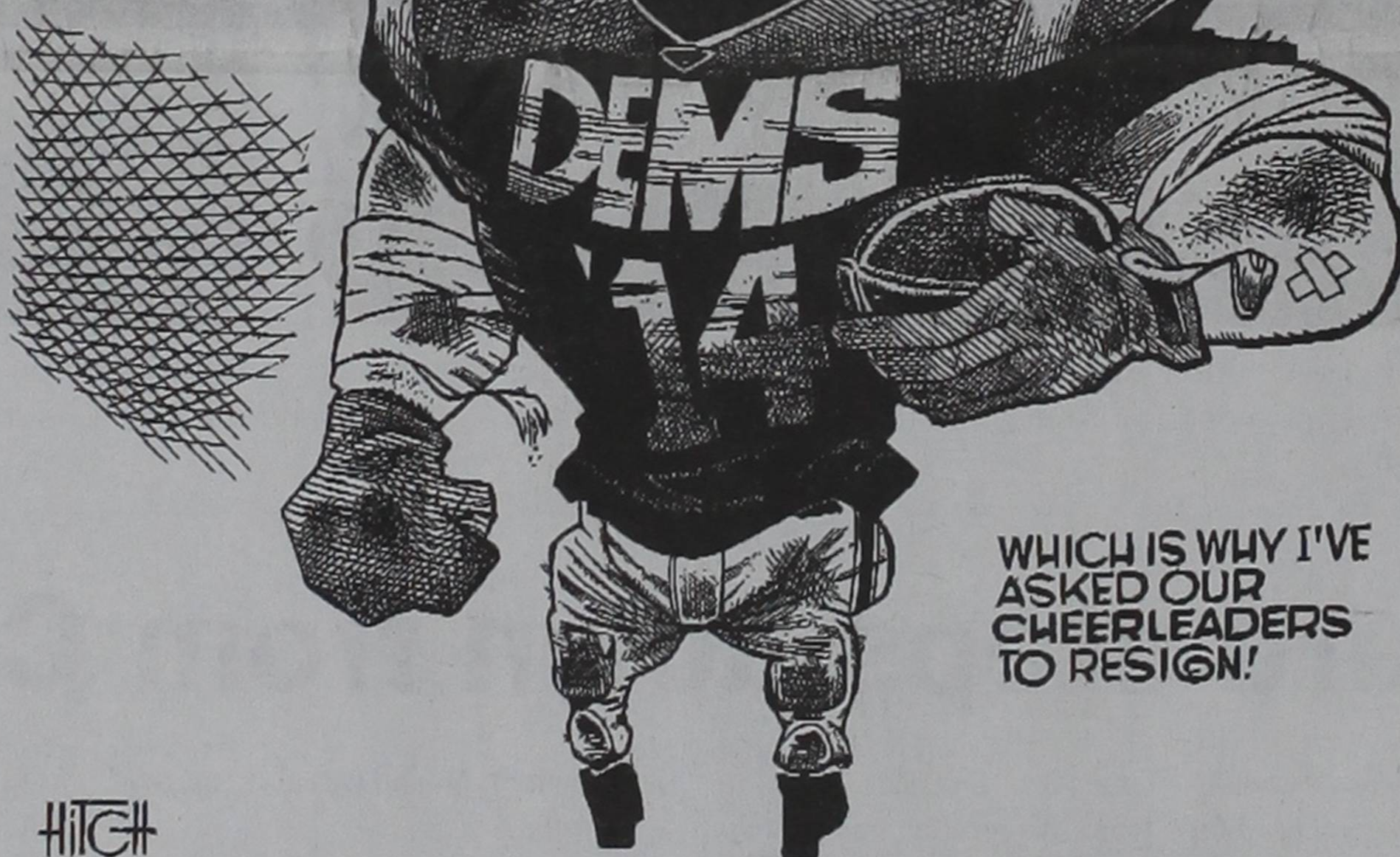
But I decided not to mention such drivel, like unto the splitting of hairs....

