Offset To Opener Of New Henderson Field Is Spotted

Midland Operator To Drill Step-Out To Shell Discovery

H. L. Huffman, Ltd., Midland, will drill the No. 1-27 F. R. Henderson, Jr., one location northeast of Shell Oil Co. No. 1 F. R. Henderson, Jr., recent Wolfcamp oil discovery in Crockett County, one mile northwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the west lines of 27-OP-GS&SF. Scheduled depth is 8,500 feet, sufficient to test the Ellenburger.

The discovery was finalized April 30 for 370 barrels of 41.7 gravity oil plus 22 1/2 barrels of water, and with a gas-oil ratio of .910-1 through a 14-64-inch choke and perforations at 6,640 to 6,675 feet. It was drilled to 8,513 feet, and a failure in the Ellenburger.

Howard Olsen Development Co. will drill the No. 1 Davidson, one mile east of 2,950-foot Cleanfork production and 1 3/8 miles east and slightly north of 3,500-foot sand production the Refoil multipay field of Crockett County, 10 miles south of Ozona.

Location is 467 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 9-F-GC&SF. Contract depth is 3,300 feet.

Continental Oil Co., Ozona, will drill the No. 1-6 G. B. Hill as a 4,600-foot southeast outpost to its No. 1 Hill, opener of the two-well Denison (Strawn gas) field of Sutton County, 12 miles southwest of Ozona.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 1,650 feet from the east lines of 6-CC-Giles Hill Jr., Contract depth is 9,000 feet.

Parents of children of kindergarten age are invited to come with the prospective kindergarten to the round-up, bringing the child's birth certificate and shot record. Shots required for school enrollment are diphtheria, whooping cough and smallpox, the principal said.

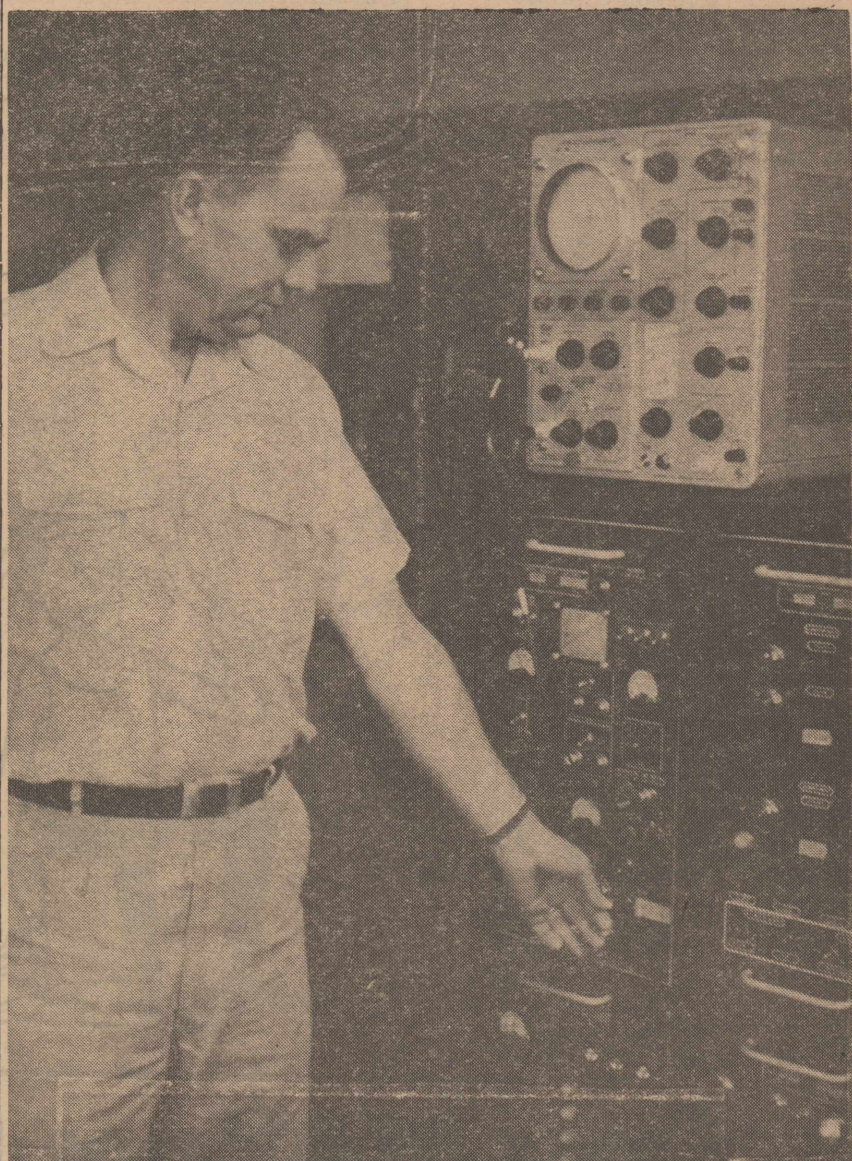
First Game In New Little League Park Set For Monday Night

