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VICTORY GENERAL LEAD MAINTAINED

Davidson is Assured of Nomination for Lieutenant Governor; Pierson Has Lead.

Galveston, Texas, Aug. 29.— After the bitterest political campaign Texas has known for many years, and one of the bitterest. old-timers say, that the state has ever known, Pat M. Neff of Waco won the democratic nomination for governor over former United States Senator Joseph Weldon Bailey in yesterday's primary election.

Mr. Neff's majority may run around 100,000. At this time he has a lead of 72,939 votes, according to the Texas election bureau, which reports returns from 207 counties out of 249 in the state as follows: Bailey 156,-941, Neff 229.880.

This accounts for more than half the votes, it being indicated that the total vote in the second primary will be from 425,000 to 475,000. The total vote in the first primary was 449,800, but, as The News estimated some months ago, the total number of qualified voters in Texas this year is about 1,000,000. Thus in both the first and second democratic primary elections more than half the potential vot ers of Texas did not go to the

Mr. Neff ran strong all over Texas, except in the so-called German counties, some of the border counties and a few scattering counties elsewhere.

Mr. Bailey failed to carry the "old Fifth District," which first sent him to congress; he did not run strong in the black land belt. He did not do well in North Central, East or West Texas, and in South Texas he failed to show anything like the strength it had been predicted he would show.

Incomplete returns from Cooke County indicate that Mr. Neff carried that county.

The South Texas vote that remained out of the first primary election did not "come out" for yesterday's election to the extent that had been predicted by Mr. Bailey's supporters. For instance, even in Bexar County, where some had said he would have a lead of 5,000 or 6,000, he only had a lead of about 1,000 on present returns, which, while incomplete, account for the bulk of the vote there.

Mr. Neff carried every large city and every large county in Texas, with the exception of San Antonio and Bexar County and

Returns began coming in early from all parts of Texas last night, and with the very first reports Mr. Neff took the lead over Mr. Bailey, and throughout the night, as additional reports arrived, he steadily increased that lead. At no time after the first hour following the closing of the polls was there any uncertainly whatever of the outcome. A small crowd gathered in front of The News building—perhaps the smallest election night crowd ever assembled there—following the bulletins with languid interest and with no demonstrations.

Mr. Bailey was first elected to congress in 1890, and the Fifth Congressional District, according to the act of 1882, consisted of Grayson, Collin, Cooke, Denton, Wise, Montague, Clay, Rockwall, Wichita, Wilbarger, Archer and Baylor counties. "PLAN APPROVED BY SEN. HARDING"

Reports From Party Workers Produced to Bear Out Assertions.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 26.-Information to support his charges that a republican campaign fund exceeding \$15,000,000 was being raised in "a conspiracy to buy the presidency" was presented by Governor Cox, democratic presidential candidate, in addressing a public meeting here tonight.

Governor Cox's data consisted almost entirely of matter taken from the "official bulletin" of Fred W. Upham of Chicago, treasurer of the republican national committee, but his chief exhibit was a typewritten list purporting to show republican campaign quotas imposed on fifty-one principal cities in twenty-seven states and aggregating \$8,145,000.

Names of local subscribers, Governor Cox said, were ordered kept secret. These quotas, given as \$2,000,000 for New York City, \$750,000 for Chicago, \$500,000 for Philadelphia and ranging down to \$25,000 for smaller cities like Albany, N. Y., were said by Governor Cox to have been announced about the middle of July.

"Harding Knows of Plan."

That Senator Harding, his republican opponent, "was acquainted with" the details" of the quota plan, and that it was also approved by Will H. Mays, chairman of the republican national committee, was charged by the democratic candidate.

From subsequent issues of the official bulletin Governor Cox quoted many reports from republican workers throughout the country reporting "going over the top" and in excess of the alleged quotas.

Announcement of the \$8,145,000 metropolitan quotas, Governor Cox said, was made by Harry M. Blair, as sistant to the treasurer, Upham. A meeting was held in Chicago, Governor Cox said, at which Will H. Mays, chairman of the republican national committee, spoke his blessings.

The governor charged that typewritten sheets bearing the fifty-one cities in quotas were "distributed to those assembled," and he produced one of the alleged quota lists, but did not state how or where it was acquired. The quota plan, he said, was carried out like that of the liberty loan campaigns.

On Business Basis.

That the reputed attempt to raise \$8,145,000 from fifty-one cities in twenty-seven of the forty-eight states is fair evidence that the total national fund will be much larger was declared by Governor Cox, who said big business men were prominent on the republican ways and means committee and that the raising of the funds was on a business, "salesmanship" basis.

Contrary to an intention announced previously, Governor Cox added that "intended to pass this evidence" to the senate campaign investigating committee.

Governor Cox also quoted from statements in the republican "bulletin" that state and county organizations were not to be "disturbed or retarded in their activities."

Calling attention to Chairman Hays' statement that \$3,000,000 was being raised, Governor Cox said today's papers carried a statement from Treasurer Upham that the republican total would be about \$7,500,000.





"I make this statement and hand it to the press without regard to what the fickle wheel of fortune may hold in store for me as the returns come in.'


