



Officials will select one of three considered sites for the hospital when the loan becomes certain.

Cook also stated that West Plains hospital is an outdated, "ill-arranged and ill-designed" structure with one portion being at least 30 years old.

The Bailey County Hospital District was created by voters on May 16, 1970 with a master plan for replacing West Plains Memorial Hospital.

A board motion last July to dissolve the hospital district followed on the heels of a 1970 civil suit filed by 300 persons against the creation of district and having be accomplished by the state legislature, board members later learned.

In 1970, an election enabled the district to issue bonds up to \$950,000 and sanctioned taxation up to 75 cents per \$100 dollars of valuation, the stateset maximum.

The civil suit delayed action on a hospital district grant application, until the county officials had to make reapplication under the new guaranteed loan setup.