Montgomery was the only district 8 performer to qualify for more than one event but posted a 20.5 in the lows and a 15.4 in the highs. Montgomery had posted 19.6 in the lows which was good enough to have won and 14.9 in the highs which would have been second or third.

Iraan's Buddy Lanehart turned in one of the top performances of the meet in broad jumping 23'7" for a new class A record and Rankin's Jerry McDonald won third in the shot.

District 8-A's other entry, Mike Holmes of Big Lake, ran his best hundred of the year to win the Class A hundred yard dash for the second year in a row with a fine 9.8 performance. Holmes got one false start and was in danger of being disqualified but despite having to start cautiously came from behind in the last fifty yards to win the contest.

Thundershower With Violent Winds Rake Ozona Area Sunday

To the accompaniment of high winds which whipped leaves and small branches from trees and stirred trash cans and other loose equipment about Ozona homes, rain came to Ozona again Sunday afternoon and night as a thundershower swept across a big part of Crockett county.

The additional welcome moisture for parts of the ranching area which had been favored in falls of the past two weeks will go far toward starting drought stricken ranges back on the road to recovery. Especially favored were parts of the county northwest and northeast from Ozona, and for some distance to the south. However, the fall was reported lighter in the far south section of the county.

Ozona received .6 of an inch of moisture in a heavy shower which began around 6 p. m. and continued intermittently for several hours.

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ROLL-CALL ON FOREIGN AID

President Kennedy, in agreeing with the Poet Milton in his foreign aid message to Congress last month that, "Peace hath her victories/No less renowned than war," added: "And no peacetime victory in history has been as far-reaching in its impact, nor served the cause of freedom so well as the victories scored in the last 17 years by this Nation's mutual defense and assistance programs."

Well, let's see — and before Congress votes that bargain-basement figures of only \$4.5 billion. The survey that follows, compiled by Brig. Gen. Bonner Fellers, national chairman of the Citizens Foreign Aid Committee (to aid American taxpayers), forms another message that every Congressman and Senator should read. We quote:

Western Europe has prospered with Marshall aid. But after 17 years and \$41 billion in U. S. aid, Western Europe meets only a fraction of its defense obligation; except for commercial loans, its aid to less developed countries is negligible.

Argentina (\$640 million aid), under indirect military domination, suffers from inflationary chaos.

Brazil (1.9 billion aid) is on the brink of Communism.

Cuba (\$52 million aid) once enjoyed immense sugar subsidy, has stolen \$1 billion in U. S. private investments: her Red satellite status is now guaranteed.

Haiti (\$100 million aid) writhes under a murderous tyranny.

Indonesia (\$670 million aid), her economy wrecked, is an armed dictatorship bent on conquest.

India (3.9 billion aid) probably faces Red Chinese attack.

Iran (\$1.3 billion aid) is a monarchy without a parliament.

Laos (\$460 million aid) may soon fall to Communists.

Poland (\$522 million aid) is Communist with all freedom gone.

