The recently announced sales policy of Commodity Credit Corporation will make it possible for government stocks of cotton during the 1971-72 marketing year to be sold at prices rare and highly undesirable cirfrom 1.7 cents to 2.6 cents below the minimum prices in effect for 1970-71, according to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Grovers, Inc.

On learning of the announcement Johnson promptly requested Congressman Bob Price of Pampa to initiate through the Cotton Subcommittee of the House Committee on Agriculture an investigation

of both the loan level for cotton this year and the newly revealed sales policy.

Johnson's letter to Congressman Price said "In any but cumstances this action, coupled with the two-cent drop in the loan level, will depress market prices and jeopardize the ability of producers to continue supplying their markets, while serving no useful purpose on behalf of government, the cotton industry or the consuming, taxpaying public."

In recent weeks, renewed concern has been expressed regarding this nation's involvement in Southeast Asia and I would like to take this opportunity to report on this situation as a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Over the past several months, the United States has taken steps both at the negotiating table and on the battlefield to bring our war effort in Southeast Asia to

At the negotiating table, we have offered the most comprehensive and generous peace troops at a rate more rapid than anticipated. It is now expected that by May 1 of this year that U. S. troop strength in South Vietnam will be about one-half of the peak level of two years ago.

Recently there has been concern expressed that our air operations over Cambodia and Laos have exceeded the limits imposed by the Congressional measure known as the Cooper-Church Amendment. But it is apparent to me that these actions have not deepened our involvement in Southeast Asia but instead have allowed us to continue our troop withdrawals and to continue our policy of disengagement. By preventing Communist supplies and personnel from reaching South Vietnam, we have already saved American lives.

Pornographic Ban In Mail

Is Introduced

A \$50,000 fine, five years in prison, or both would be the punishment for using the mails to transmit pornographic advertising under terms of a bill introduced this week by Congressman Bob Price.

"In an effort to provide a focus for congressional action I have introduced this bill, which if enacted, would step up the tempo of Federal regulation, and would hasten the demise

of the smut trade," Price said. The Panhandle Congressman pointed out that legislation he co-sponsored last year became effective on February 1 which will allow individuals who do not want to receive offensive materials in the mail to complete a postal form which will prevent them from receibing 'sexually oriented' mail.

"While this new postal regulation certainly should prove significant in terms of stemming the rising tide of pornography inundating the Nation, it does not go far enough. The Federal government must take stronger steps to halt the flow of obscene material into the homes of

America," Price said. The 18th DistrictRepresentative introduced a similar bill in the 91st Congress which was Mrs. Lois Deel, Rotan; one passed by the House but was



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
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
