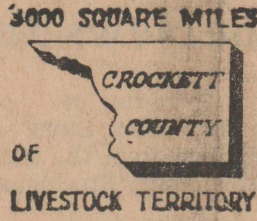

New Parish Center To Be Blessed Sunday

The new Parish Center of Our Lady of Perpetual Help church will be blessed this Sunday, Sept. 15th, by the Most Rev. Thomas A. Tschoepe, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of San Angelo, the pastor, Father Louis Moeller announced this week.

The metal building proper was erected by the AAA Structures Inc., of Midland at a cost of \$42,000. The stage area, dressing rooms, storage, basketball goals, etc. were built by the parishioners themselves, largely from lumber salvaged from the old parish hall.

In addition to the main auditorium, 120'x50'x20', the building boasts a large modern kitchen, two double rest rooms, two Educational rooms, three storage closets and is completely air-conditioned throughout.

The public is invited to the dedication beginning at 12 noon, to be followed by a barbecue dinner in the new hall. A program of speeches and Spanish dances will be held afterwards, followed by a "Fall Festival" in the afternoon and a dance at night.

Two Accidents Result In Damage To Motor Vehicles

Highway Patrolman Orvil Perry investigated two automobile accidents during the past week. Damage was several hundred dollars, but there were no injuries.

The first occurred Saturday morning at 3:30 around 18 miles west of town on Hwy. 290. Stanley Eicken of Carlonsville, Ill. was driving a 1965 Ford Mustang toward Ozona when he lost control as he rounded a curve, hitting 2 guard posts and skidding into a dirt bank. Eicken said he was blinded by the lights of an oncoming car. Neither he nor a passenger in the car was injured, but the car suffered 9750 damage.

Around midnight Tuesday, 21 miles south of town on Hwy 163, a 1964 panel truck driven by Dale Berry of Lubbock hit a deer as it ran into the road. Damage to the truck was \$400. There were no personal injuries to the three passengers.

Spread Sterile Flies To Combat Worm Outbreaks

Screwworm cases continue to rage in the county as 36 additional cases have been reported since last week, according to county agent Pete W. Jacoby. Cases reported through Tuesday of this week bring the total in the county this year to 83 cases since July 14.

Screwworm officials advise that all areas reporting heavy infestations are being heavily bombarded with sterile screwworm flies. Ranchmen are urged to use all preventive management practices possible to reduce cases, and to report all cases by collecting a sample and sending it in to Screwworm headquarters at Mission.

Second Big Sand Frac Job Done On Well In Crockett

Another giant "frac-ing" job on a Crockett county well was done Wednesday morning by a Halliburton crew out of Rankin at a Delta Drilling Co. well on the Helbing ranch about 7 miles southwest of Ozona.

A battery of tanks and pumping units delivering 100 barrels of brine water with sand per minute at a depth of approximately 7,000 feet was used in completing the gas-distillate producer. Under 75,000 pound of pressure 250,000 gallons of brine water and 312,500 pounds of sand were injected into the well. The pumping units developed 12,000 hydraulic horsepower in the operation.

Heading the Halliburton crew were C. R. Sproul and C. E. Taylor of Rankin. Sproul is the son of Mrs. Ray Sproul, assistant to the office manager of the Crockett-Sutton county ASCS office in Ozona.

This was the second largest frac job in the county, the largest on a high pressure well on the John Mitchell ranch.

Lions Host Junction In Season Opener Here Friday Night At 8

PAUL EGGERS SPEAKS - GOP Candidate For Governor Is Ozona Visitor

Pointing to the recently uncovered scandals in the liquor control board administration in Texas, Paul Eggers, Wichita Falls attorney and candidate for governor of Texas on the Republican ticket, asked how we can expect to have "law and order with that sort of thing going on in our state government."

Eggers was speaking to a group of members of the Ozona Rotary Club and their invited guests at the club's regular noon luncheon Tuesday at El Sombrero Cafe. Eggers and his party arrived by plane shortly before the noon hour and were off to Del Rio for another speaking engagement in the afternoon. He was slated to speak in the evening at a Farmers Union meeting in Uvalde.

