

After reading all the pros and cons on the proposed new state constitution which will make up the November 4 ballot, I have decided that if the voters are not confused. they just don't understand the situation. All eight propositions seem harmless enough on the surface, but a little digging turns up a document which seems to be written by lawyers for lawyers or by legislators for legislators. And, to me at least, that seems to leave the public out.

Everyone, pros and cons, agree that the complete revision of the constitution would give vast new powers to the legislature. In fact many of the provisions, written by the legislature, are so vague and ambiguous that they are subject to many different interpretations by state officials and lawyers. It is our contention that ours is a government of laws and not of men and should stay that way. We need a strong constitution to protect our basic rights from a legislature which can and often does change complexion every two years.

I have contended for years that Texas needs a new constitution, but it should be superior and more workable than the old. I see no point in trading something used for something new when there is no improvement as far as the people of the land are concerned. Perhaps there are some good features in the new constitution, but I believe the bad far outweighs the good. We don't need to adopt a constitution which would our Texas Legislature into a fulltime "Congress" which would exercise enormous control over our lives. Heaven knows we have enough federal controls and regulations to concern ourselves about

There is no urgency in revising the constitution. The one we have has worked well for 100 years. If there are some good features in the proposed revision, they can be put to the voters of Texas in the future as amendments.

Texas has managed to operate in the black where many states have been operating in the red for decades. If the new constitution is adopted, the expense to the taxpayer would be tremendous. Comptroller Bob Bullock says the new constitution would give so much power to the legislature that it is impossible to estimate how much it would cost the taxpayers.

The main proponents of the new constitution are members of the legislature. We prefer to keep them as our servants, instead of making them our masters. The way to do that is to vote "no" on all eight propositions next Tuesday.

Lions Hopes High For Dist. Title After Sonora Victory

The Ozona Lions took dead aim at the District title Friday night, downing Sonora 11-7 and keeping their District 7-2A total yardage of 202. The record clean. They will host the McCamey Badgers tomorrow, ground and 70 in the air for a Friday, night. The Badgers lost to Crane Friday night.

Crane and Ozona remain unbeaten in district play and chances are the district title will be decided when the two teams meet in Crane November 7, which will be the final district game of the season for the Lions. The Lions have an open date November 14.

The Lions scored through three routes Friday night to down the Broncos on the Sonora field, a touchdown, a field goal and a safety.

Neither team scored in the first quarter of play. Gary Warren, the district's number three ground-gainer, scored for the Lions in the second quarter, capping a 55-yard drive. Warren blasted over from the six-yard line. The PAT failed, but the Lions had a 6-0 lead. With five seconds left in the quarter, John Galvan booted a 23-yard field goal to up the lead to 9-0 at the half.

A Mexican American group protested the action of the court in re-drawing precinct lines August, 1974, at the regular meeting of the Andres discovery at the former Commissioners Court earlier this month. The lawyer for the group, George J. Korbel of San Antonio informed the court at that time that the Federal Voting Rights Act, recently expanded to Texas. required that all changes in voter procedure be submitted for approval to the U. Absentee Voting Indicates Lack Of Interest In Nov. 4 Election

an indicator of voter turnout. very few of Crockett County's registered voters will go to the polls to vote on the revision of the Texas Constitution next Tuesday, Nov. 4. At press time, eight absentee ballots had been cast. Tomorrow, Oct. 31, is the final day to vote absentee. The election will give voters the opportunity to vote on a complete revision of the state's Constitution for the first time in 100 years. Crockett County voters will

vote in their various precincts. The polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Precinct 1 voters will vote at the courthouse with Dr. Gary Vannoy election judge. Precinct 2 voters will vote at the Civic Center where Elizabeth Applewhite will preside as election judge. Precinct 3 voters will vote at Ozona Intermediate School with Steve Kenley election judge. Precinct 2 and 3 will just change polling places this year, due to re-districting. The precinct revision did not affect polling places in other precincts. Precinct 4 voters will vote at Ozona Primary School and Fela Gutierrez will preside as election judge. Nancy Hale will be in charge of box #5 in Powell Field and J. A. Carroll will again be election judge at the power plant, box #6.

