The Republican Tariff bill proposes an increase of duty on nearly everything that is worn by the

Cotton cloth, already taxed at an average of nearly 50 per cent, is burdened with an increased duty of from one-quarter to three-quarter cents per yard. Cotton thread, yarn and warp are increased three cents per pound. As a Protection organ puts it, "the duty on nearly every article in the cotton manufactures schedule is increased." Not content with this, the Commitee has discovered a new object of taxation and has imposed a duty of 50 per cent. ad valorem on readymade garments composed of cotton or other vegetable fibre.