On his 26th mission over Germany, he was shot down by the Nazis and spent several months in a POW camp before General Patton's troops freed him and his fellow service members. He instilled in me a love for our country and a deep respect for those who serve. Likewise, I learned these valuable lessons from my father-in-law, who stormed Utah Beach 70 years ago. summer, I have the privilege of meeting our next generation of military leaders, when I host an annual send-off ceremony to recognize the young Texans joining our nation's military academies. I'm thankful for their willingness to serve, and I'm encouraged by their incredible potential.

Though much has changed – including the enemy, the battlefields, and the weaponry – the values and courage of our service members remain the same.

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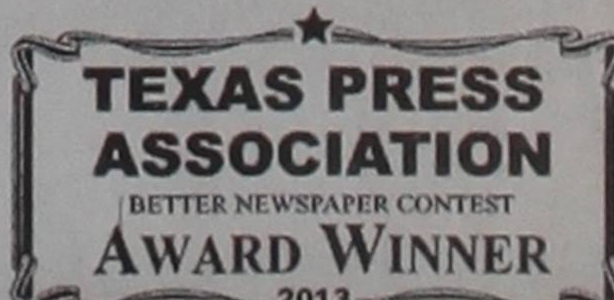

Farm bill meetings to be held in area

AMARILLO – Farmers and landowners in the Panhandle will have an opportunity to learn more about the 2014 farm bill in a second round of informational meetings conducted by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

These meetings will also include U.S. Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency staff discussing farm bill provisions and sign-up requirements and deadlines, according to Dr. Steve Amosson, AgriLife Extension economist in Amarillo.

All the meetings are free and open to the public. They will start at 10 a.m. and conclude at noon. In addition to the Farm Service staff, each one will include AgriLife Extension specialists demonstrating a decision-aid tool developed by the Agricultural and Food Policy Center at Texas A&M University to help producers economically evaluate program choices.

Amosson said he and DeDe Jones, another Amarillo-based AgriLife Extension economist, will provide analysis of the policy options using examples of producers who have already been through the decision-aid process.

Each location will also offer an optional “hands-on” afternoon session for producers wanting assistance in entering their data into the decision-aid tool.

“Sign-up is already underway for base reallocation and yield updates, and sign-up for Price Loss Coverage or PLC and Agricultural Risk Coverage, the ARC, starts November 17,” Amosson said. “These decisions, in a lot of cases, are not simple and need to be taken seriously because they will affect operations for at least the next five years.”

The series of meetings is sponsored by the Texas Corn Producers, Texas Sorghum

Producers, Texas Wheat Producers and the Plains Cotton Growers Associations.

“A Focus on the Technologies and Advancements of Commodities in the Panhandle” will begin with registration at 1:15 p.m., followed by the program at 1:30 p.m.

Four Texas Department of Agriculture continuing education units – two general, one integrated pest management and one drift minimization – and four certified crop advisor credits will be offered.

Registration is \$10 at the door and checks should be made payable

to Potter Ag Committee, according to Nathan Carr, AgriLife Extension agriculture and natural resources agent for Potter County.

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


Drugs in the News

Drug Combo Approved for Cancer Treatment

The FDA approved a new combination drug to help reduce the side effects of nausea and vomiting from many forms of chemotherapy. Classical side effects of many types of chemotherapy include hair loss, nausea, and vomiting. Akynzeo is a fixed combination of two medications: palonosetron and netupitant. Palonosetron belongs to the group serotonin-3 receptor blockers and helps prevent the early stages of nausea and vomiting caused by chemotherapy; it has been approved since 2008. Netupitant is a new drug that helps prevent nausea and vomiting that may start and last after chemotherapy, for up to five days.

The two clinical trials that led to approval of Akynzeo included over seventeen hundred individuals that were randomized to either receive palonosetron alone or Akynzeo. The results showed that those who took Akynzeo had less vomiting in the initial, delayed, and overall phases and did not require emergency nausea medication than the group who took palonosetron alone. The most common side effects that were reported include weakness, headache, tiredness, indigestion, and hard stools.

Thanks to those who made the journey

Happy Thanksgiving everyone! I have so much to be thankful for: my health, family, Ole Jim, and Buffy the Wonder Dog for keeping it lively around here but most importantly, Jesus and the blessings He has granted me.

