City gives old house more time

A condemned house got a brief reprieve from the Clarendon Board of Aldermen last Tuesday, November 18, after the property owner said she would address code issues.

Linda Lewis presented plans and estimates to the board to demolish two dangerous outbuildings on her property at Sixth and Bugbee and promised she would secure the house at that address. Dangerous exterior balconies on the house will also be removed, she said.

Lewis said family health issues had caused her to neglect the property, but she also said she hopes to renovate the old house and operate a bed and breakfast after she retires in three to five years.

So imagine my surprise when I came home from




A case of 'Hair Do' or 'Hair Don't'

college one day to find that my Dad had a cat of his very own. It was living in his barn; and the first time I saw it, he was sitting in a lawn chair, drinking by roger estlack a beer, and petting this cat in his lap. Was this the Twilight Zone?



Dad explained that this wasn't really a cat. It was

more of a chicken, he said, which didn't make any more sense.

It seems that an old momma cat had chosen the barn behind our house at some point as the place to birth her litter of kittens. Soon after, the momma left and so did all the kittens except for "Kitty," who chose to stay behind, hanging out with the chickens and eating nothing but chicken feed and the occasional mouse.

Truth told, the "attachment" ended in little more than a minute, but it seemed longer - much, much longer


At such times as these, one might whimper, "Why me?"



As the years went by, we began to joke that Kitty must have eaten the mouse from the movie The Green Mile. She seemed almost immortal this cat who thought she was a chicken.


Immortal perhaps... but not indestructible.



The FDA approved a new combination drug to help reduce the side effects of nausea and vomiting from many forms of chemotherapy. Classical side effects of many types of chemotherapy include hair loss, nausea, and vomiting. Akynzeo is a fixed combination of two medications: palonosetron and netupitant. Palonosetron belongs to the group serotonin-3 receptor blockers and helps prevent the early stages of nausea and vomiting caused by chemotherapy; it has been approved since 2008. Netupitant is a new drug that helps prevent nausea and vomiting that may start and last after chemotherapy, for up to five days. The two clinical trials that led to approval of Akynzeo included over seventeen hundred individuals that were randomized to either receive palonosetron alone or Akynzeo. The results showed that those who took Akynzeo had less vomiting in the initial, delayed, and overall phases and did not require emergency nausea medication than the group who took palonosetron alone. The most common side effects that were reported include weakness, headache, tiredness, indigestion, and hard stools.
