**What a \$100,000 Bond Issue Would Cost.**

Let us consider briefly what a \$100,000 bond issue would cost an ordinary Southern county: In the first place, I believe the bonds could be sold at bearing 4 1/2 per cent interest. This will mean that the interest on the issue of \$100,000 will be \$4,500 per annum. It will also be necessary to put by a sinking fund to take care of these bonds on maturity. Such a sum as is necessary can be put by each year at 5 per cent interest, and at the end of the forty years will cover the bond issue. The amount that it will be necessary to put aside each year for this purpose will be \$933, this makes a total of \$5,033 that a county will have to raise each year to take care of this bond issue. This amount will not be as much as it would be necessary to raise by a high tax, 35 to 50 cents, which some counties have levied in providing the money for road construction.

Suppose the assessed property valuation is \$8,000,000, a tax of 15 cents on the \$100 would yield \$12,000 annually, which would be sufficient to pay the interest on the bonds, create a sinking fund, and leave enough, \$6,500, to keep in repair the balance of the roads in the county that are not being permanently improved.

I believe that it is to the advantage of the county or township to issue bonds for good road work, even though the work is to be confined to the relocation, grading, and construction of earth roads.—Joseph Hyde Pratt, in Starkville, (Miss.) Southern Farm Gazette.

## ABOUT THE NEW WELL.

### Water Supply Ample for the Present Needs of the City.

In conversation with one of the city aldermen Monday the Courier learned the following facts regarding the waterworks well:

The well has been completed at a cost of \$2350, which amount includes the cost of some pipe and tools which the city still has on hand, which makes the actual cost of the well, including the casing and strainer and cost of derrick, only a little over \$2000, and it is the opinion of the driller and those who have been in close touch with the work that we have a well that will furnish enough water to supply Crockett's requirements.

The city council has placed an order with Frank B. Guinn, assistant financial agent at Rusk, for the water pipe, and an order with the Memphis Steel Construction company of Memphis, Tenn., for a 75,000 gallon capacity steel tank and tower, and also an order with the Texas Supply company, a branch house of Fairbanks, Morse & Co., for all necessary machinery for a complete pumping plant. The work of installing the waterworks system will be pushed until the system is completed.

Crockett buyers were paying 13 1/2 cents for cotton last Thursday when the staple was worth only 13 1/2 in Houston and Galveston, and it takes three quarters of a cent to get it to those points. Crockett is a good market this season.

## District Court.

The jury civil docket in the district court was taken up Monday. The case first called was that of Adams & Young vs. Bobbitt, a land suit. After the jury had been selected, this case was compromised and put out of the way.

Next was the case of Martha Reynolds against the Southern Pine Lumber Co., also a land suit. This case was still on trial Wednesday afternoon.

The grand jury sent in its first batch of bills Wednesday afternoon, twenty-three of which were for felonies and nine for misdemeanors.

## Five Thousand Bales Tuesday.

The five thousand mark in this season's shipment of cotton was reached at the I. & G. N. freight depot Tuesday, counting two for one in round bales. In this connection it will be interesting to note that the Crockett oil mill has received about 200 cars of seed from different railroad points this season. This is exclusive of seed received from wagons.
