Ordinance of the City of Graham. Ordinance No. 24.

An ordinance to provide for the levy and collection of an ad valorem tax for the year A. D. 1893.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Graham:

Sec. 1. There shall be levied on one and one-half (1-1/2) per cent of the cash value of all real property, in this city, for the year A. D. 1893, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the city government.

The city assessor shall, between the first day of July and the first day of August, proceed to take a list of taxable property, real, personal and mixed, in this city, and assess the value thereof in the following manner: To-wit: By calling upon the person, or by calling at the office, place of business or the residence of the person, and listing the property required by law, in the name and requiring the person to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed.

Sec. 3. Should any property be listed or assessed for taxation after the first day of August, or should the assessor fail to allot the requisite oath, or attest the same in the mode prescribed by law, or should the assessor fail to make a proper return of the value of all property in the name and requiring the person to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, the assessor shall nevertheless be a valid and binding list and assessment of all property in this city, and the assessor shall be held liable for the same.

Sec. 4. If any person who is required by this ordinance to list his property, or to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, shall fail to do so, or shall fail to make a true and correct statement of the value of his property, or shall fail to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, he shall be held liable for the same.

Sec. 5. In every case where any person whose duty it is to list any property for taxation, or to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, shall fail to do so, or shall fail to make a true and correct statement of the value of his property, or shall fail to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, he shall be held liable for the same.

Sec. 6. In all cases of failure to obtain a list of real and personal property from the assessor, or to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, or to make a true and correct statement of the value of his property, or to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed, the assessor shall be held liable for the same.

Sec. 7. The number and form of assessing property required for taxation shall be as prescribed in Art. 1710 Revised Statutes.

Sec. 8. The assessor shall, between the first day of July and the first day of August, proceed to take a list of taxable property, real, personal and mixed, in this city, and assess the value thereof in the following manner: To-wit: By calling upon the person, or by calling at the office, place of business or the residence of the person, and listing the property required by law, in the name and requiring the person to make a statement under the oath hereinafter prescribed.