South Korea (\$5.4 billion aid) is ruled by its third military junta.

South Vietnam (\$2.4 billion aid) ruled by a puppet dictator, propped up by the U. S., is racked by

a Red guerrilla war.

Turkey (\$3.8 billion aid) is politically unstable and is economically weaker than before aid began.

Venezuela (\$274 million aid), despite prodigious oil wealth, is a major target of the Russo-Cuban fifth column.

Yugoslavia (\$2.4 billion aid) is Communist with all freedom gone.

Gen. Fellers notes that these items add up to \$65 billion and that the glowing report to Congress and the dismal facts were never in sharper contrast. National self-respect, fully as much as budget balancing, demands healthy cuts in foreign aid.

Miss Tarver and Mr. Gonzales plan a May 18 wedding in the Second Baptist Church in Lubbock. Miss Tarver is the daughter

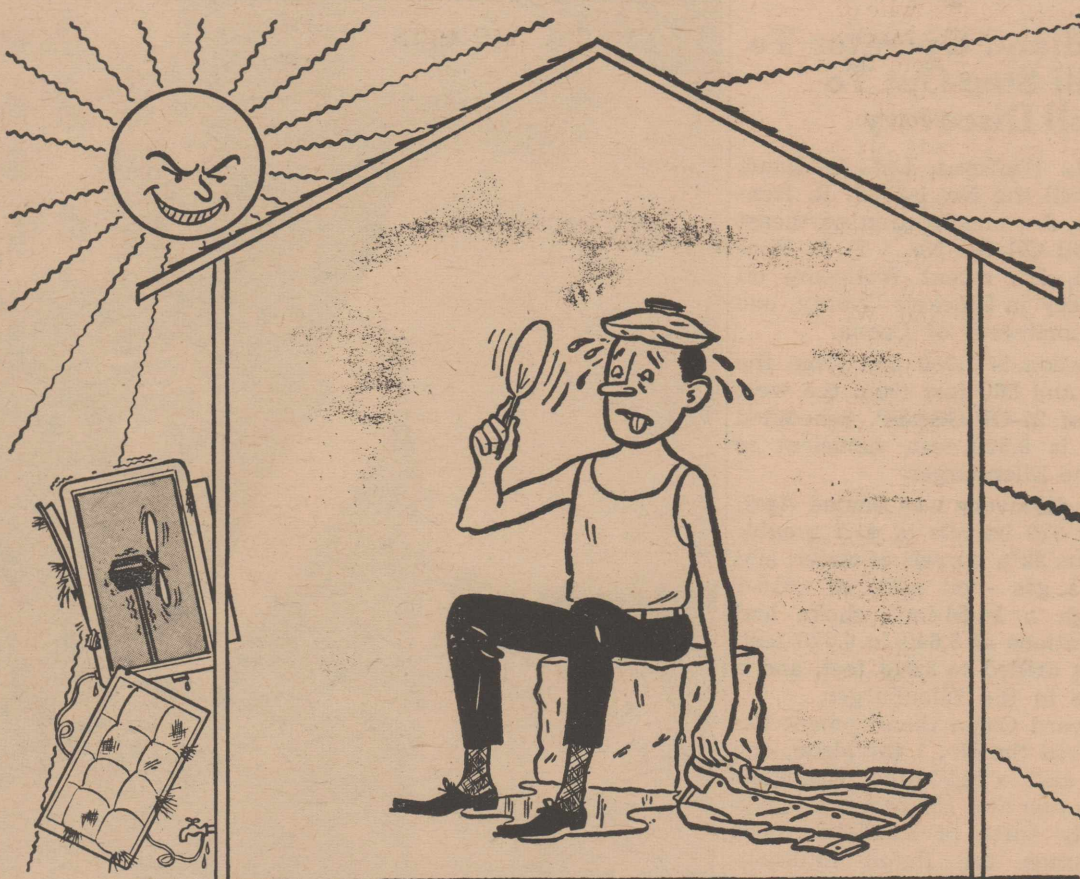
of Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Tarver of Kermit. Both she and Mr. Gonzales are teachers in the Lubbock Public School system.