A. O. Fields New President

A. O. Fields, Justice of the Peace, Crockett County has just returned from attending the 16th Annual Conference of the West Texas Justice of the Peace Association at Hereford which was held the 23. 24 and 25 of October. The conference was presided over by Judge Glen Nelson, Justice of the Peace, Deaf Smith County.

Highlights of the meeting were addresses by Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton and Senator Max Sherman, Senatorial District 31, Amarillo. In the opening session the keynote address was delivered by Judge Fields.

New officers were elected at the final meeting of the convention and Judge Fields was elected president of the association for the incoming year of 1975-76. Howard County and the city of Big Spring were selected as the site for the 1976 conference which will be held in Octo-

ber. 1976. Projects for the coming year will be the acquisition and restoration of some property in Langtry near the Judge Roy Bean Museum to be known as the Texas Justice of the Peace Museum.

The ballots are printed in English and in Spanish and voters may vote in either language. There are eight separate propositions on the ballot which would completely revise the present constitution. Proposition number 1 is the constitutional amendment revising the separation of powers, Legislative, and Executive provisions of the Texas Constitution. The proposal makes no real change in the basic structure of state government. It does provide for single-member districts, annual sessions of the legislature, a commission, appointed by elected officials to set salaries for legislators; and several minor provisions which would grant more power to

the legislature. Proposition No. 2 creates

Permanent and Available
a new Article V, The Judiciary, School Funds remain intact which governs the powers and organization of the state court system. Among other things, it provides for the merger of the Court of Crimi-

Court.

Proposition No. 3 creates a new Article VI, Voter Qualifications and Elections. It provides that a person who is at least 18 years of age, is not a convicted felon in prison on parole or probation, or is not mentally incompetent, would be qualified to vote under laws enacted by the Legislature.

Proposition No. 4 provides for a new Article VII, Education, which governs public education, The amendment calls for an equitable system of free public schools below the college level. The system must provide each individual an equal educational opportunity but may provide local enrichment of educational programs. 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Soviet Spies On Capitol Hill?

There is an intriguing and sensational report that has bobbed to the surface recently in Washington, only to sink beneath the level of public concern. The report is that a number of congressional offices are infiltrated by the Soviets.

In a recent interview with Martin Agronsky on public television, Sen. Barry Goldwater declared that the Soviet Union has "absolutely infiltrated" the United States, including every major business, industry, and even the committees of Congress. The Arizona Republican said specifically that the Soviets have infiltrated "seven or nine" Senate offices.

"Spying in this country is so fantastically larger than what we do, that there's no way to talk about it," said Goldwater. He explained that his information about the seven or nine Senate offices came from Vice President Rockefeller, who headed the commission which investigated the CIA.

"I did question him (the Vice President) after his paper was published and there was no mention of it and he said, 'I could only print what I was allowed to print," explained Goldwater.

The Senator's statement begs to be followed up by the press as well as by concerned Americans. Goldwater has indicated he now is asking Senate intelligence investigators to look into these charges. A member of his staff also told a Washington reporter that "the Senator has no information at this time beyond that initial statement, but he's going to dig further into the matter and others have now picked it up as well.'

In the meantime, it is vital that the American public be aware that these charges have been raised. And we also deserve some hard answers to such questions as: who ordered this information to be deleted from the Rockefeller report on the CIA? How were these Senate offices infiltrated? What is being done to clean out the infiltrators in the "seven or nine" offices and to prevent a recurrence?

AUSTIN — Texas Supreme Court has agreed to hear a case involving extent of the Governor's veto power and multimillion dollar higher education construction program.

