





Wheat yields on most lands. can be increased eight or ten bushels per acre by a dressing of mineral manure costing only two or three dollars per acre. The increased grain and straw more than pays the cost, besides the benefit that the clover crop receives. Often an extra half ton of the best clover hay may be cut on land that has been phos phated. In spring, too, when the harrowing is done, a very light dressing of nitrate of soda will pay well, both for the wheat and the clover, especially if it has not been possible to top dress with barnyard manure.


