Changes in School Law.

Austin. Tex., Feb. 8,-The house committee on education yesterday afternoon ordered a favorable report on a committee substitute bill for some thirty bills amending the school county superintendents in large counties, increases the scholastic age to certificates for life. The increuse of scholastic age would add about 70,000 to the scholastic population, which would require at the present rate of apportionment \$350,000 more available fund.