The High Court November 5 will listen to arguments in the suit brought by Austin architectural firm Jessen Associates Inc. against Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock refused to approve payment of a \$2,590 fee to the architects for cost studies on a \$10 million addition to The University of Texas law school.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe this year vetoed riders to the new state appropriations bill which sought to give prior legislative authorization to millions of dollars in university construction.

Briscoe cited a 1975 law which required that such projects have approval of Coordinating Board. Texas College and University System.

Attorneys for Jessen said court guidance is necessary to settle the issues for state officials and governing boards of all state univer-

Debate Rages On

Voter interest in the great debate over a new state constitution doesn't match that of ardent proponents and opponents.

Checks with key election officials over the state indicate a low turnout in the November 4 constitutional revision election, unless there is a dramatic pickup in citizens' concern during the last week of the blistering campaign.

Oil Allowable Set

For the 44th month, the Texas Railroad Commission set the oil allowable for November at a wide-open 100 per cent.

Production is running an average of 113,047 barrels daily less than in 1974. Imports averaged nearly 4.6 million barrels a day, during a recent four weeks' period, which amounts to an increase of 824,000 barrels from early this year.

As a waste control measure, allowable for the East Texas field was limited to 86 per cent production.

Beach Force Named

Atty. Gen. John Hill appointed a "Beach Task Force" of five assistants to work with coastal county officials to assure open, clean and safe beaches.

Hill said his office is making a detailed survey of environmental protection needs on the Texas coast.

The five assistant attorneys general will be assigned to Jefferson and Chambers counties; Galveston county; Brazoria and Matagorda counties; Calhoun, Aransas, San Patricio and Nueces counties, and Willacy, Cameron, Kleberg and Kennedy counties. Attorneys from the Environmental Protection Division staff in Austin, Houston, San Antonio and McAllen will also be involved.

Session Feared

House Speaker Bill Clayton said banning school fees may cause a special legislative session.

Clayton referred to a recent attorney general's opinion that schools cannot require students to pay fees for driver education, workbooks, lab materials, band uniforms and other items unless the legislature authorizes the charges.

This will put some of our school districts in a financial bind, and we may need a special session to help them out," the speaker said. "But I hope they can make it until 1977."

Clayton emphasized he is not "beating the drums for a special session.'

Courts Speak

Only landowners who show 51 per cent of their income comes from farming or ranching are entitled to a constitutional agricultural tax exemption, the Supreme Court held.

Court of Criminal Appeals overruled a district court's order setting bail at \$75,000 for an Odessa man accused of killing his ex-

The Supreme Court upheld a damage award to a Houston man who had money taken from his account by a bank to cover a loss from a forger's having signed his name on the back of a check.

The High Court affirmed a \$205,095 medical malpractice award to a Jasper man. In another malpractice suit, the Court upheld lower court rulings which rejected a charity patient's suit against three Houston doctors.

An Austin widow's suit claiming her husband's fatal heart attack was the result of shock from losing his city job was rejected by the Supreme Court, denying the workman's compensation benefits.

AG Opinions

Where a Teacher Retirement System member is murdered by his beneficiary, no benefits should be made until a constructive trust has been imposed by court order, Attorney General Hill held. In other recent opinions,

Hill concluded: An amendment establishing foreign student tuition rates does not affect

the minimum tuition rates a junior college may charge non-resident students. The Texas Savings and

Loan Act does not authorize political subdivisions to invest in savings accounts of savings and loan associations without regard to legal restrtictions found elsewhere.

DES Debacle

WASHINGTON—The Senate has taken a "let them eat cake" attitude toward American ranchers and consumers. The Senate has approved a bill that would forbid the use of the chemical additive diethystilbestrol (DES) as a supplement in cattle feed. Ranchers and consumers will pay dearly if this unwise, uncalled for bill becomes law. Ranch income will plunge, and consumer prices—especially beef prices—

DES has two primary uses: as a growth-stimulating hormone intended for feeding or subcutaneous ear implanting in feedlot cattle, and as a "morning after" contraceptive. The controversy over DES stems from its use as an oral contraceptive. DES, when ingested, can cause a rare form of vaginal cancer in the female offspring, and sterility in the male offspring, or women who use it as a contraceptive.

