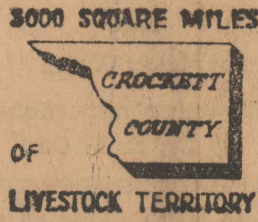

Stanton Here Friday For Last Home Game Of Season For Lions

The Ozona Lions will host the Stanton Bulldogs Friday night in the last home game of the football season. The Lions and Bulldogs are tied in district play 2-0. Kick-off time is 7:30.

Big Lake beat the Lions 19-0 Friday night in Big Lake. Although the three Owl touchdowns came on Lion fumbles, Big Lake also outplayed Ozona in the statistics department.

The Owls had 14 first downs to the Lions 7, 192 yards rushing to 79 for the Lions, 64 yards passing to 32, lost no fumbles while the Lions lost 3, and intercepted 1 pass.

Big Lake's Joe Barnes, 165 pound junior quarterback turned in an outstanding performance. He did the kicking and punting for the Owls, while picking up yards on the ground and connecting with passes to weigh the scales heavily in favor of Big Lake.

The Lions forced the Owls to kick the first two times they got the ball in the first period, but a fumble on the Lion 30-yd. line gave the Owls good field position and set up a Big Lake touchdown. Barnes carried for a first down, ran in for the score and added the extra point to give the Owls a 7-0 edge. Both teams battled toe to toe in the second period and there was no scoring.

Ozona fumbled in the third quarter on their own 34 to set up another Owl score. After a short drive, tailback Sam Douglas hit the middle from the 3 for the score. The PAT failed.

It was the same song, second verse in the fourth period when the Lions fumbled on their 32-yd. line and the Owls tailback Douglas scored again. The PAT failed and that was the ball game.

Fleet Coates led in rushing for the Lions with 63 yards in 17 carries for a 3.7 average. Rodney Pagan carried 5 times for 15 yards and a 3-yd. average. Randel Clepper carried 5 times for 5 yards and a 1-yd. average. David Huff was 4 for 8 in the passing department for 32 yards.

Big Lake's Owlets Defeat Ozona's Cubs

Big Lake's Owlets came, saw, and conquered Thursday night as they played the Cubs in Lion Stadium here, picking up a 6-22 victory.

The Cubs led 6-0 as the first quarter ended. The score came with Phben Tam-bunga hitting Mike Wellman on the 20-yard line of the Owlets and two plays later Gary Don Whitley powered over from the 3 for the score.

The extra point failed and the Cubs led 6-0 going into the second period.

However, the Owlets took the lead early in the second period when Harley Miller hit Roger Neil on the 30 yard line of the Lions and Neil ran for the score. Neil also picked up the 2 points to give the Owlets an 8-6 lead.

The Owlets went on the score two more times in the second and third quarter. The Cubs beefed up the defense in the fourth period and held the heavier Owlets, but the offense was unable to move.

Brush Control Takes Priority In Conservation Work

Control of mesquite and cedar infestation of range land has taken priority in ACP conservation work in 1968, Cliff Elder, office manager for the Crockett-Sutton County ASCS, reported in a letter to producers this week. Eighty-one producers in Crockett and Sutton counties have carried out mesquite and cedar control practices.

Other practices for the 1968 year included 8,657 acres of improvement for vegetative cover; 1,734 feet of water wells for livestock water; 6 new water storage tanks for livestock; 28,988 feet of pipelines for distribution of livestock water; 9.93 miles of cross fence construction for better distribution of livestock water; 47,423 acres of land on which brush and cactus control work was carried out.

For the second time in about a month, a small unoccupied house just off Highway 163 near the Gurley Draw bridge in south Ozona caught fire yesterday afternoon, this time resulting in almost complete destruction.

The small house belonged to Santos Cervantez, Sr. A blaze in the house was extinguished by the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department recently. The structure was enveloped in flames when the alarm was turned in yesterday and about all the department could do was to douse the blaze to prevent damage to nearby houses.

Red Cross To Gather Gifts For Military Patients

Each year the Red Cross has provided a Christmas gift bag for every patient spending the holidays in the military hospitals in this area. The office of this territory, located in San Antonio, reports that they have been informed by hospital authorities they expect their inpatient population will be near 1125 at holiday time.

The total will include approximately 900 men and 225 women. The Red Cross is working on packaging gift bags of two types to include at least one present appropriate to each patient. The area office has appealed to local chapters in the area for help in this project.

