

Head-End Collision Occurs on the Grand Trus at Battle Creek, Mich.

BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Oct. 21. The error of one human being, a man who crouched affrighted like a hunted animal in a prison cell last night, led to the greatest railroad holocaust in the history of Michigan yesterday, and twenty-six human lives have paid the penalty of a moment's negligence. Two trains, both laden with passengers, met in a direct head-end collisthe suburbs of the city instead of the open country, where similar attempt. both trains would have been running at full speed. As it is, twenty-six charred. disfigured, unrecognizable bodies lie in the morgue. Twentythe bandits themselves are groan in agony in the charity hosdisaster.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Oct. 16 .- The eldest inhabitant admits that the terriffic outburst of wind and wave that has swept through the city surpassed any storm in his day. Wednesday night was stormy but the furious gale that followed Thursday was the highest ever known, being sixteen inches above the high water mark of 1853. The waves dashed with tremendous proe against the warehouses and the ides of vessels, and the tide came in ith a mighty force and bore a large nantity of wreckage. The high war did cunsiderable damage along the harves. The flood swept through he lower floors of the warehouses. everal wharves were washed away. amaged. At Cleveland, O. the storm was furious, but no great damage was done. At New York the legraph lines suffered most, the wind reaching a velecity of seventyfive miles an hour at Long Branch and Aubery Park. The damage is considerable at Jersey City, N. Just as he was about to faint again from weakness an awfully pretty girl came up and spied him. She was Miss Taylor of Jefferson, Tex., who escaped injury in the wreck. She realized that the young man would bleed to death if he was not attended to. Without a moment's hesitation she took her pettioat and tearing out a strip bo tight on Kaufman's head. The bleeding was checked and his life was saved. To say that he feels deeply grateful to the fair young Texan uld be drawing it very mindly and he vows he will keep the bandage as long as he lives.
