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MISSING LIST OF HOTEL FIRE NOW SIX; FIVE FOUND

Two Bodies Recovered Wednesday by Crew of Workmen Digging in Ruins.

Houston, Texas, Dec. 21 .--- The missing list in the Capitol hotel fire was reduced to six Wednesday night. No additional bodies were recovered up to midnight by the crew of men working under specially rigged electric lights in the ruins of the building.

With five bodies recovered, the identity of one fairly well established, and relatives of others who are believed to have perished in the fire using every effort to establish identification. it is expected that the mystery which the fire-swept walls have guarded for two days will be cleared partially today.

The missing, as the list stood at midnight, are C. Hudspeth of Corsicana, an oil driller; G. C. Hawkins and W. A. Skinner, news venders for the Van Noy Interstate company; C. D. Caddy of Richmond, Va.; Joe Roffall of Houston, and Lee Driver, a carnival man whose relatives are

FRANCE, GERMANY **PROGRESS TOWARD REPARATIONS GOAL**

Greater Frankness Seen As Headway; Press Doubts, However.

Paris, Dec. 16 .--- There is a feeling in the more optimistic quarters of France that the reparations question has made a great step forward since last Sunday. The majority, however, are of the opinion that the events of the past week, although they have somewhat dispelled clouds darkening the horizon of Franco-German relations since the Rhur occupation, have not greatly cleared the skies, but merely have rendeded the situation a little less hopeless.

The genuine distrust with which the proposals emanating from Berlin have been received in official and diplomatic circles in Paris appears to a neutral observer to be one of the reasons why the occurrences of last week had no particularly cheering effect on French public opinion.

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
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
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
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
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FORD DECLINES TO OPPOSE COOLIDGE; SAYS U. S. IS SAFE

BELIEVES PRESIDENT WILL MAINTAIN BUSINESS STABILITY.

Detroit, Mich., Dec. 19 .- Declaring that he believed the country "safe with Coolidge," Henry Ford, automobile manufacturer, whose name has been mentioned as a possible candidate for president in 1924, declared here today that he would not oppose President Coolidge. Mr. Ford pointed out that a presidential election was reputed to have a disturbing effect on business conditions, but that there was no reason why business should be disturbed. He said further that he did not believe the president should be required to take any of his time or strength for any sort of political campaign.

The announcement of Mr. Ford's support of President Coolidge came simultaneously with the filing in Lansing of petitions to place Mr. Ford's name on the Michigan presidential primary election ballots next spring.

Too Late to Withdraw.

It is too late for Mr. Ford to withdraw from the primary election, despite his statement today that he would not run against President Coolidge, James W. Helme, who filed Ford petitions at Lansing today, declared. Mr. Helme was Mr. Ford's unsuccessful opponent on the democratic ticket in the 1918 Michigan senatorial primaries.

Petitions to place Mr. Ford's name on the democratic ticket next spring were filed at the same time that Horatio S. Earle, prominent republican, filed Coolidge petitions. The secretary of state indicated both petitions would be approved. Season's Greetings



"The law makes no provision for the withdrawal of a man's name after petitions for him have been filed," Mr. Helme said.

The Ford statement was received with undisguised joy in republican circles and with a certain measure of relief by the democrats who long have been uncertain concerning Mr. Ford's party affiliations.

R. Canfield, secretary of the democratic State central committee, said Mr. Ford's statement was no surprise to him.

"I presume Mr. Ford has taken this step because it was to his own best interests, and in harmony with the views of his advisers. However, the acceptance of the Coolidge platform seems sadly out of gear with many of Mr. Ford's previous declarations. There never has been any indication that Mr. Ford would be the democratic choice for president, but his statement serves to clarify the political atmosphere."

Burt D. Cady, chairman of the republican State central committee, said that Mr. Ford's announcement would be a great help to the republicans in Michigan. While he expressed confidence that the State would have gone republican regardless of Mr. Ford's announcement, he asserted he believed that Mr. Ford's support -would increase the republican majority in this State.

Robert R. Pointer of Dearborn, who organized the Ford-for President conference here December 12, said today that third party plans would go on, despite Mr. Ford's decision. "Mr. Ford will live to change his mind in regard to supporting President Coolidge," he said.

The Rev. William Dawe, president of the original Ford-for-President club at Dearborn, Ford's home, said Mr. Ford's decision "ends it." The Ford-for-President club, he said now has nothing to do but wind up its affairs.