There is no scientific evidence yet, however, to indicate that harm could come to a person who eats DES-fed beef. A small percentage of beef livers in U.S. Department of Agriculture testing have been found to contain up to two parts per billion of DES. But DES has never been found in red meat tissues. There has not been a single report of a harmful effect from eating meat from DES-fed cattle in

If five per cent of DES-fed cattle livers contained two parts per billion of DES, a person would have to consume five million pounds of liver per year for 50 years in order to equal the intake of DES from a single treatment of the DES oral contraceptive.

Despite this evidence, the Senate bill would ban the use of DES as a cattle feed supplement, but would permit the continued use of the hormone as an oral contraceptive. I

find this incredible. DES feeding saves an average of 81 pounds of feed for each 100 pounds of gain in beef steers. On a yearly basis, the saving is 7.7 billion pounds of feed—an amount roughly equal to the total feed grain purchases being made by the Soviet Union. In terms of corn, the saving is equal to releasing more than 1.5 million acres of corn land for production of other crops. This is an incredible amount of grain to throw away for nothing.

I am as concerned as any person can be about the possible health hazard posed by DES. It is imperative that we find out as much as we can about the possible effects of the hormone. If there is any evidence whatever that DES used as a cattle feed will cause cancer, it should of course be banned. But this drastic step would cost beef producers and consumers millions of dollars in additional costs, so it should not be taken unless and until there is evidence that DES, used as a cattle feed, is harmful. At present, there is no such evidence.

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

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club

Given new growth by good fall rains and coolness. roses vie with chrysanthemums for attention at this time. Both should be at their best until frost comes along to spoil them.

When frost does come along, and you have an asparagus bed, cut it back to the ground when plants are killed. Then mulch with rotted manure or compost.

If you have cold frames or a green house, clean well in preparation for protecting any frost tender plants, and to grow hardy plants for spring transplanting. Some are trying tomatoes.

With cacti and other succulents be particularly careful not to over water, but do not allow them to dry completely, even in winter. The Christmas cactus will bloom more surely if you rest it from early October until mid-November by keeping it in a fairly cool room and giving it little or no water,

Your garden can put on a new colorful show next spring if you plan now to plant bulbs this fall. Some want to plant them early so they will form a good root system before winter. Others wait until December which gives later blooms in the spring. Bulbs are especially effective for small areas, borders, a corner, dooryard planting, naturalistic setting, base of trees, a pocket of color, and patio edging. Soil should be prepared to a full 6 to 8 inches corations? depth so there will be the best conditions for bulb growth. Bulbs like good drainage and a soil not too heavy. Add peat moss or vermiculite to loosen. Fertilization is not too important. Many advise using bone meal in the soil at planting time. Others use a light dressing of 5-10-5 chemical fertilizer, but do not use manure.

Some have asked for the glycerine curing method. Evergreen material and grasses saving tips to reduce gift cured in one part glycerine and two parts water will take on a deep, gleaming mahogany hue and remain pliable indefinitely. The secret of success lies in getting freshly cut stem ends into the solution before they dry out. As water evaporates, add enough to keep container filled until all the glycerine is absorbed or material is the color you want. This will take four to six weeks for some, and less time for lighter you sew, bake, paint or are textured plant foliage. Add hot water if you want it to act quicker. Magnolia, cherry laurel, elaeagnus, ligustrum, holly and loquat are especially beautiful.

tion of lipstick follows. For lips that are too full or too thin, the lip pencil is again called into use. Outlining thin lips slightbeyond their natural line, or slightly within the full lipline, is the first step in a creative lip reconstruction. Using a lip brush, fill in the rest of the mouth, using strokes from the line towards the

center of the mouth. Finally, it is important for all women to choose shades of lip coloring that are complimentary to their skin tones and to the colors they wear. A pink lipstick that looks good most days will not be flattering the day you wear orange. There is no one shade of lipstick that will cover the range of colors in most of our wardrobes.

