CROCKETT TO HAVE CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN

The last week in August, beginning the 24th and ending the 29th, has been designated by the city council and by the mayor's proclamation as clean-up week or the inauguration of a cleanup campaign. The movement was started in the Lions' Club and has the backing of the city officials. The Courier does not believe very strongly in cleanup days or clean-up weeks, because it believes that every day should be clean-up day and every week clean-up week. But it is a good time to inaugurate a clean-up and paint-up campaign. And when the campaign is once started, let's keep it going. Let's not let it end with the ending of the week. Beginning with clean-up week, let's get our premises in tip-top shape and keep them that way. Spasmodic efforts do not amount to much, but the thing that counts is keeping everlastingly at it. Now let's begin with clean-up week, and clean up and brighten up, and then stay cleansed and brightened.

Without authority to order you to "BRIGTHEN-UP" the premises, it is hoped that our citizens generally will at this time paint your homes, white-wash out-houses, and thus "BRIGHTEN-UP" the premises. Where needed, and most all do, let's all "BRIGHTEN-UP."

I hope that our entire citizenship will favorably respond to the above, and assist the council in its laudable effort to have a CLEANER and **BRIGHTER** town.

Keeping in Step.

A subscriber calling at the Courier office this week noted

at Crockett Wednesday were so near 5000 bales that the 5000 mark is no doubt passed by this time. It was estimated at the railroad office that Crockett will have shipped 4000 bales by today (Thursday), as that much was in sight and booked for shipment. Of the shipments it was also estimated that the river farm of G. L. Murray would ship by today 2000 bales, half of the total shipments. Mr. Murray's cotton does not go through the warehouse, but is loaded and shipped direct to Galveston. Estimating that 2000 bales of the warehouse cotton has been shipped, approximately 3000 remain in the warehouse as property of farmers and buyers. The warehouse is full, cotton is stacked along the west side and weighing this week was on the vacant lot opposite the warehouse. The cotton warehouse and the railroad shipping platform are both inadequate for the rush that is now on.

Died in Oklahoma.

John A. Davis, born and reared at Augusta, but who has lived for many years in Oklahoma, died at his home in Oklaho ma on Tuesday of last week. The remains were forwarded to Crockett for interment and laid to rest beside those of his father, Col. W. W. Davis, in Glenwood cemetery Thursday. Rev. C. A. Lehmberg, the Methodist pastor, conducted religious service at the graveside. The deceased is survived by a sister, Miss Betty Davis, who resides in this city, and other relatives in the county. The bereaved have the sympathy of a large community.