Local community clubs and groups are urged to participate in the program, along with the local chapter. Due to difficulty in shipping items they have asked that those wishing to participate consider a gift contribution of money. Then the gift items can be purchased locally at a considerable saving, while insuring uniformity of gifts.

With the swiftness and efficiency of our air-evacuation people today, there will be many servicemen arriving from Southeast Asia who had not yet received parcels from home, and perhaps, because of it being close to Christmas may receive no gift on Christmas Day other than the one the Red Cross, with help of the public, provides.

Lion B Meets San Angelo Lee This Afternoon

The Ozona Lion B team will travel to San Angelo this afternoon for a game with the Lee Junior High freshmen. Game time is 4:00 o'clock. The Lions are 6-2 for the season and will be hoping to pick up a win this afternoon and bounce McCamey here next week, to end the season 8-2.

The Lions beat Big Lake 25-8 last Thursday night in Big Lake.

Two long drives with both teams scoring highlighted the first quarter of play last Thursday night at Big Lake. The Lions received and drove downfield 80 yards to score. Greg Stuart hit paydirt for the Lions from 15 yards out and kicked one through the uprights for the extra point. The Owls scored next on a 70-yard drive, getting the touchdown on fourth down from 1-yard out. The PAT failed and going into the second quarter it was 7-6 Ozona.

Early in the second period the Lions scored again. Driving from the 20, Philip Perner broke through the middle on the Owl 45 to race into the end zone for the score. The PAT failed. The Owls scored again when a bad snap from center on a punt attempt sailed over Stuart's head. Stuart got the ball in the end zone, but was tackled before he could run it out giving the Owls a 2-point safety.

There was no score in the third quarter, but Ozona completely dominated the fourth quarter. David Williams hit Arturo Torres for a 35-yard pass and run combination to give the Lions a 19-8 lead. The Lions scored again when Joe Cantu hit off tackle for 45 yards and his first touchdown of the year. The PAT failed, ending the scoring 25-8, the Lions.

Quatro Davidson headed up the defense with 9 tackles to his credit.

voters went to the polls to cast their ballots, out of the 1,788 eligible voters in the county.

The Democrats won the county with a large plurality of the vote with the exception of the presidential race, where the Wallace vote gave the Humphrey-Muskie ticket the edge. Total votes in the presidential election in the county were: Humphrey-Muskie, 571; Nixon-Agnew, 509, and Wallace-Lemay, 279. Humphrey carried precinct 1 and 4, with precincts 2 and 3 going for Nixon. Nixon also carried the absentee box. Wallace received his heaviest vote in precinct 3, but failed to carry the vote in any precinct.

Incumbent Democrat Congressman O. C. Fisher polled 1,035 votes against Jack Alexander of Odessa, Republican for Congress, who polled a surprising 243. Pete Snellson, who unseated Dorsey Hardeman in the Democratic primary, received 993 votes from Crockett county while his Republican opponent, Earnest Angelo, received 313.

Paul Eggers polled the largest Republican vote for a state office in the county with 460, but Preston Smith topped him with 864 votes for Governor.

In the two local races for commissioner, Bill Black, Democrat, won the race in precinct 2, with 184 votes against 91 for Charles Applewhite, the Republican; Jesse Marley won in precinct 1 with 272 votes against 173 for James Baggett, his Republican opponent.

Beginning the first of August no less than 80 flabbergasted families in Trenton received a government check and in mid-August they received another. Twice a month the 80 lucky families get a check drawn on the US Treasury, and there are no

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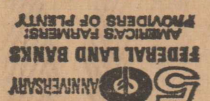

The Eldorado Woman's club invited members of the Forum to a luncheon in Eldorado November 19, honoring the district president.