Mr. Eggers said that he had already visited more than 200 communities in Texas and that he found the people disillusioned with the politicians and looking for new leadership. The power of government, he said, must come from the people. Too much of the power now is going to Washington and decisions that affect Texas and Texans are being made in Washington that properly should be made in Austin or at the local level.

"I'm here to let you know how I stand," the Republican candidate said, and he outlined his ideas for improving the lot of Texans.

"I have been to the poverty areas," he said, "and I find the people wanting a chance rather than a hand-out. We need to make them responsible people with more vocational and technical training opportunities that they might become self-sustaining."

"People are at the point of rebellion about taxes," the speaker said. "If I am elected your governor I will appoint a Hoover type commission to study Texas government with a view to paring where-

The Ozona Lions will host the Junction Eagles tomorrow night in Lion Stadium, in their opening game of the '68 football season. Kick-off time is 8:00 p. m.

Head coach Sam Mosley and assistant Rip Sewell have thirteen returning lettermen this year, six backfielders and seven linemen.

The Eagles, who lost to the Lions 31-0 in their last

encounter, outweigh the Lions this year and have a big starting lineup. Mosley said after watching Junction beat Llano last Friday night in Junction, he felt the Lions had their work cut out for them. The majority of the Junction players are juniors and this could work to the Lions advantage. Nine seniors, one sophomore and a junior will start for the Lions.

Mosley said the Eagles were a much better ball club this year than he expected. However, he said the Lions have an impressive defensive club to go up against the Eagles on the ground and the offense is improving daily.

The Lions held Robert Lee scoreless in a scrimmage last Thursday and have yet to allow their opposition to score in pre-season scrimmages.

Mosley said expect for a few bruises, the team is in good shape and that they will all be able and ready to play tomorrow night.

Drawing the starting quarterback position for the Lions will be senior Randel Clepper, a three-year veteran who handles the team well.

The backfield starters will be Rodney Pagan at fullback position, a 175 pound senior who has lettered the past two years for the Lions; Carlos Sanchez will be in the wingback position, a senior letterman; Fleet Coates, all-district halfback last year, will see action as tailback. Coates averaged 7 yards everytime he got his hands on the ball last year.

Starting center for the Lions is 215-pound Marlin Farris, Sr. and 3-year letterman. Tom Davidson, 170-pound sophomore who lettered his freshman year with the club, will be at guard position, along with all-district guard Johnny Barbee, 160 pound senior.

Filling the shoes of Wesley West and Gary Sutton at tackle positions will be Rodney Rutherford, 195 pound senior, and Sooner Williams, 165 pound junior with B team experience.

At end will be two starters from last year, Donald Huff and Danny Maness, both seniors.

Mr. Teele, 63, was born March 10, 1905, in Stacy and had lived in Big Lake since 1924. Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Rata Stephens of Lubbock; two brothers, Oliver Teele of Eldorado and Grover Teele of Mertzton and two granddaughters.

