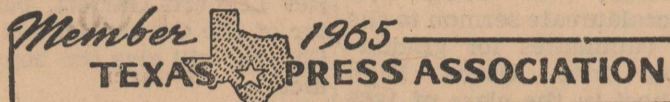

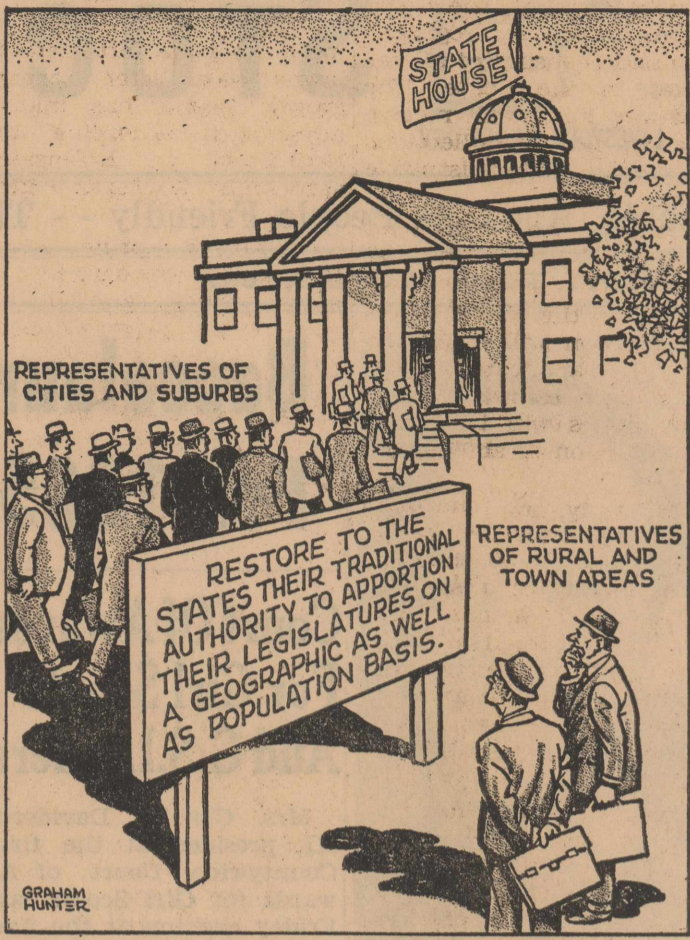

**MONEY 'LITTERED' AWAY
Million And Half Dollars Worth Of Roads Never Built**

Austin, Texas — Texas motorists paid for many miles of new highways last year. But they never were built.

Governor Conally emphasized this point today in accepting the first of a quarter-million litter bags given to the Texas Highway Department by the Galveston Chamber of Commerce and the Galveston Convention and Tourist Bureau.

The bags will be distributed to motorists at each of the eight Tourist Information Centers located at points of entry on key highways of the State and in the Capitol rotunda.

"The Texas Highway Department is charged with the construction and maintenance of the State's superb 66,000-mile highway system," Governor Conally said. He added:

"But the truth is that more than \$1.5 million of taxes levied on highway users is wasted each year to pick up litter thrown along the right of way by careless motorists. This money could better be used to build more miles of new highways, and to protect the taxpayers' \$4 billion investment in our existing system."