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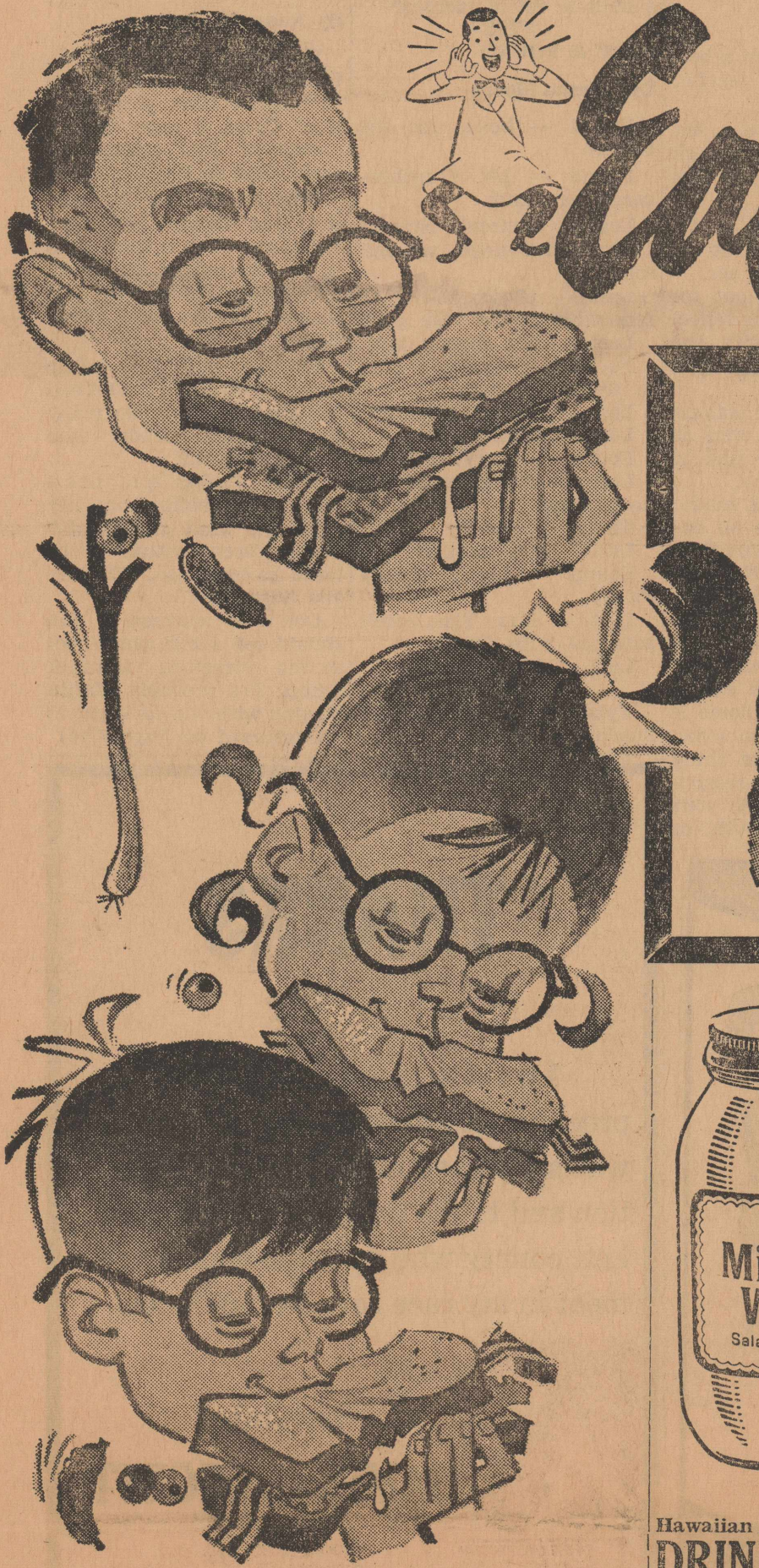
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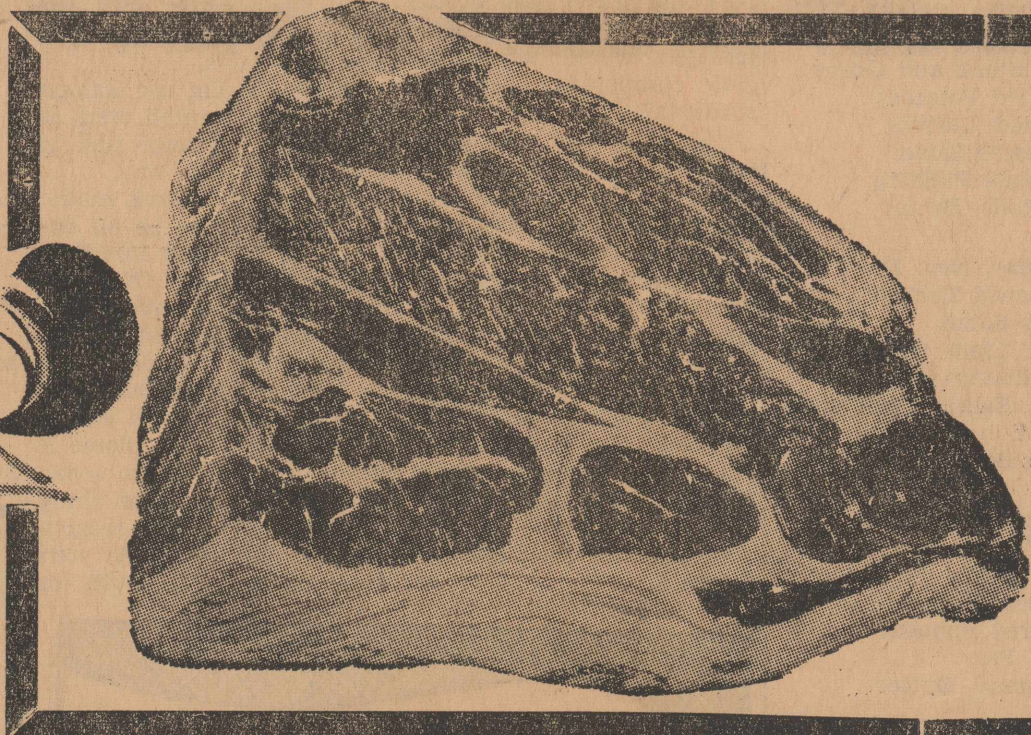
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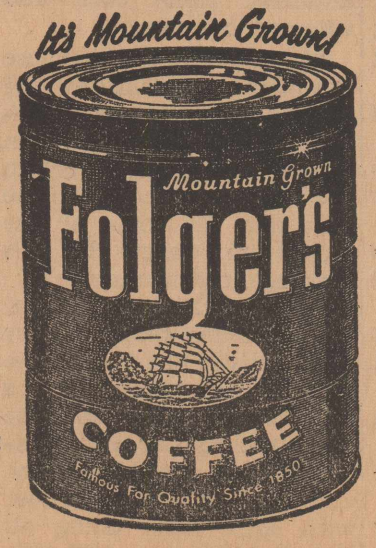
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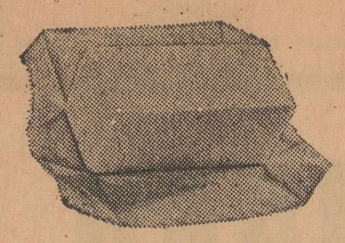