If I have so much to be thankful for, what about those that came to the New World on the Mayflower?

After Queen Elizabeth I gained the throne in England in 1558, she was determined to stamp out all non-believers of the Church of England. The Separatists were Christians who separated from the Church and knowing they were not safe, fled first to Holland. Fearing the loss of identity, when the opportunity to relocate in the New World they signed up. The ship Mayflower was chartered by Thomas Weston to sail to the Colony of Virginia with 102 passengers and about 30 crew, setting sail in mid-July 1620. Originally two ships were to make the trip. The Speedwell filled with passengers from Holland joined the Mayflower, but leaks began plaguing the Speedwell causing weeks of delays for repairs. It soon became clear only one ship would make the trip, the Mayflower finally sailed in early September. The passengers had

been on board since July, eating the food that should have gotten them to the New World.

The maiden voyage of the ship was 1609, so in 1620 she was considered old. She was about 100 feet long, the deck was about 90 feet long with the gun deck that was allotted to passengers about 50 x 25 feet with a five-foot ceiling. There was no latrine or privy. They used a bucket-turned-chamber-pot. Oh, boy, what a smell!

Winter storms plagued the voyage resulting in a two month journey across the Atlantic and because the winds were so fierce they were unable to sail down the coast to Virginia, they dropped anchor at what is now known as Provincetown, Cape Cod, Mass. in November 1620.

Two people had died on the journey, one baby was born crossing the Atlantic making a total of 102 passengers and about 30 crew aboard the ship. When it became apparent they could not reach their original destination, thus cancelling

the contract they had signed with Thomas Weston, some members declared they would go their own way which prompted the decision to form their own government as written out in the Mayflower Compact. This was a contract in which the settlers consented to follow the rules and regulations for the sake of order and survival. The Compact was signed November 11, 1620, by 41 men.

The men quickly saw how brutal the winter was, all attempts to build shelters failed, most passengers remained aboard ship. A contagious illness soon began taking its toll, and only 53 passengers survived that first winter. The passengers left the Mayflower on March 21, 1621, eight months without a bath. A baby boy, Peregrine White, was the first European child born in the New England area.

The men had made friends with the Indians who taught them how to plant food crops and that first autumn a thanksgiving festival was hosted by the Pilgrims with the words of welcome that said in part, "We are so far from want that we invite you to partake of our plenty".

Each reader is dear to me, and I hope you all have plenty. Thank you, Lord, for my plenty.

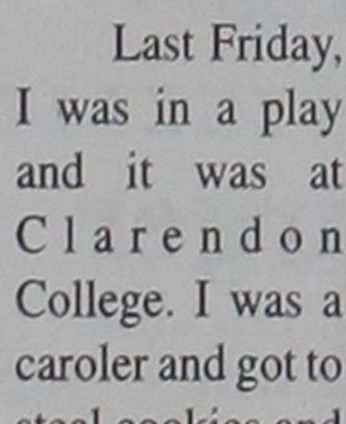

The Hedley grade school is making ornaments for our tree, and we will have a great time.