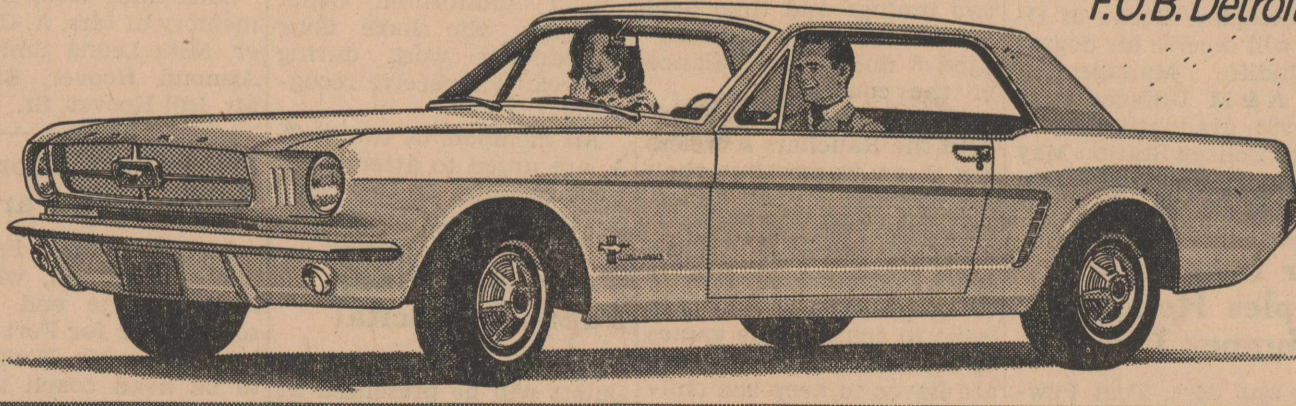

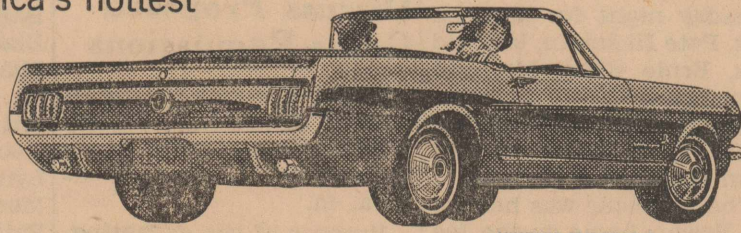

HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

From Your State Capitol

Austin, Texas — Biggest job of the 59th Legislature — writing the \$3,600,000,000 biennial budget for state government — has been quietly wrapped up in conference committee this week.

Conferees were playing a game of "beat-the-clock" to wind up before Easter holidays.

If they fail to make it, such important issues as teachers' pay raises and balancing tax measures would be postponed until dangerously late in the session.

Redistricting Now or Never — Sub-committee chairmen of the House redistricting committee huddled this week to compare notes on how legislative and congressional districts should be carved up under court order.

Senate already has passed two versions of a plan to increase its membership from 31 to 39 to help the work along.

Indications are that the House plans to give big presentation allowable. This counties the minimum re-to make the painful task of reapportionment as easy as possible on rural areas which must yield representation any way you look at it.

State lawmakers are hopeful congress soon will pass a bill authorizing a 15 per cent variation above and below the mathematical average population per district. Speaker Barnes, on advice of Texas congressmen, predicts U. S. Supreme Court would yield that far in its one-man-one-vote edict.

Prestige Plates To Be Available To Texas Motorists

Austin, Texas — Now Texans have a new status symbol. Personalized, prestige auto license plates.

A bill approved by the Legislature and signed by Governor Connally Thursday authorizes issuance of personalized license plates upon payment of a \$10 fee in addition to normal auto registration charges.

Not only may Texans have their automobiles identified with distinctive one-of-a-kind license plates but the Texas treasury will get a substantial boost, too.

It has been estimated that the measure may raise as much as \$5 million — or personalized plates on one of every dozen vehicles registered in the State. Ninety-five per cent of all fees will be paid to the State's General Fund.

The measure was recommended by Governor Connally to help finance the Texas program for tourism, recreation and State parks. The Governor also suggested that Texas join in an Interstate Tourist Compact for tourist advertising overseas to make known the attractions of the United States.

Mental Facilities Revamped — A bill calling for massive reshuffling of all state facilities and programs for mental health and retardation has been signed into law.

Legislation brings services under new Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation. It anticipates gradual shift in next decade from institutional care in state mental hospitals and special schoolsto 'community care' in or near patients' homes.

Governor already has signed bill to place tuberculosis control and eradication facilities in State Health Department. These two bills in effect abolish the present Board for Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools which has administered mental hospitals, special schools and th hospitals.

States. The bill will be administered by the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department, the agency responsible for registration and licensing of all vehicles in the State. The Highway Fund will receive five per cent of collections to defray administrative costs.

Although the bill does not become effective until 90 days after the Legislature adjourns, the Motor Vehicle Division will begin accepting applications at once. The estimated date that plates will be issued for use is on or about August 24.

Obviously, only one plate of a kind may be issued. And it will go to the first applicant. Once a specific, personalized license plate has been assigned to a motorist, it will be reserved for his use in succeeding years if his renewal application is submitted by January 1.

All applications must be sent to the Motor Vehicle Division, Texas Highway Department, 40th & Jackson, Austin. Application forms now are available at the individual county tax assessor-collector's office. They must be accompanied by the \$10 personalized license registration fee. A similar fee, in addition to normal registration charges, will be required each year a personalized plate is issued.