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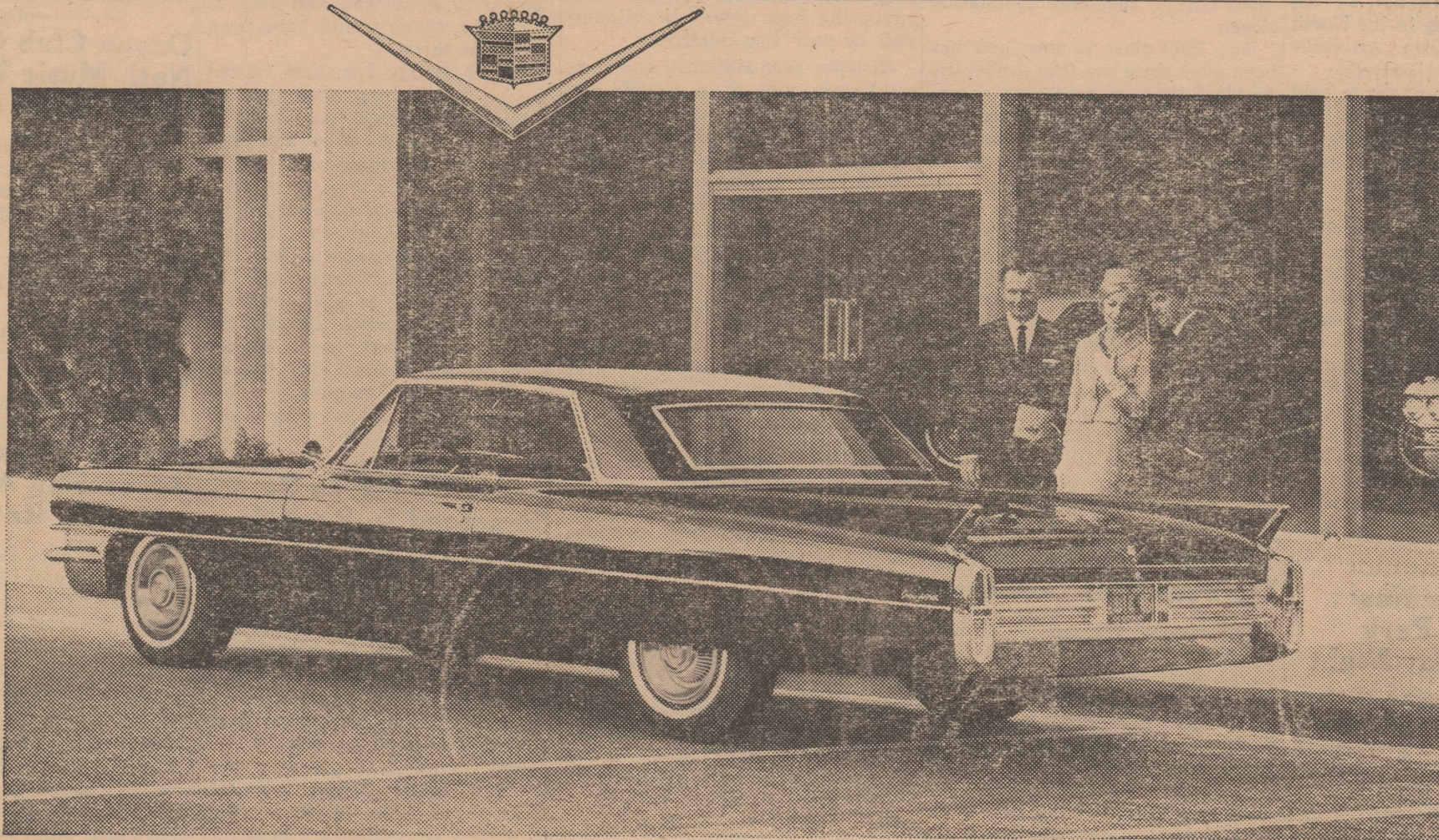

