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## ANNUAL TEXAS FOX HUNT BIG SUCCESS

Jefferson, Tex., Dec. 20.—The third annual meet of the Texas Fox and Wolf Hunters Association closed here Saturday night, after the most successful meet they have ever had. Elements making this event a success were the large number of fox which were chased together with the increase in attendance over previous meets and the presence of many important hunters from states other than Texas. At the close of the session a banquet was given the visitors by the local chamber of Commerce, and in response to an address by F. R. Senor, inviting the association to name Jefferson as their meeting place for 1922, the membership voted to return here another year. This will make the third year that this state association has conducted its meet here, as they were here in 1920, 1921, and will be in 1922.

The total attendance this year was approximately two hundred and fifty members each chase being witnessed by visitors numbering from three hundred to eight hundred on different nights of the week. During the session fifty-two new members were secured. Hunters were here from as far as Haskell, Wichita Falls and Weatherford, and as far south as Austin; while many were here from Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, and Kentucky. In the special kennel arranged for the fox hounds, there were over two hundred dogs brought here from great distances and making in truth one of the greatest assemblage of fine blooded fox hounds ever brought together in the United States. This meet was favored with many hounds that had won prizes in National meets.

These facts show that this association although only three years old is rapidly growing into the greatest sporting event of the south.

During the six days of the meet a total of nineteen foxes were trailed, jumped and chased. This is two more than were chased in the 1920 meet. While two of the casts did not jump a fox, it happened that at the same time in another part of the county, another was being chased. From all accounts only one fox was killed out of the entire number. One of the most admirable policies of the association is that they do not force a fox from a tree and in every way endeavor to save the fox from the dogs.

It was picturesque to see the number of hunters camped about Jefferson and on the roads leading into the town. They came in wagons, automobiles, on trains, by trucks, and four came in two aeroplanes. Erwin Smith, special photographer from northern magazines and newspapers, was present at every cast. The entire week with exception of only part of one night was absolutely ideal weather for the hunt; a clear moonlight and cool

with a light dew just before dawn. Those not riding with the dogs, could easily hear the chase for a distance of two to five miles over the scenic hills of Marion County.

### For Reduced Freight Rates.

These meetings or conferences are being held at various shipping points for the purpose of securing information that can be presented to the Inter-state Commerce commission to support our appeal for a reduction in freight rates on farm crops, fruits, vegetables, etc. Please inform me at your earliest convenience the place and hour most desirable to your people for holding this meeting.

I am sure you will recognize the importance of the effort that is being made, and I shall sincerely appreciate your assistance in making this meeting a success.

### City Ordinance.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Crockett, Texas, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any hack driver, jitney driver, Hotel or Boarding house runner, solicitor for any trade or business, when plying their respective vocations as such, within the corporate limits of the City of Crockett, Texas, to approach any nearer any standing or moving freight or passenger train, than the east boundary of said depot platform in said City of Crockett, Texas, said East boundary of said depot platform being herein designated as the row of posts on the east side of the said depot platform. Any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not exceeding ten dollars.

## SOME NEWS OF THE CROCKETT OIL FIELD

A conference will be held today (Thursday) at which it will be decided whether the Aurora Company's well on the Moore farm will be abandoned. This well is more than 3400 feet deep and has a lot of piping jammed at the bottom of it. Repeated efforts to get the piping out have failed. The operators are very optimistic over their prospects for oil, and if this hole is abandoned they may put down another one near by.

The casing in the Porter well on the Austin farm is set in cement and the operators are waiting for the cement to dry. The operators are confident they will bring in a paying well when they begin operations again, which will be about January 2. In the meantime developments are anxiously awaited.

The operators of the Porter well are so confident they are going to have a good well that they are laying their plans and making preparations to put down the second well in the same locality.

The Latex Oil Company expects to begin drilling in January.
