WILL POWER WINS

Americans everywhere should be grateful for the impressive and timely reminder from the wintry wastes of the Canadian Northwest that there is still no earthly force comparable to the human spirit.

Among the bush pilots of the North, it would have been a fairly routine flight on which pilot Ralph Flores, 42, of San Bruno, Calif., and his passenger, 21-yearold Helen Klaben of Brooklyn, N. Y. set off on February 4th from White Horse in the Yukon Territory to Seattle. Blown off course they crashed hours later on a heavily-wooded 4,000-foot moun-

What could they do? Injured in they had no sleeping bags, no rifile, not even an axe. Their food supply consisted of two cans of sardines and two cans of fruit salad. Yet 47 days later, 19 days after hope of finding them had been officially abandoned, they were brought out in amazingly good condition, will soon be home and well!

Despite his injuries, Pilot Flores Cuba. rigged a shelter against the driving snow, painfully tramped out the SOS that another flyer finally saw. He cut firewood with a hammer and chisel. And in the 47 days, he read his Bible aloud Charter No. 7748 to Helen, from Genesiis Ito Revela-

Their food lasted one week. In calories, the total supply added up to less than a single day's allowance under the most stringent fact that, according to the Maine Sardine Council, the 384 calories in a four ounce can of the little flishes are entirely flat and highnutrition protein, with thiamin riboflavin, nyacin, pyricoxine and all the B-complex vitamins in large supply, their meager rations can not explain their survival.

Plainly, it was the courage of this pair, and their firm belief in God that nourished an unquenchable will to survive. "We never gave up at any time," Flores told his rescuers.

Their demonstration of indomitable spirit may now hellp to rescue dispirited fellow citizens from the listless, defeatist hedonism into which we seem to be slippingperhaps through lack of inspiring example.

"We never gave up at any time," - is a braver banner than: "Eat, drink and be merry, for tomorrow we die."

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