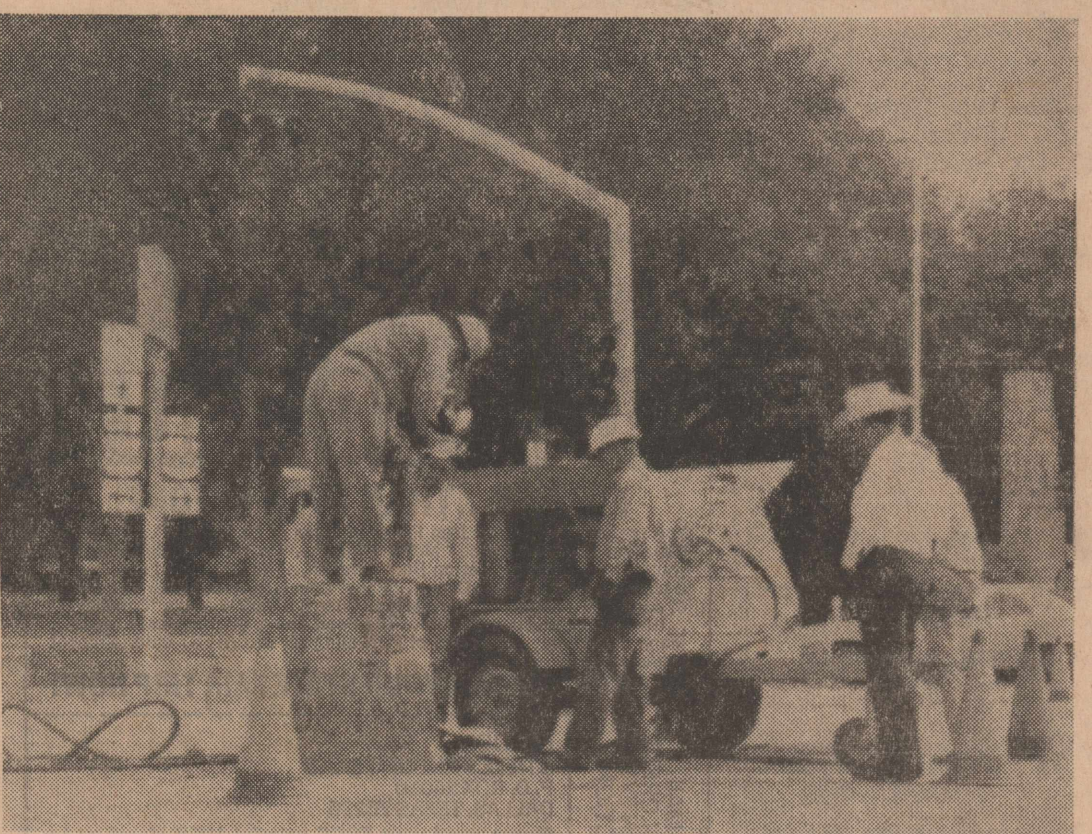
South Elementary PTA Opens Year

Jack Alexander, GOP Congressional Candidate, Visits

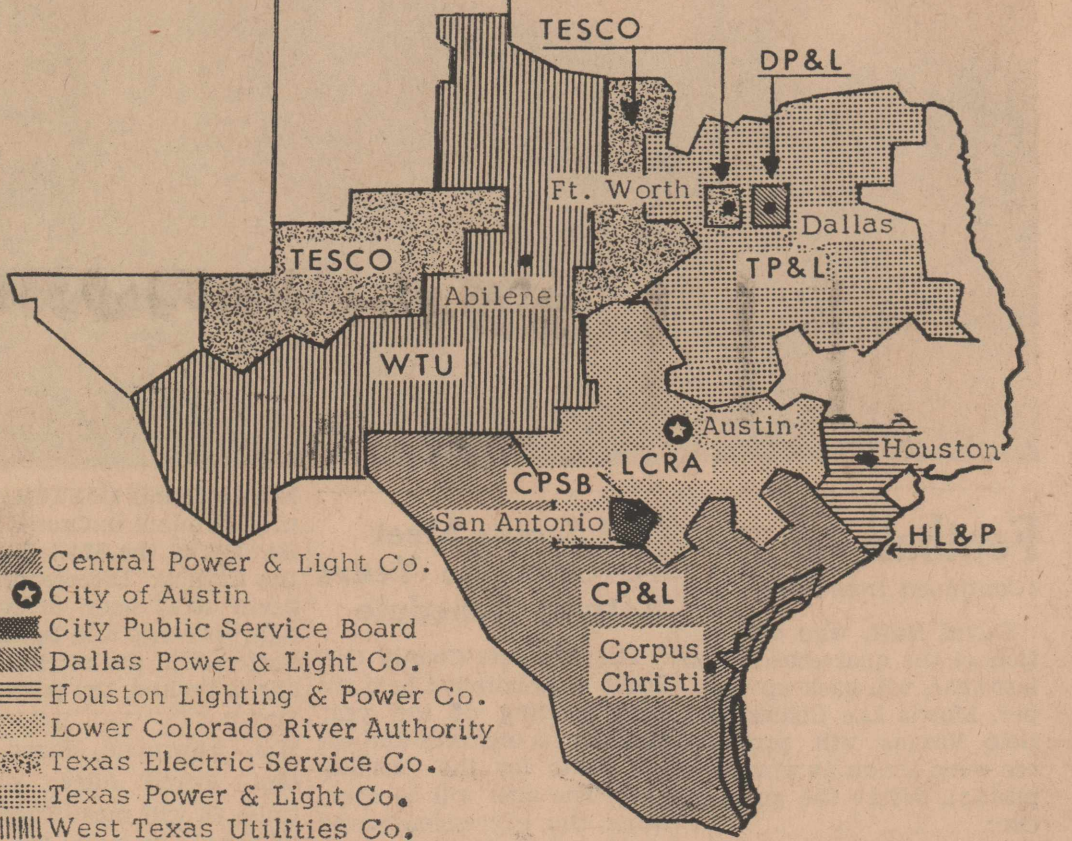

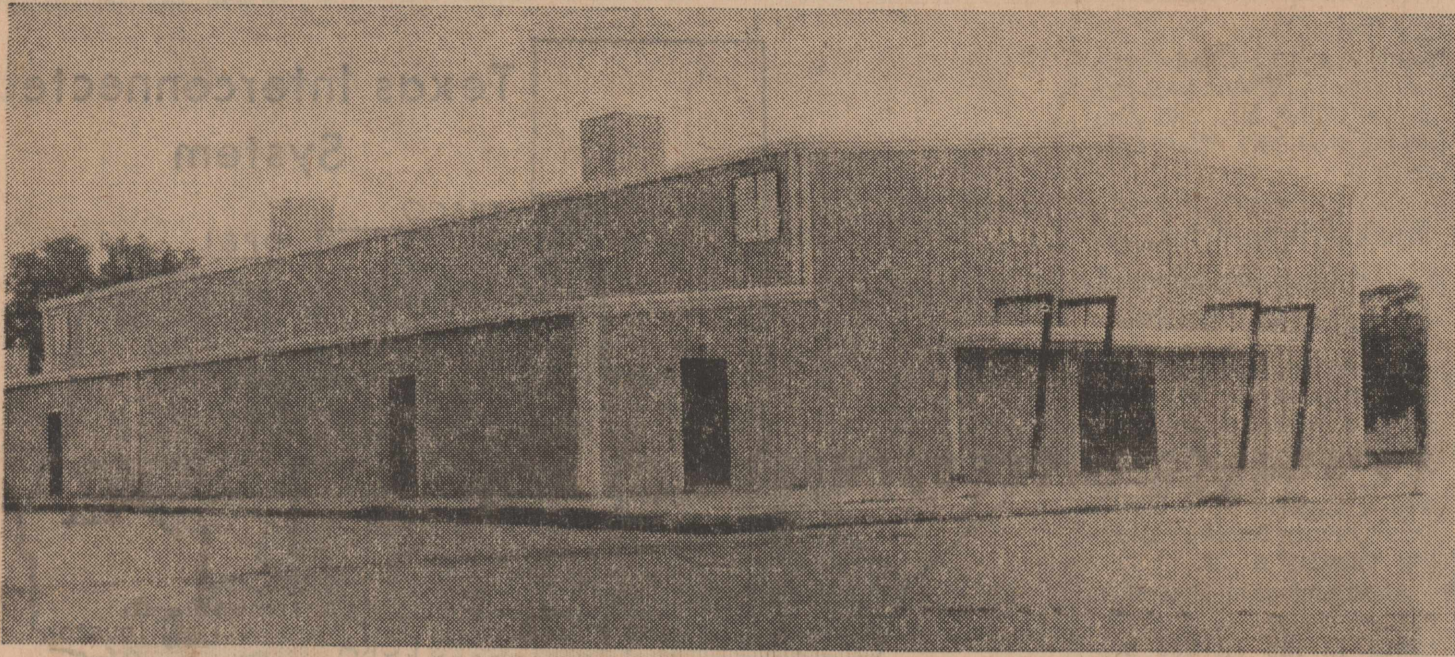

"People, too, are fed up with the permissive society. You can't just say you are for law and order and get anything done. Rehabilitation programs, training programs for law enforcement officers, and reaching the juvenile delinquent before he reaches the grand jury, are needed moves in Texas as elsewhere."

Mr. Eggers pointed out the entrenched bureaucracy under the one-party system in Texas and urged that Texans break the yoke and adopt the two-party system for good this year, so that politicians in the future would of necessity be more responsive to the public will.