Motorists are requested to submit at least three choices for embossing on their personalized plates. Preference will be given to their first choice.

The motorist may want his license plate to bear the name of his dog, his wife, his mother-in-law — or even his own initials. He may want to call attention to his hobby, his business — or his girl friend.

Characters on the personalized plates — either numbers, letters, or a combination of both, will be limited to six. Contrary to normal policy the use of vowels will not be prohibited.

Fertilization Of Lawns In Spring Is Recommended

College Station — Applying a complete fertilizer to lawns soon after spring growth begins has many advantages, according to Neal Pratt, an Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University.

Pratt says spring lawn fertilization encourages early growth and early green color, improves water-use efficiency, and increases hardiness and drought resistance because fertilizer helps the grass to develop a stronger, deeper root system.

Complete fertilizers are those containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium, Pratt said. Common examples are 12-12-12 and 10-10-10. The numbers represent the pounds of the nutrients in each 100 pounds.

The rule-of-thumb in applying fertilizer to lawns is to use 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet, according to the agronomist. With the complete fertilizer recommended for early application, the

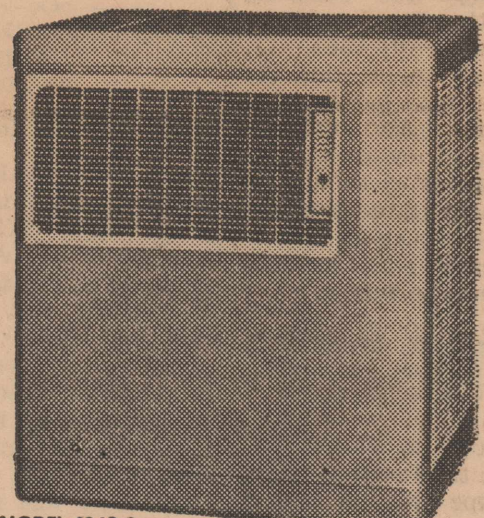

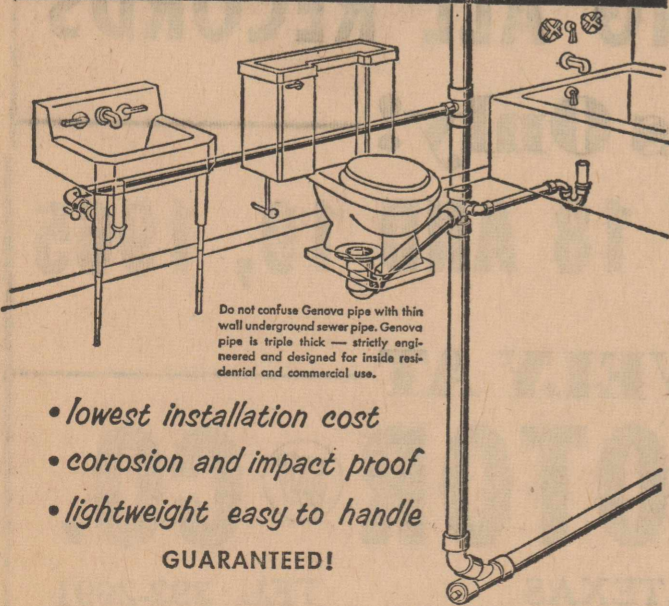

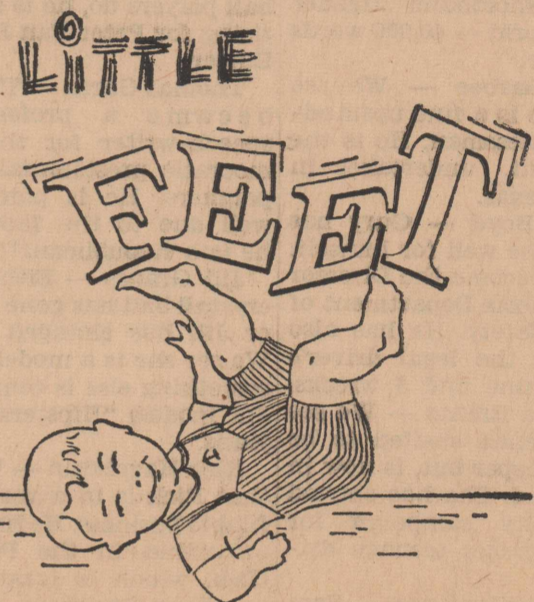
