The holding movement over the South appears to be getting under headway and not as much cotton is being offered consequently what is offered is being producers and restrict productaken. The situation has brought interests of the South to the rescue and it is believed that within three or four weeks time the organization for holding cotton will be advanced to such an extent as to raise the price above 20 cents. There is a general sentiment that values will not increase materially until after the general election and the financial situation is eased up considerably.

Unusually favorable weather has prevailed all over the cotton belt for weeks and this has had a tendency to hold down the price In some states night riders are posting signs on gins threatning to burn them if ginning is started before January 1st, and country stores are threatened if they attempt to market the cotton.

We believe this situation will result in organization of the cotton producers and that they will control the price of future

THE AMERICAN RED CROSS IN PEACE TIME Disease Prevention



Through its Health Service the American Red Cross has begun a nationcarrough its Health Service the American Red Cross has begun a nation-wide concentrated effort in co-operation with established organisations to reduce greatly the amount of preventable disease and physical defects found among the country's 106,000,000 population. Education is its most powerful tool. Special attention is devoted to children, and this picture shows a typical lited Cross weifare clinic where little enga are treated and mothers instructed in the proper care of them.

AMERICANS ABROAD IN RED CROSS WORK

United States Citizens Far Away Enthusiastic Members of the "Fourteenth" Division.

Among the most enthusiastic and mergetic members of the American led Cross are those citizens of the United States who live outside the continental boundaries of their country sons and daughters of the Stars and Stripes residing at the far corners of the earth.

These people compose the insular and Foreign Division of the parent organization, generally known as the "Fourteenth" Division, which has jurisdiction of all territory outside the country property that is Alaske. the country proper; that is, Alaska. Porte Rice, Hawaii, Virgin Islands, the Philippines, Guam, and even the island of Yap, which came under our flag as a result of the world war. For the year 1920 this division reported 30,806 paid up members.

The main object of this division is to give our citizens everywhere the opportunity to participate in the work

pertunity to participate in the work of the organization which stands for the best national ideals. Americans in far places intensely loyal and pa-triotic, treasure their membership in the Red Cross as the outward ex-pression of their citizenship. It is anether tie to the homeland and to sach other. There are chapters of this division in Argentine, Bolivia. Brazil, Canal zone, Chile, China, Costa Rica. Cuba, Dominican Republic, Benador, England, France, Guam, Guatemala, Halti, Hawali, Honduras, Japan, Manchuria, Netherlands, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Peru, Philippines, Porto Rico, Siberia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Syria, Turkey, Uruguay.

Venezuela and Virgin Islands.

During the war these scattered members of the Red Cross contributed millions in money, and million of dollars' worth of necessary articles for the men in service, and sent many doctors and nurses to France. At the same time they carried on an excellent Home Service in their respective communities for the families of those who had gone to war, and in some re gions gave large sums of money and immeasurable personal service to the

relief of disaster and disease victime. The division is now establishing service clubs in foreign ports for the benefit of sailors in the American Merchant Marine, making plans to aid Americans in trouble in foreign lands and completing arrangements for giv-ing immediate adequate relief in case of disaster.

It is the Fourteenth Division's part in the great Peace Time program of the American Red Cross.

RED CROSS ASSISTS DISABLED VETERANS

The American Red Cross is carry on a wide program of service for the disabled World War veterans receiving treatment in United States Public Health hospitals, and those being trained through agencies of the Federal Board for Vecational Education.

In each of the Public Health Service

In each of the Public Health Se the service men from the day they enter the receiving ward until they are discharged. After the soldier's discharge the Red Cross continues its friendly service through the Home Service Section in his own community.

Service Section in his own community.

The Red Cross maintains a convalescent house at all of the hospitals, where patients can amuse themselves after they are well enough to be up and around. Parties and picture shows in the wards are also furnished, with occasional excursions when convalescents.

Great service has been rendered by the Red Orons in mental cases in id attifying these who have appeared in state hospitals for the insane, and helping them secure compensation due from the Bureau of War Plak Insurance.


In the Federal Board's various dis-trict offices the Red Cross worker, acting with the Home Service Section, makes necessary leans to the men, ar-ranges suitable living conditions, helps collect evidence and supply facts to the Board, assists in "appealing cases" and settles various personal difficulties for the men. The workers also follow up and aid all men who discontinue train-

The Red Cross, agents find men "lost" to the Board, help clear up delayed cases and aid the college counselors in their friendly work with the men. Many Red Cross chapters have set up recreation facilities, and in some instances living clubs, so these victims of war may have attractive surroundof war may have attractive surroundings and the fun which must go with effective school work.