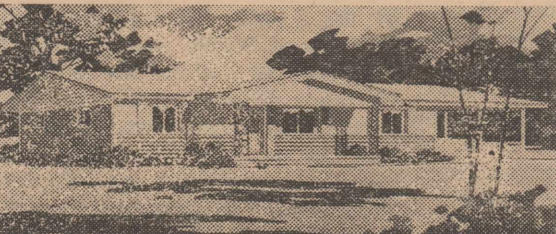

Those who are with us tonight that made that start together in kindergarten are Penn, Cheryl, Robert, Ronnie, Gail, Pauline, Pete, Brent, Floydine, Helen, Priscilla, Robin, Sostenes, Lucia and Gracie. The class could have started with a terrible name, because in that one year it had three different teachers. Some of the class have a faint memory of the boys throwing sand in one teacher's face and turning the dollhouse over on the girls, so maybe there was a reason for so many changes.

One of the first grade teachers made a big change on this group a ping-pong paddle. Evidently, the whack of the paddle carried across the hall, because after this, the class had calm sailing. The teacher believed in her class being the best. She drove an old Hudson Hornet with back seat removed, and she took her class everywhere in it.

Robin won second place in the Story Telling Contest and made the trip all the way up to high school to tell them about "The Three Bears."

The first grade class elected Gracie and Brent as their representatives of the Student Council. The next year they chose Cheryl, Ronnie and Penn. The main function of the Council in the elementary school was directing traffic, this was the year that Penn found his aim in life. The council voted him Vice-president and gave him a traffic whistle. From that one little whistle, he rose to our school's highest office, President of the High School Student Council. Robert, Deeny, Arlene, and Pauline also served on the council during the years at North Elementary.

During the second grade, Arlene and Ernie joined our class and the great event of the year was riding the train from Sonora to Eldorado. Another "end of school" trip, well remembered, was made during that fifth year to Escondido

Water Hole and Fort Lancaster. Jenn was added to the list during the third year, and Ernie moved away.

The greatest highlights were the years on the stage at Christmas and "end of the year programs." There were long stretches of nerves and headaches for the teachers, but they did make students and parents proud. It's a shame we have no colored movie of that skating team, with Priscilla, Gail, Gracie, Pete, and Robert in their little red suits, and lost forever are the pictures of Deeny, Helen, Jann, and Robin, the spring sprites, tripping across the stage in their beautiful paper dresses.

The last year at North Elementary the class produced the "Atomic Book Machine" with Cheryl and Robert as the operators. Three of the Little Women were Gail, Gracie and Kathy, with Ronnie as Tom Sawyer and Arlene as Becky Thatcher. The program read that heroic Robin Hood was little Robert Lee, and that the villain bookworm (in costume) was Pauline. These years of experience on the stage led to performances in "The Night of January 16th," and this year's version of the "Little Dog Laughed," starring Cheryl, Arlene, Pauline, Robin, Kathy, Gracie and Robert.

When the class reached the seventh grade, they moved to the Junior High Building. The grand total was 63 members. Among the graduates added to the roll was Justo. During this year, the athletes really got their start: Kathy Robin, Cheryl, Pauline, and Jann were on Miss Knox's softball team, and they won district. Then, in the eighth grade, they tried volleyball and Priscilla joined them.

Mr. Killingsworth's boys won the district the same year with Pete, Robert, and Ronnie on the team. Along with Brent and Penn, they tried track, football, and basketball those two years in Jr. High. Pauline, Jann, Tommie, Priscilla, and Kathy were cheerleaders for Jr. High.

The girls began their home-making in Junior High and took part in the style shows. Arlene, Gracie and Gail entered the "Make It Yourself With Wool" contest and won the sub-district division. Jann, Kathy, Arlene, Cheryl, Gracie, Robin, Gail, Justo, Ronnie, Robert, Helen, Penn, Priscilla, Matias, and Brent began with the band in Junior High. Jann, Cheryl, and Arlene served as twirlers during their sophomore and junior years. Members have dropped out along the way because of other interests, but Jann stayed and worked to become Drum Major and Pauline was awarded dual honors, being chosen Bend Sweetheart and President, and, along with Helen and Jann, went with the band to win 2 firsts at the Del Rio Band Festival this year.