"I am no professional politician," Mr. Eggers declared, "But I am interested enough in my state to offer my time and whatever talents I may possess in behalf of better government in Texas."

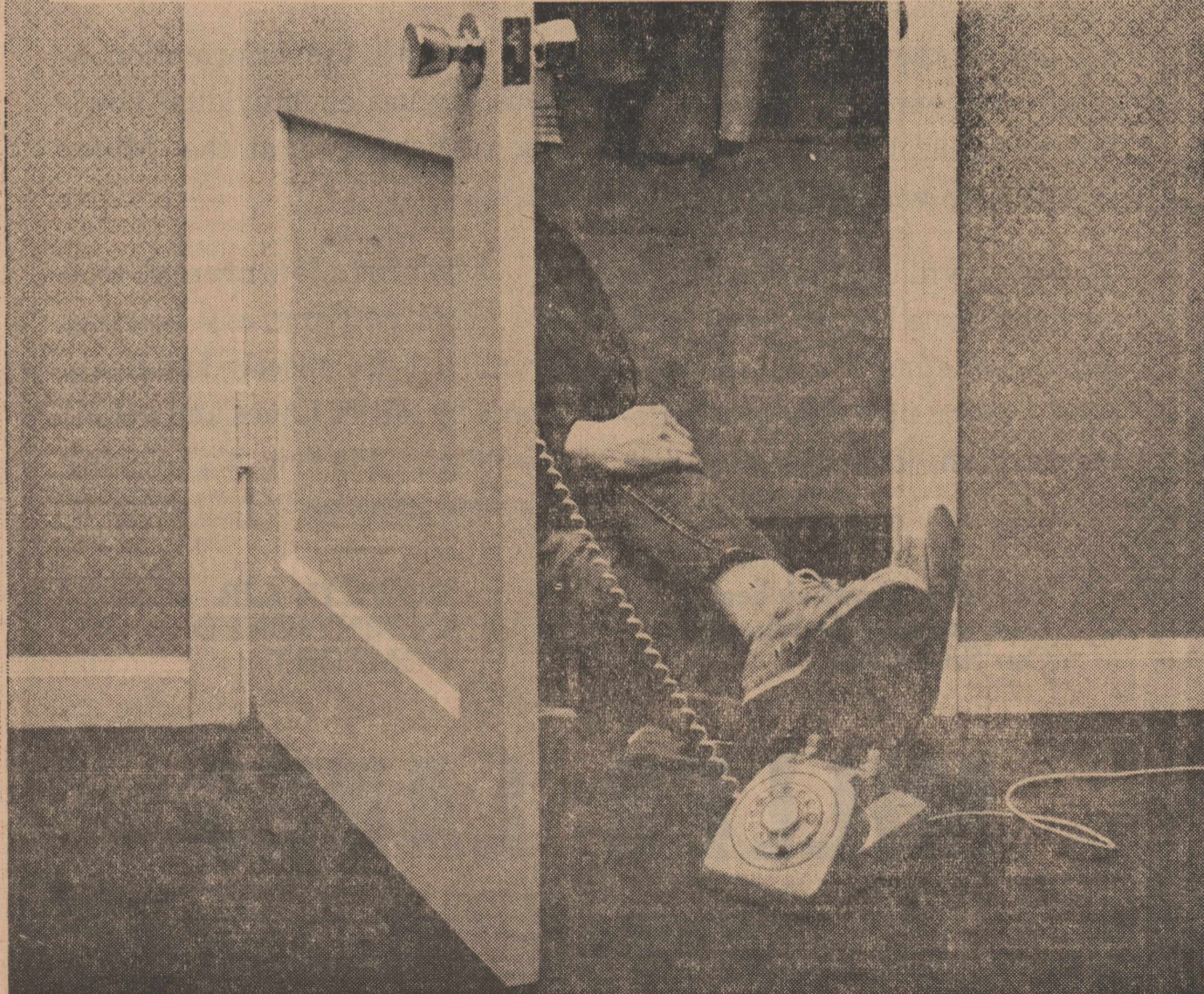