I strongly recommend the use of lip brushes in applying lipstick. Many women resist even trying them, because it seems time con-suming and difficult to master the art. Once you've learned, however, you can use a lipstick brush quickly and see a marked improvement in how the lip coloring flatters your mouth. I especially like Merle Norman's Designer Brush Collection, for it includes a retractable lip brush, so convenient to carry to the office or out to dinner in your

Lipstick brushes are marvelous for another reason. Lipsticks often break during application, through no fault of the manufacturer. Sometimes women swivel the lip coloring too far out of its case; and in direct application, the stick may break off. 

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

Take Care Of Trees Says County Agent

THE OZONA STOCKMAN

Healthy trees are valuable in any landscape and they should be protected and cared for, believes Billy Reagor, county agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. plantings.

"Homeowners should be on to their trees and should know how to protect trees and correct damage, " he says.

"Any cut or break in the bark of a tree leaves it open to insects and diseases. First, clean the wound and get rid of loose bark, then apply a special pruning compound. This will dry hard and prevent insect or disease entry.

The county agent warns against wrapping a wire or metal band tightly around a tree trunk. This breaks the bark and cuts off the flow of food from the leaves to the the tree will eventually die.

Since a tree's main "feeder" roots are in the top 15 to 18 inches of the soil, care should be used to avoid packing the soil. Soil that is compacted

by automobiles or pedestrians can prevent normal root development. If possible, try to reroute traffic around the tree by fencing or by using

"Landscape fills or the the lookout for possible damage addition of more than four to six inches of soil around the base of a tree can be especially harmful, " says the agent. "It suffocates the tree by keeping out water and air. If a shallow fill is essential, it's best to use sand or gravel soils that let in air and water."

One way of protecting a tree from a fill is to build a brick or stone well two to three feet out from the trunk.

'The first step is to remove all vegetation within the well area around the tree, " says Reagor. "Then install agricultural drain tile out and down from the trunk in a spokelike pattern. Build the well around the tree and fill it gradually over two or three years with coarse sand and

Ozona Column Featured In

Angelo columnist, incurred the ire of Council of Government officials with a column he wrote last fall about Crockett county's unincorporated capital.

But the column is among some 100 of Pendergrast's favorites chosen for re-printing in the 250-page book entitled "Blowing with the Wind; a West Texas Collection" scheduled for publication the first week of November.

And there are frequent references to Ozona people in other chapters of the pre-Crockett County Christmas publication covering some 75 West Texas cities and hundreds of Pendergrast's friends and neighbors encountered in his travels of some 40,000 miles for the San Angelo Standard-Times.

"We tried to pick out the columns which are most representative of the life and times of West Texas, " Pendergrast said, "and we ended up Mrs. S.L. June - Sonora, Tx. with about 80 different datelines from Lometa to Balmorhea and Del Rio to Kermit."

Pendergrast, former editor of the Corsicana, Tex., Daily Sun and the Santa Rose, N. M. El Paso Herald-Post, and Hamilton, Ohio, Journal-News, has traveled more than 50,000 miles throughout West Texas in the past 14 months in search of feature materials and news events of general interest.

He has also become a popular speaker-judge-master of ceremonies and has visited many communities in those capacities. (Among the most active "cookoff" judges in Texas, he will be one of the judges in the Ninth Annual World Championship Chili Cookoff at Terlingua Saturday, Nov. 1, and he reiterates the contest has not been moved to California despite the attempts of former Terlingua figure C. V. Wood of the far western state.)

A 1951 graduate of Abilene High School with a Bachelor's degree in English from Texas Western College (now the University of Texas at El Paso), he has taught high school English, Spanish and journalism and written eight booklength projects.

He is currently serving as 15-county district director of public information for the American Cancer Society and founding president of San Angelo Press Club.