In 1960, 50 unsuspecting freshmen entered OHS. Teachers were heard to comment that they were so quiet, you hardly knew they were there, but the trouble was

when they wanted them to speak up in class they were still quiet.

On Freshman Day, we were given the privilege of dressing as hoboes or the day to exploit the ego of upperclassmen and gave a Sadie Hawkins play for assembly with "Twinkletoes" Cox as the star.

The high school sports world saw new faces in the year of '60; Robert and Pete tried basketball. Pete came out for track, and he joined Brent and Penn for football. Brent branched further — to the wonderful world of golf. It could be that he needed the peace and quiet of the country to relax. During the sophomore year, Brent joined the basketballers, and their junior year they played in Lubbock for regional. Ronnie, Brent, Robert, and Penn started running track. Billie and Ronnie donned football uniforms as sophomores, and Robert as a junior. Sostenes did a good job for the team as a senior. At the end of the junior year, Jann was voted Football Sweetheart and this year Cheryl won the honor.

The girl's sports branched out into basketball and volleyball during the freshman year. They consisted of Jann, Kathy, Robin, Pauline, Gail, Cheryl, Cilia, and Tommie. By the time they were juniors, the basketball team was good enough to make the trip to Lubbock and try for regional. The real reason behind this success could be the hiring of a new manager that year by the name of Gracie who had many years of experience in managing. Her profession was joined this year by Arlene. Pauline, Robin and a lowly junior were captains this year of 63.

The boys gained a friend in the cheering section when Kathy was voted to be one of their leaders. She has worked for them for three years and is now head cheerleader. This year Cheryl was added to the squad. In the office of President, Cheryl and Brent led this class, each serving a period of 2 years. During the four years, other class offices were filled by Pete, Penn, Arlene, and Kathy. The class, as freshmen, chose Gracie and Pete as their favorites. Arlene won honor for the class in Interscholastic League in typing as a sophomore, and this year Cheryl and Pete were class favorites. The class as juniors took pride because Jann was selected as the most

beautiful in high school. The great shock of that year — Penn was selected as the best citizen in the whole school — and after all the years spent with him, his classmates were well aware of what goes on in his little cotton-pickin' head. They quietly looked him over and decided the improvement was astonishing since the ole kindergarten days, so, as number one high school citizen, they would go along with the teachers and make him junior class favorite with Kathy as their choice for the girls. The year of 1963 finds the group as seniors and soon the members will march by to receive their diplomas. This year, they have the privilege of attending their own banquet, something they have well earned. This year, the school voted Kathy and Pete to represent them as Mr. and Miss OHS. Gracie is the editor of the Annual Staff.

The senior class favorites are Pauline and Brent, and Cheryl is this year's winner of the Betty Crocker award. The 4-H and FFA boys chose Kathy for their sweetheart. Kathleen came to join us in graduation from Utah and two old exes returned this year, Densley and Ernie.

At this point, many thanks are due to our sponsors, Miss Powers, Coach Hoover, and Mr. Fife. Our thanks go to them and our mothers for many happy hours and help in concession stands. As we bring this chapter of our school life to a close, we think of some we lost along the way. Let's not forget Jimmy, Marty, and Patty, who were with us many years, but moved to other school, and Gladys who departed this year to graduate elsewhere, also Tommie, who decided to start housekeeping.

So it is with a dash of our pen we close and our thoughts go on to greater things ahead, and we'll leave behind to you the worries of concession stands and the excitement of the senior trip.

