CONGRESSIONAL NEWS.

The Ways and Means Committee Want an Early Adjustment of Congress. WANT TIME TO PREPARE A TARIFF BILL.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—The leaders on the ways and means committee want an adjournment of congress just as soon as the silver matter now before that body is disposed of. The reasons for this desire are many. It will require three months, at the very least, for the committee to prepare a tariff bill on which the Democrats can unite and stand. They say that if they go to work while the members of congress are here, the members of the committee will have to be rung up every two or three hours during the day for their votes on the yeas and nays. Congressmen will insist on coming before the committee to plead for a non-reduction of the tariff on some article in which their constituents are interested, and besides they will be continually interfered with by the representatives of different interests who will be on hand and require their constant attention.

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ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Current Happenings of General Interest to the Reading Public. SERIOUS AND SENSATIONAL SORTINGS.

A Comprehensive Epitome of the Latest News Culled from the Leading Dailies of the Country for the Past Week. A suit has been begun at Washington by the Lovett distillers to stop the collector of internal revenue from refusing to receive applications for the export of whisky in bond. This is a test case by which the distillers hope to secure the postponement of "force days" on which they must pay \$50,000 in taxes to take the whisky crop of 1890-out of bond, or forfeit the whisky.

A decree by the governor of the state of Chihuahua, Mex., suspends for three years the operation of the law which prohibited bull fights in that state. The decree states that the empresarios will pay out of the receipts from 5 to 15 per cent. as the executive shall decide, to the school fund and 10 per cent to the municipal treasury of the place where the fights shall take place.

A large number of unemployed workmen in New York recently held a meeting preparatory to giving a parade. "Let us parade up Fifth avenue and show those rich people how hungry we are. They have money for luxuries. My wife and I have not had a morsel of food for three days," said one speaker.

Cyrus Brown, of Columbus, Ind., and his wife have not lived together for some six months, and a few days ago she brought suit for divorce and the custody of their two children. He filled up with liquor and went to the police station and got arrested on his wife dead. He made his escape.

At Williamsport, Pa., recently, the cable of an elevator broke, precipitating two young men from the third story to the basement, crushing in the skull of George Seiler, killing him instantly. The other young man, Joseph Jones, escaped with slight injury.

Twenty-three hundred employes of the Havermeyer sugar refinery in Williamsburg, N. Y., have been laid off. It is also said that the Havermeyer refinery in Commercial street, Greenpoint has shut down, throwing 3,000 more workmen out of employment.

It must require the gall of a lightning rod agent for a man at this stage of the game to attempt to convince the people that Cleveland is in accord with the national platform of the democratic party.

An Honest New York Newspaper. One newspaper has been found in the midst of money changers of the type of those which were cast out of the temple to tell the truth. The unerring intuition of millions of people in the United States who are not seeking, through government aid to oppress their neighbors, will affirm that this, said by the New York Recorder, is the truth:

"To the Shylock combination and its impudent cry of 'honest money' the Recorder says, without any parrying, that it has a lie on its lips. It is not honest money, but dishonest money, that it wants. It is not to strengthen, but to destroy business confidence and credit that it is clamoring for the gold standard. It is not to save, but to wreck this nation of 65,000,000 of people that it is trying to put through Congress the unconditional repeal of the present law without putting anything in its place. The success of the unconditional repeal bill would be the death-knell of prosperity in this country for long years to come. The claim that the people of the East favor it is false. Wall Street starts it. The wall is always in favor of prey, and the pirate naturally inclines to plunder. But the masses of the people, East as well as West, have a common interest to defeat the gold standard scheme which aims at the spoliation of the North, South, East and West alike."

If the people who are hoarding their money during the past few months would again deposit it in the banks, it would enable the banks to extend their accommodations to the manufacturer and the farmer, and give the laborers employment. Until such money, which is hid away in old stockings or buried in the cellars is returned to circulation, continued money stringency may be expected. — Lyons Advertiser.