Choice Of Fabric Is **Important**

Re-upholstering a chair or sofa may extend its life-but there's more to selecting appropriate upholstery fabric than meets the eye. Denise Beigbeder, a housing and home furnishings specialist, "Some of the prettiest

fabrics may be the worst performers, and it's no 'cost cutter' to use fabrics designed for garments or draperies

Miss Beigbeder is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The Texas A&M University System.

Turning to positive points for fabric selection, the specialist advised selecting sturdy fabrics -- those that are tightly woven. Pull on the fabric to be sure yarns don't slip. All yarns used in the weave should be about the same size to reduce abra-

sion, she noted. "Beware of fabrics with heavy latex or acrylic backings. Only a thin coating for reinforcement and stabilizing of yarns is necessary. A heavy backing may be a substitute for better fabrics, " the specialist warned.

"Also, check the label for fiber content--the blends using a greater percentage of man-made fibers will usually be stronger. Nylon and olefin fibers are also highly stain resistant.

'Even in easy-care, stainrepellent fabrics, light colors and solids will show soil faster and require more care. So select tweeds, stripes, plaids, or other patterns in deeper colors for better wearing, "

she suggested. And don't forget plastics-they're a good choice in a room that gets a lot of living, Plastics are available in many design varieties and colors. Some of the newer ones "breathe" making them cooler and more comfortable.

But avoid plastics that aren't fabric-backed--they won't wear well. Also plastics aren't indestructible -- they can tear and some household cleaners, polishes, and nail polish remover will "eat through" them, she said.



CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems. A second "Higher Education Fund, " financed by a 10¢ property tax, would be available for all other state colleges and universities.

Proposition No. 5 creates a new Article VIII, Finance, which governs the financial management of the state. In this amendment the requirement that all new taxes be equal and uniform would be limited only to the levy of property taxes. It would require the establishment and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property over the state. The proposal permits the authorization of state indebtedness and the pledging of the credit of the state without a Constitutional amendment.

Proposition No. 6 provides a new Article IX, Local Government, which authorizes the powers of local government. Under this amendment local government would remain basically the same with the exception that County Commissioners' Courts would be granted ordinance-making powers.

Proposition No. 7 provides a new Article X. General Provisions, which is basically a housekeeping article. It includes: the homestead provisions, separate or community property; protection of personal property from forced sale; protection of wages from garnishment; limitations upon banking corporations; provisions Halloween for the regulation of alcoholic beverages; and provisions for the regulation of medical practitioners. It prohibits lotteries and gift enterprises; regulates interest and lending; provides for the various retirement systems of public employees, and protecting the environment, conserving natural resources and public property as well as wildlife resources.

Proposition No. 8 provides a new Article XI, Method of Amending the Constitution of the State. It maintains the same basis for submission of amendments as was utilized in submitting these eight amendments; that is, submission by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the membership of both houses of the Legislature and adoption by a simple majority of the called for that purpose. It does add a provision that a question of a constitutional convention be submitted by the Legislature at least once each thirty years.

Chrysanthemums **Need Culture**

Don't be a grump if your chrysanthemums aren't doing as well as they should. There may be a good reason for it. Everett Janne landscape

horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, State Fair of Texas last week. says there are several things which affect the performance of chrysanthemums. Couch, won a blue ribbon and

"Mums should be planted in a spot with full sunlight throughout the day, good air circulation and well-drained soil. There should be no tree roots to interfere with plant growth. "

He also advises planting mums where they will not be affected by supplemental

night lights.
"Mums need a succession of short days before they will flower. A street light or yard lamp can upset a plant's biological clock and fool it into thinking the day is longer, says the horticulturist for the

Texas A&M University System. The best way to water the plants is to give them a good thorough soaking every few days. Try not to get the leaves wet as this will en-

courage leaf diseases. "To get the best results with chrysanthemums, buy healthy plants, plant them in the right location, and give them tender loving care, " says Janne.

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
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
