

Bailey County Extension Office News

Submitted by Mandi Seaton It was a century ago on Nov. 12, 1906, that local leaders in Tyler hired W.C. Stallings, a leading farmer, to serve Smith County as the first extension agent to serve a single county in Texas.

The groundwork leading up to that historic hiring began in 1892, when the boll weevil invaded Texas from Mexico. By 1903, the small beetles had cut Texas cotton yields in half. They were well on their way to toppling the long-held monarchy of "King Cotton" in the Lone Star State and the economic health of Texas.

Fear of losing the entire cotton industry led to extreme reactions. Dr. Seaman A. Knapp, U.S. Department of Agriculture special agent for Promotion of Agriculture in the South, toured the infested area and wrote, "I saw hundreds of farms lying out; I saw a wretched people facing starvation; I saw whole towns deserted ... "

Congress appropriated \$250,000 for use in "stamping out the boll weevil" in 1904. The money was split between U.S. Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Entomology and Bureau of Plant Industry. Both bureaus promptly began "how-to" demonstration work on government-owned experimental farms for farmers to emulate. But the farmers were unimpressed. The farming practices


It's been 100 years since Stallings was hired, but the same values of credibility and respect that made the agent of that era such a success still hold true today. Extension's credo of "real learning for real life" is as imperative to the success of the organization now as it was then.

And what's become of the boll weevil that galvanized Texans to act and kick-started Cooperative Extension work? He's still here, but his threat to the industry is greatly diminished thanks in no small part to the educational efforts of extension agents and specialists who convinced farmers statewide to support and cooperate with the efforts of the Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation. Today, every area in Texas is in the eradication program and 2/3 of all the cotton acres have only a very low boll weevil infestation.

"Full deregulation" of the members' electric industry may be contribute to our system's making headlines in the reliability. "Electric cooperatives said. have a track record of delivering electricity at prices below those in the deregulated market. That is one reason why Texas coops and their memberconsumers have not been required to make the huge investment or tackle the headaches involved with deregulation," said Black.

"Our members recently saw this cost go up when the wholesale power cost increased due to fuel costs. But when the price of fuel goes down, our operating costs follow suit, and our members see that on their monthly statements," he said.



Texas off-highway vehicle decals to be enforced

On Jan. 1, 2007, Texas legal four-wheel drive and Department game wardens display the OHV decal and other authorities will begin enforcing requirement for all qualifying trail vehicles to have a current Texas Off Highway Vehicle (OHV) decal properly mounted on their trail vehicles when used at OHV venues on public land in Texas.

A Texas OHV decal costs \$8 and is good through Aug. 31 of the year it is purchased. Many other for vehicles used on private states require similar land. decals. A decal bought in Texas is also valid in other this law is a Class C states and other states' decals are valid in Texas.



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
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At Its Heart, Christmas Is All About God's Lavish Gift

It's a great cartoon—the cartoon I saw years ago now in a journal for church leaders. A couple of unsmiling, thin-lipped Pharisees are looking sternly at Jesus. One points his finger at Christ and intones, "We get our salvation the old-fashioned way. We eeeeeearn it!"

Ridiculous, if you think about it. But sometimes we don't think about it, and so we catch ourselves acting and feel-



ing as if it were true. And that has very serious consequences.

If we think about it long enough and seriously enough (and really read Romans and Galatians), I hope we'll realize that SELF-righteousness is far worse than ridiculous: it is nothing less than a slap in the face of God and a denial of the cross of Christ.

To some extent, I think all Christians in our society are much more affected by our Puritan roots than we realize. I know, for example, that the religious tradition in which I grew up was not very comfortable with Christmas for a variety of reasons.

Much about Christmas seemed lavish and extravagant. We were right about that. We were just wrong in thinking that God minds lavish extravagance times. Christmas has about it the feel of, say, a sinful woman breaking a jar of the most expensive perfume and pouring it over the feet of her Savior (while a Judas looks on and grinches about the extravagance; his tribe we'll have with us always, I suppose). It's extravagant, wouldn't you say?, to launch angelic beings on a mission from heaven to visit shepherds out in the fields surrounding a podunk little village. Pretty extravagant to send wise men bearing priceless gifts on a trek to find a peasant family and their little son.

Christmas was joyful. We were scared of joy. Joy is hard to control and if unchecked can lead folks to excessive happiness. Joy breaks out unexpectedly and might lead to such things as shouting praises or dancing like David. We could tell you about "five acts of worship," but we didn't think there was much in the manual about joy. We were wrong.

We knew you shouldn't get drunk on wine, as Paul warns us in Ephesians, but we sort of skipped over the part in the same verses where he says to be filled instead, filled to overflowing, gloriously drunk with joy, on God's Spirit. That sounded dangerous. We were of a camp that was pretty sure that a greater miracle than turning water to wine would have been turning wine to water, and we tried it in a thousand ways, sadly succeeding.

Christmas was beautiful. We didn't much trust beauty for beauty's sake. It seemed close akin to extravagance and joy. If cheap and practical black and white will get the job done, why live in color? What, after all, does beauty DO? Just make life worth living, that's all.

At its heart, Christmas is about the most lavish, extravagant, joyful, beautiful gift, a gift that can only be accepted in deep humility and never earned, not even a little bit.