M. Kinney Enquirer: We hear a great deal of talk about the Chicago platform but very little said about the repeal of the 10 per cent tax on state banks. This should not be overlooked. Men who think they know what they are talking about say the money of the country is deposited in the little country banks. If true it suits very well. Let Wall Street ship the remainder of its gold to Europe and invest it in that country. Congressmen and Wall Street is in his way in the house and has joined the Texas delegation in standing up for Texas. We are still several points above Australia in the financial scale, and gold is the only legal tender in Australia. On the Up Grade. The tide is turning, has already turned. Since the 1st of July \$33,000,000 of gold has been imported to this country from Europe and the greater part of it has gone into active circulation, but little being added to the bank reserves. Gold is coming in from Europe daily in million-dollar shipments. National banks have already called for an additional circulation of \$12,000,000 and are looking for bonds to secure more. Various proposals, looking to the increase of bank note circulation, are before congress, and there is good reason to believe that one of them will add at least \$50,000,000 to the circulating medium. One plan is being considered which would create a currency to represent the entire bonded indebtedness of the country, whether in the hands of banks or of private individuals or corporations. A free coinage law is among the probabilities, the beneficial effects of which would be felt in increased circulation from the St. Lawrence to the Gulf. No matter which side "wins" the silver fight the country will have more money. Upon that point there is unanimity of opinion. Even the money speculators of Wall Street have been driven by their necessities to clamor for it.

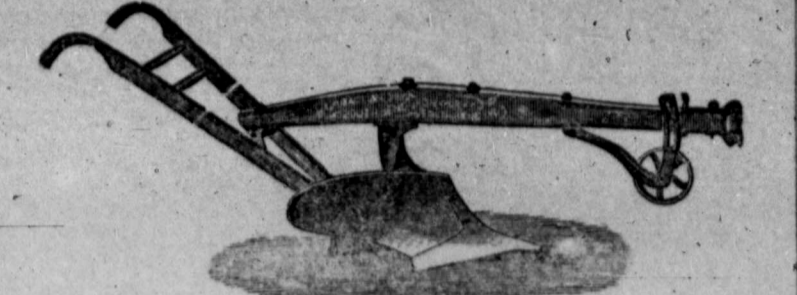
The hoarders have seen the cash of other people take the place of the money they so foolishly hid away from view, and are growing more and more restive as they jealously watch the reaping by strangers of the rich harvest made possible by their fear of ghosts. Already the safety deposit boxes are beginning to diverge, and that means a speedy revolution in financial affairs. No man cares to hoard money when nobody objects to his hoarding it. Unless a new mishap should occur, with the money already yielded to the circulation from abroad and with the money yet to be added by marking of crops and future legislation, the indications point almost with certainty to a glut of money in January or February, at the latest, that will pre-empt a striking contrast to the condition through which we have just been passing. Nor will that be an unusual result. Extremes produce extremes. The efforts to counteract the effect of withdrawal of hundreds of millions of dollars from circulation by excited small capitalists must necessarily bring a corresponding glut of money into the country. The business interests of the country have been compelled to protect themselves by importing gold, at any cost, to take the place of the currency which the hoarders have hidden. In other words, they have been paying the price without the money, thus selfishly and foolishly withdrawing from its natural channels. When trade interests shall have reached that position of absolute independence, as they surely will within a few weeks at the present rate of progress, they will object to the hoarding of gold, and will seek to take the place of the hoarders. Their fall may quickly prove to be a blessing in disguise. What energy and vigor has not been given to the country by the attention they have forced the country to give to the Sherman act, and in the long run, through reduced rates of interest, which may reasonably be anticipated as near at hand, they will have to pay the premium of it. They have also given the country an object lesson in the evils of a contracted currency which it will not soon forget, and brought public opinion to such a stage of aggression that congress no longer dares to refuse a measure for relief. — Fort Worth Gazette.
