I have lived in Muleshoe was ready to go and for over two years and this experience as many rides


As the day wore on and metropolis like Dallas and the morning coolness was replaced by the humid heat of the afternoon I was really dragging and ready for any chance to beat the heat.





Peace for Anxious Days by Max Lucado

When my daughters were single-digit ages-two, five, and seven-I wowed them with a miracle. I told them the story of Moses and the manna and invited them to follow me on a wilderness trek through the house.

"Who knows," I suggested, "manna may fall from the sky again."

We dressed in sheets and sandals and did our best Bedouin hike through the bedrooms. The girls, on my instruction, complained to me, Moses, of hunger and demanded I take them back to Egypt, or at least to the kitchen. When we entered the den, I urged them to play up their parts: groan, moan, and beg for food.

"Look up," I urged. "Manna might fall any minute."

Two-year-old Sara obliged with no questions, but Jenna and Andrea had their doubts. How can manna fall from a ceiling?

Just like the Hebrews. "How can God feed us in the wilderness?"

Just like you? You look at tomorrow's demands, next week's bills, next month's silent calendar. Your future looks as barren as the Sinai Desert. "How can I face my future?" God tells you what I told my daughters: "Look up,"

When my daughters did, manna fell! Well, not manna, but vanilla wafers dropped from the ceiling and landed on the carpet. Sara squealed with delight and started munching. Jenna and Andrea were old enough to request an explanation.

My answer was simple. I knew the itinerary. I knew we would enter this room. Vanilla wafers fit safely on the topside of the ceiling-fan blades. I had placed them there in advance. When they groaned and moaned, I turned on the switch.

God's answer to the Hebrews was similar. Did he know their itinerary? Did he know they would grow hungry? Yes and yes. And at the right time, he tilted the manna basket toward earth.

And what about you? God know what you need and where you'll be. Any chance he has some vanilla wafers on tomorrow's ceiling fans? Trust him. "Give your entire attention to what God is doing right now, and don't get worked up about what may or may not happen tomorrow. It's getting harder and harder when you're out traveling to find a church to visit that agrees with you on the fine print of the Christian faith. These days diversity even between churches whose signs are painted with basically the same denominating words is greater every day, and the proliferation of "stealth" churches whose signs submerge their brand complicates things even more.

Personally, I enjoy seeing how "the other half"—more like the other 95.5% of Christians worships God. When I'm visit-

ing away, unless I have friends from my tradition I want to worship with, I enjoy the rare opportunity to "taste" worship in a church from a different branch of the Christian tree.

Evidently, not everyone feels that way. Fairly regularly, visitors looking for a place to worship on their way to wherever show up at the church where I preach. We like visitors, and, if I may say so, we are good at being nice to them. Most like us. Some even make it a point to come back whenever they're in our neck of the woods.

But about once or twice a year for the last decade or two, our church has witnessed the same phenomenon. At some point during or even before worship, the visiting individual or couple notices that our worship style or whatever is not exactly what they expected, and they rise up and leave.

I remember one instance years ago when we still re-announced aloud the announcements in the bulletin, when one visiting couple heard we were participating in a

couple out the door. We counted them for the worship attendance number anyway. They were there. And they were breathing. It happens. Fairly rarely. But it happens. And that last instance

has been bugging me and forcing some thought.

That last skedaddling couple seemed nice enough. Why did they feel such a need to get out? I'd bet they are usually courteous people. By its very nature such skedaddling seems a tad impolite. They didn't "make a scene," they just left in haste lest they be tainted in any way. So, I genuinely wonder, what's up with that? Why abandon ship at worship? The "lest I be tainted" logic just is not clear to me. Is it really logical? Right? Even holy?

I was told by several on Sunday not to worry about it, that it's more a matter for pity than anger that "religion" could so stifle and dwarf spirits.

It was Plato who said that the unexamined life is not worth living. We all bring some large presuppositions with us to worship. They need to be examined from time to time. It would probably be helpful even to make a list of them. If these folks' presuppositions were right, I suppose they were, too, in their actions. If not, well, that kind of "belief" is as hard, in every sense, as it is sad.

I can't imagine Jesus doing that or feeling a temptation to do that. In fact, I don't think he did Sunday.

Sudan Farmers Co-op celebrates another record setting year

the Sudan Farmers Co-op.

This year, dividend checks totaling \$3,810,909.34 were handed out to the stockholders at the annual meeting Thursday, April, 27 at the Sudan High School Cafeteria.

Since 1993, the Sudan Farmers Co-op has paid \$21,847,064.63 to stockholders in cash dividends.

The bale count this year was a record high 95,978, up 1,205 from last year's 94,773.

"For customers, patronage dividends remain one of the most tangible measures of our success," said Farmers Co-op Sudan General Manager Dennis Flowers.

A meal of brisket and fish was served at the meeting.

"In 2006, we continued to build our history of consistent financial performance. The strong showing allowed the Co-op to give \$3,810,909.34 million in patronage and stock retirements to customer-owners for another record high year," said Flowers.

and retiree Iim Newman. Fisher and Synatschk were re-elected


and Bryan Baker was elected to the board. The Sudan Farmers Co-op was established in 1935, and has about 347 stockholders.


