Estimating that 2000 bales of the warehouse cotton has been shipped, approximately 3000 remain in the warehouse as property of farmers and buyers. The warehouse is full, cotton is stacked along the west side and weighing this week was on the vacant lot opposite the wareand the railroad shipping platform are both inadequate for the rush that is now on.