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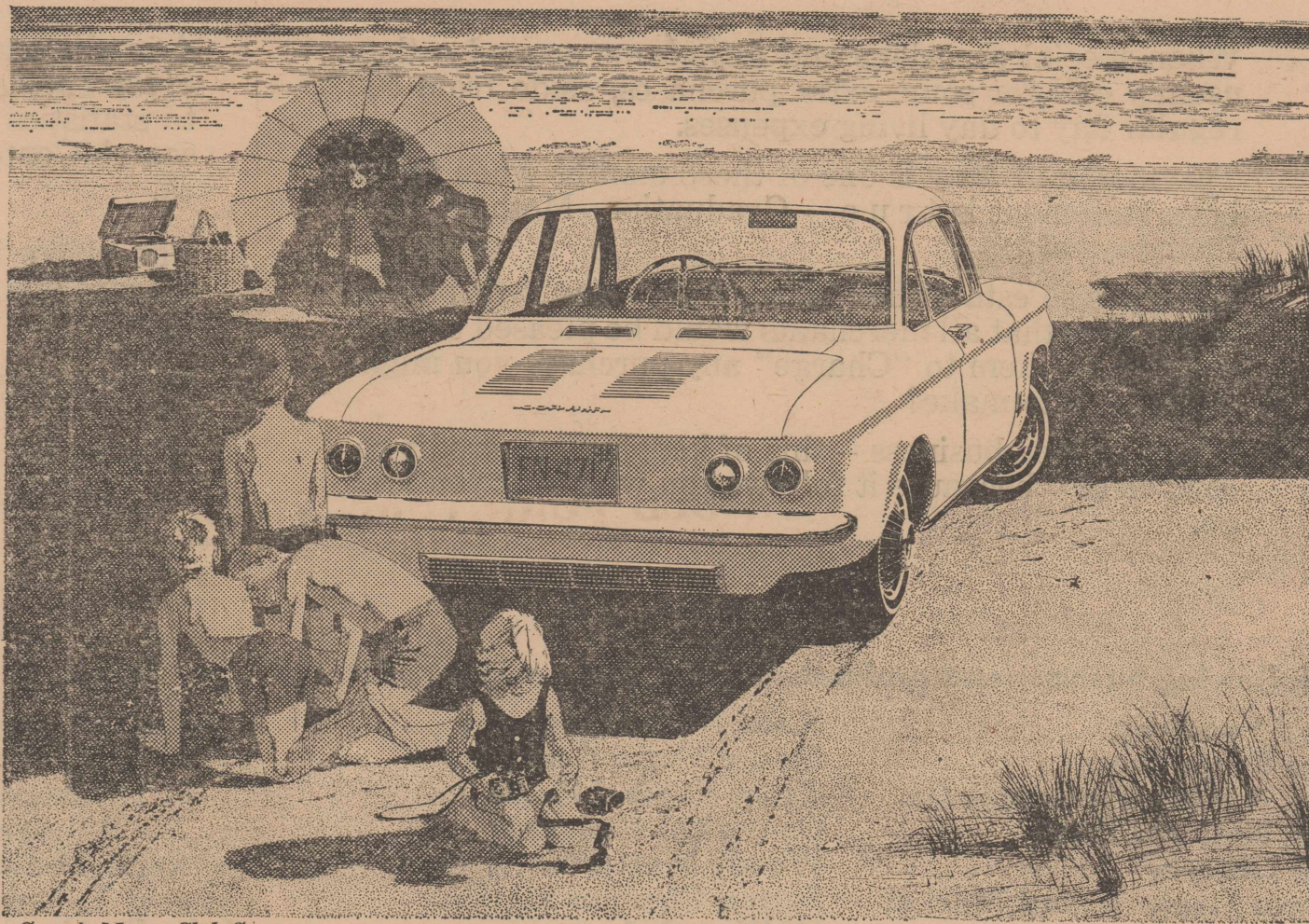

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Kilby are the parents of a son, Andrew Clayton Kilby, born in the Crockett Co. Hospital May 6.

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You have only a limited time in which to spray for the casebearer for effective control. Spraying should be done within nine days from appearance of eggs. In that period, the insect hatches out and is present on the tree. After the larva has entered the young tender nut, the damage has already been done.

Two sprayings are recommended for the control of casebearers — ten days apart. This will get the second-generation larva.