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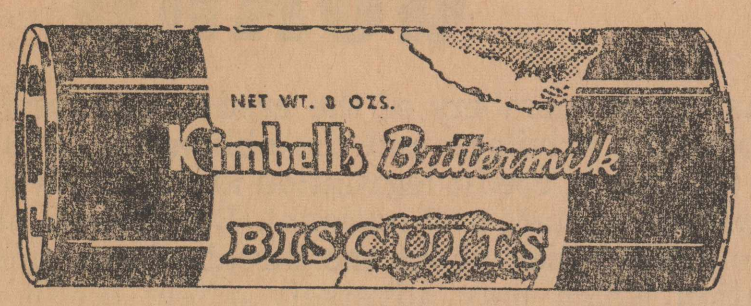

Work in close conjunction with the credit bureau so that together we can keep the credit economy of this entire area on a sound, profitable basis.

Call the Bureau on all new applicants — all newcomers to our town. Also call the Bureau and let us know of any delinquencies or chargeoffs you may have. This way each individual's record may be kept current and up-to-date, and will not necessitate so much calling to re-check.

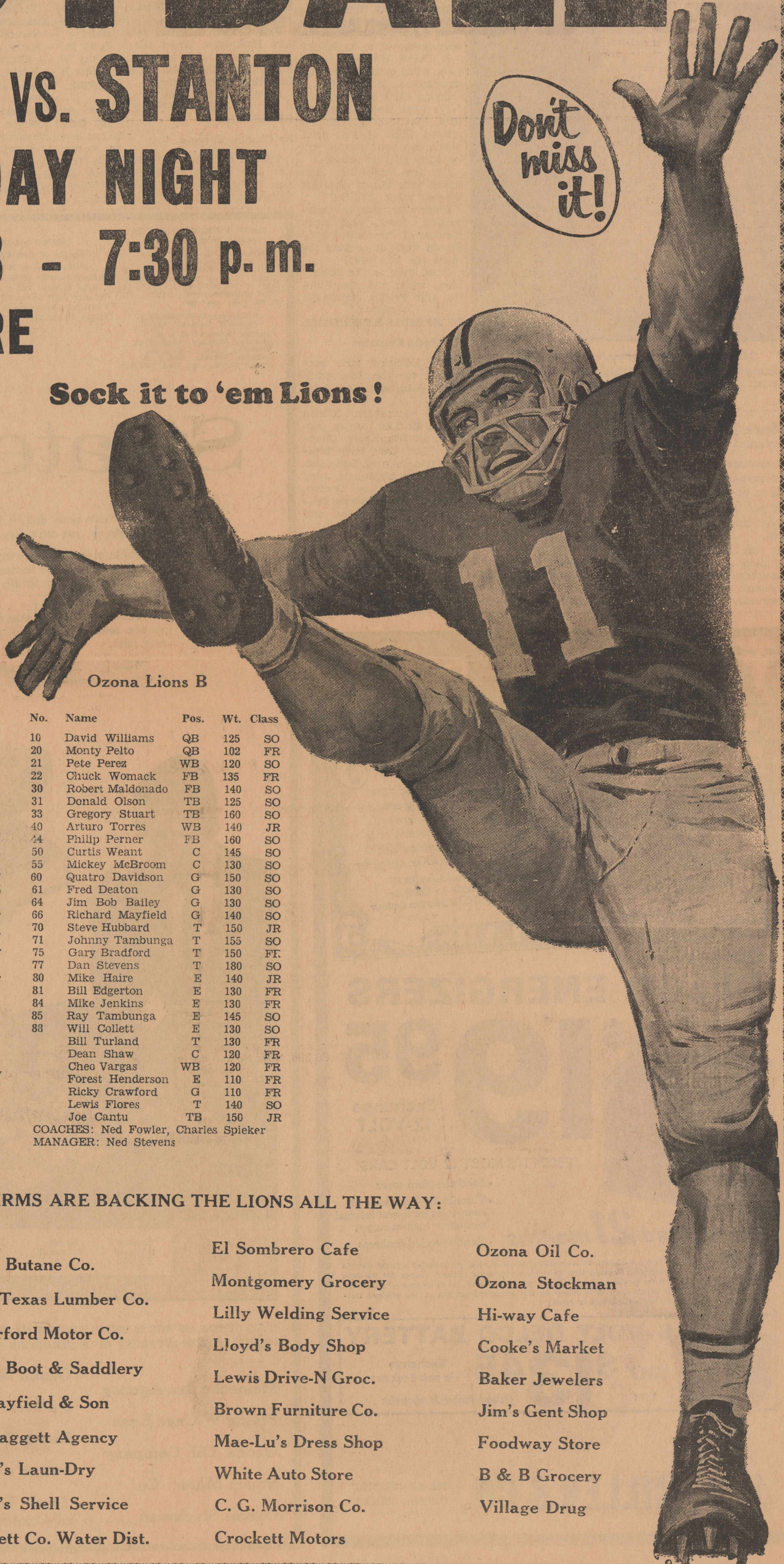

Questionnaire On Livestock To Be Sent To Ranchers

A number of Crockett county ranchmen, along with about 40,000 other Texas livestock producers, will receive a most important questionnaire during the last of November.

County agent Pete Jacoby says the report will come from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin and it is important that the questionnaire be filled out and returned as soon as possible after receiving it.

The information gained from this report will be the basis for the official estimates of livestock numbers for the state and each county. The survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December, according to information released to the county agent. From the reports received from ranchmen, accurate estimates are made which are important in the planning of production and marketing reports, thus providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided for the program of estimates for each county, because state totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry, Jacoby says. The program of estimates, he continues, is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and

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

Crockett county voters split their vote on the 14 proposed amendments to the state constitution, voting for 7 and against 7.

Those approved were 1, State employee retirement, 3 University investment, 6 anti-pollution tax benefits, 7 abolishment of ad valorem tax, 9 teacher retirement, 12 industrial development bonds, 14 limiting legislators extra activities. County voters turned down 2 public welfare, 4 Dallas Co. road bonds, 5, salary raise for state legislators, 8 capitol contracts, 10 Texarkana tobacco tax, 11 El Paso-Tarrant office consolidation, and 13 tax exemption on stored property.

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
