Will It Pay to Grow Berries! Will it pay to grow small fruit, strawberries, raspberries and black-berries for family use and market? I state my own experience. Sixteen years ago I commenced on

strawberries, faspberries and black-berries, with box material four times commanded by one of the oldest mariners I ever saw in active service. His name was Rothsay, an Englishman, and he was hale and hearty at 2 years of age. It may be recorded as a curious thing that he was the only Englishman on board an English craft. Both mates, cook and all foremast hands were Americans, and was more difficult to cultivate the people's taste than the berries, as they grew and yielded wonderfully. mand more than trebled year after year, so I enlarged my acreage. I have sold over \$60 worth of strawberries from an acre in one day. were profitable for me. 