We are using a "Combination Spray" for casebearers, pecan scab and rosette. These are the principal pests that attack pecan trees in this section.

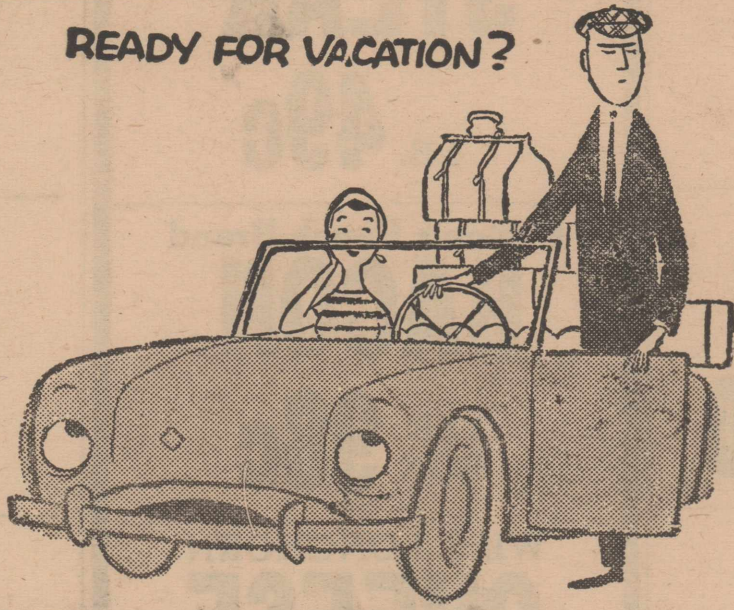
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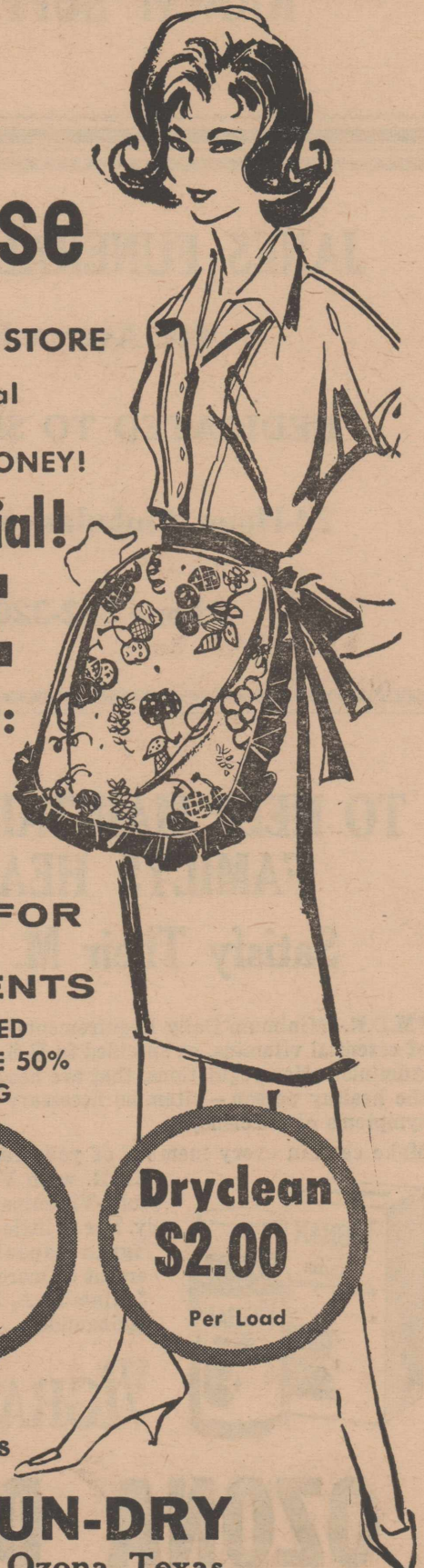
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Coronation Service Is Climax Of Focus Week For Girls Auxiliary