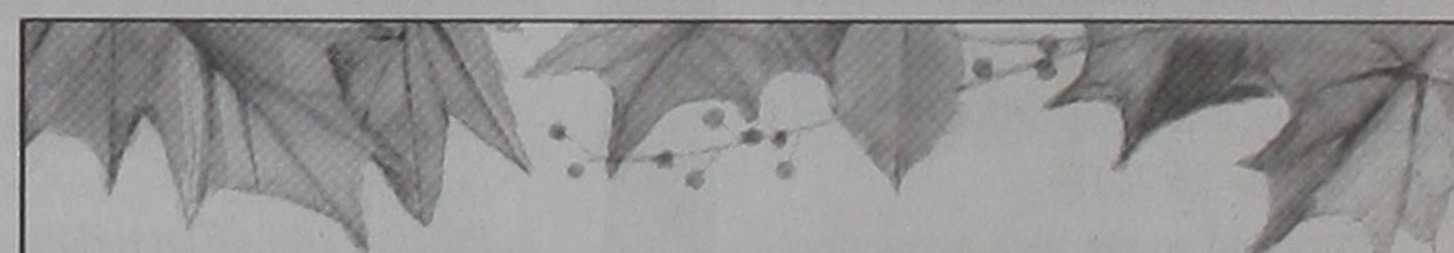

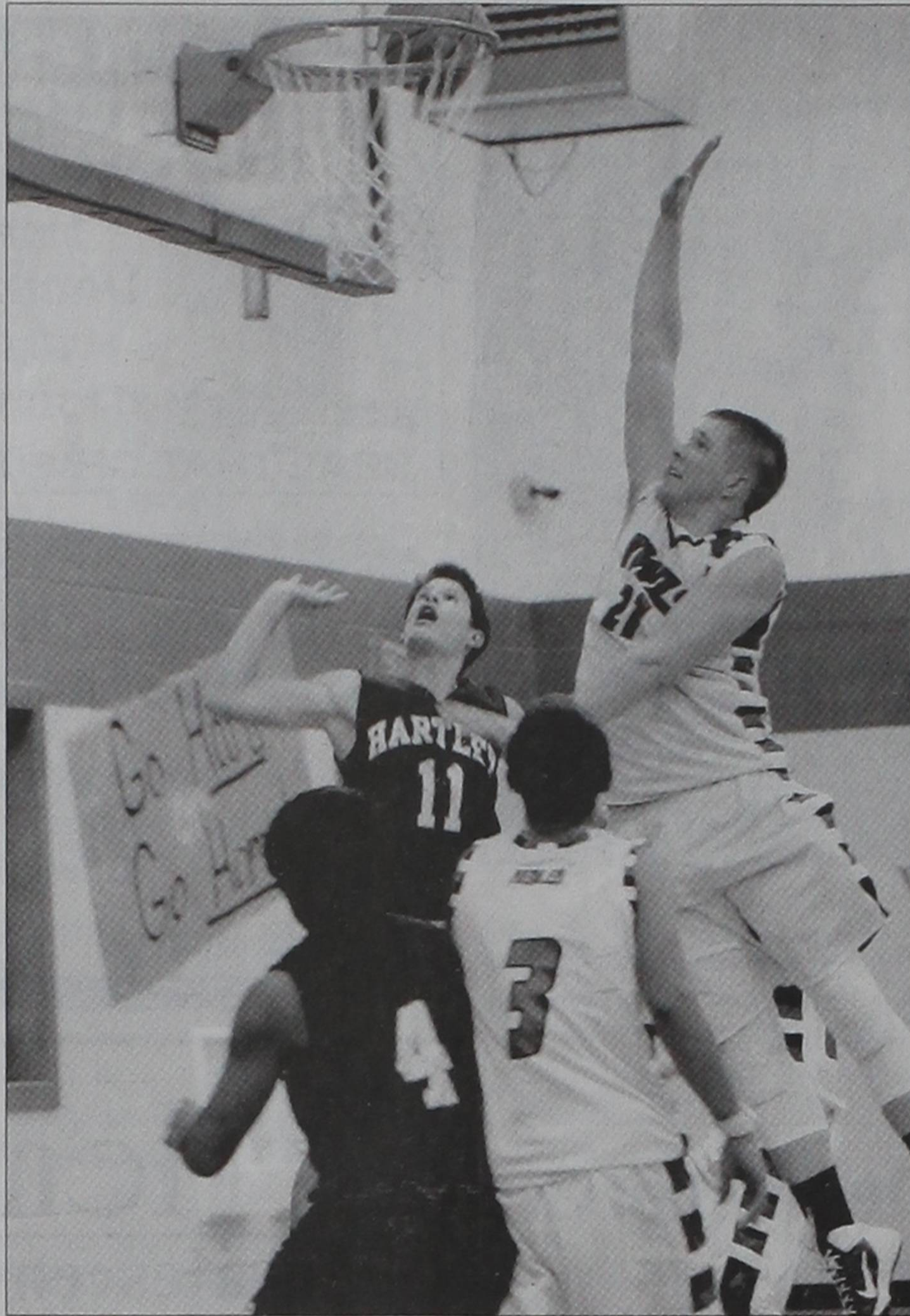
"The boys really played well for the opener of the season," coach Alton Gaines said. "Defensively, I

The Broncos play at River Road on Tuesday, December 2, at 5:00 p.m. and then play Vega at home December 9.



