





The Remarkable Price of \$4,200 Paid for an Antique Stradivarios A Stradivarius violin was sold the other day at Puttick & Simpson's, London, for £860, that being the highest price yet secured for a fiddle in the auction-room. This fact has caused some inquiry to be made in the rapid rise in the value of the violins of the great Company maker. It seems of the great Cremona maker. It seems that a fine "Strad" was sold in 1805 for £100, but by 1857, when the late James Goding's collection was brought to the hammer at Christie's, a Stradi-varius violin fetched £200, and a viola by the same maker £212.

In 1872 a "Strad," since rechristened by its fortunate owner "The Emperor," realized £290 at the sale of the collection of Mr. Gillott, the pen-maker, and it would probably now not be parted with for four times that amount. The auction price of a "Strad" has since reached £860, and it is quite possible that before the present century is over the sum will pass into four figures, while the price at the fiddle fancier's is already t
