A Horrible Accusation.

The grand jury made their final report last Saturday afternoon, finding only two bills besides the one reported at the beginning of the term against Tom Walker for burglary. Both bills were for felonies, one for theft of cattle and the other for rape, charging one of the most horrible crimes ever prosecuted in Young county.

The defendant's name is Harry Shepard and the crime is charged to have been committed upon his own daughter, a young girl in her teens. Sheriff Williams took with him H. M. Ford and Tom Dixon last Saturday night and went out to arrest Shepard who lives on the Freeman place about eighteen miles southeast of Graham. Shepard was expecting arrest and was hid out in the cotton field, so after searching the house the sheriff and his posse stood guard and watched until daylight when their man rose up and started to carry his bedding to the house, but he caught sight of the sheriff and changing his course ran off across the field to a clump of bushes. Tom Dixon caught sight of him as he ran and calling the others gave chase and he was caught in the bushes. The sheriff found him lying flat on the ground and ordered him out, which order he readily obeyed. He claimed that he was evading arrest because he knew he could not give bond on Sunday.

He was brought to Graham and landed in jail, where on consultation with an attorney he made an application for a writ of habeas corpus which was forwarded to Judge Miller by Monday's mail.

Shepard is a white man about 40 years of age and a stone cutter by trade. He recently worked some on the stone street work at Graham and is said to be a hard worker. The bringing of this horrible accusation against him is a great surprise to the people who had no idea that anything so grave and so heinous a nature had occurred in the county. The people, however, are not excited about it, as is usual in such cases, but will give Shepard a fair and impartial trial. It is hard to see how a man could commit such a crime, but the court records of Texas and other states show that they do sometimes become base and inhuman enough to violate the chastity of their own flesh and blood, descending to the level of the lowest animal of the brute creation. It is thought that the Judge will return sometime next week and have the habeas corpus trial and decide on the evidence whether or not the defendant is entitled to bail.