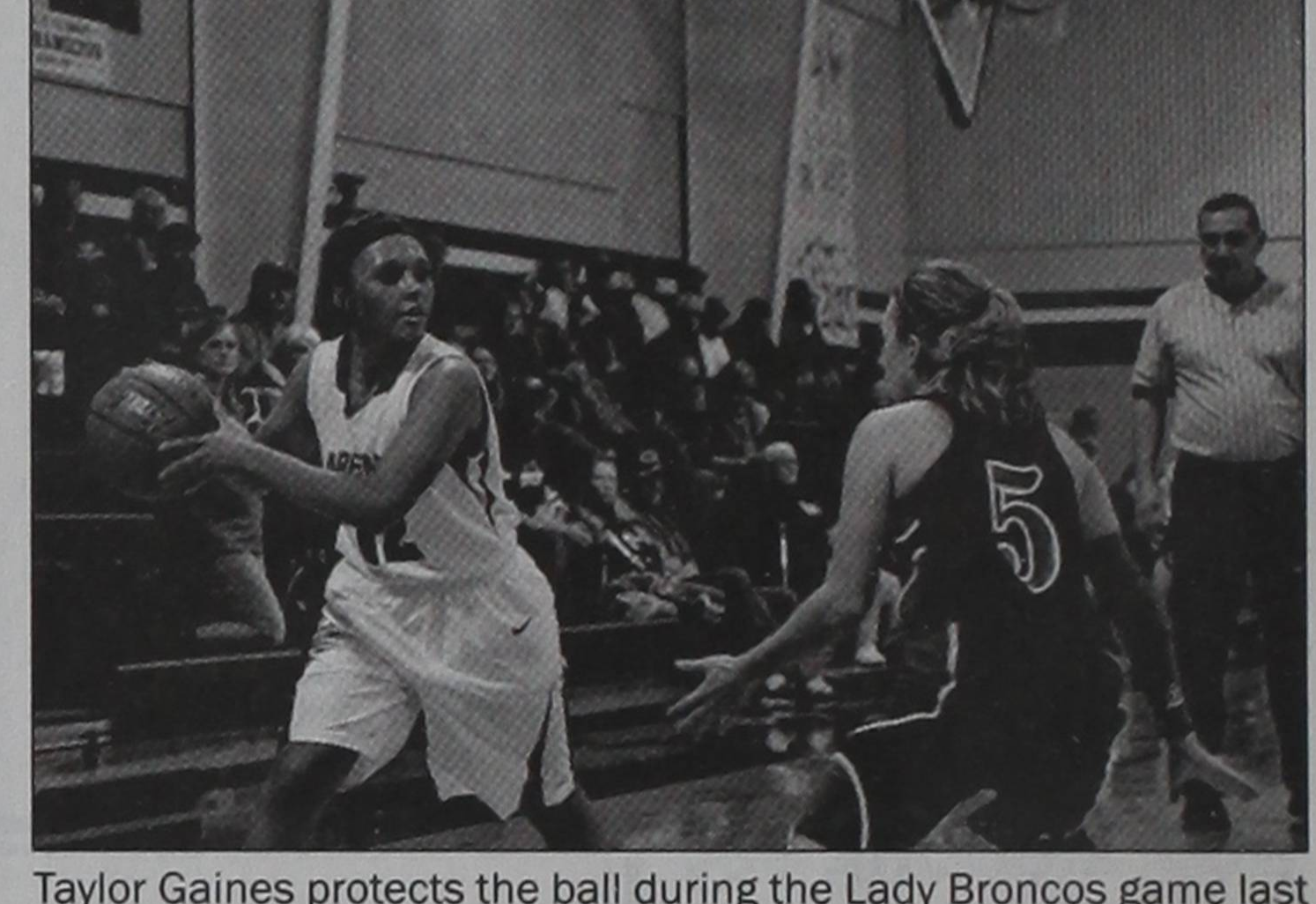

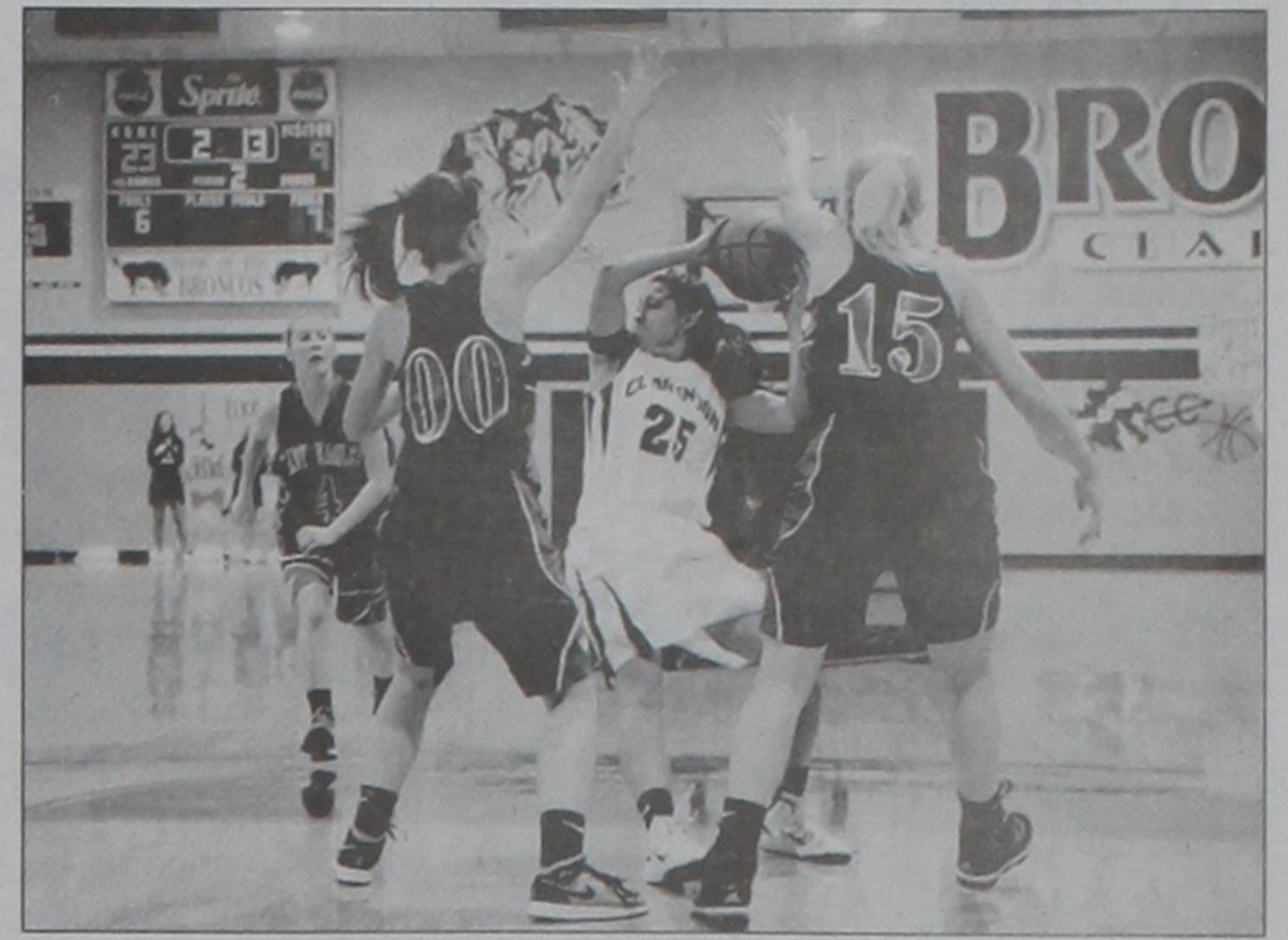
Grahn and Riley Shadle added six, and Colt Wood put in two.




