The Waco Day-Globe calls for more private corporations: "Texas imposes what is known as a 'franchise tax' on corporations that do business in Texas, either as residents, chartered under Tex. as laws, or domiciled elsewhere. This tax is due not later than May 1 annually, payable to the secretary of State. Up to the close of last week about \$5000 had been received. It is stated there are over 6000 corporations that do business in Texas, a majority of them operating under state charters. The figures must impress one with the remarkable, steady development of the corporation as a factor of business and all kinds of enterprise even in a state not over friendly to corporations, either. It would be impossible to compute how much benefit these corporations have been to the state, but any thoughtful unbiased man will concede that to their operation is due a vast measure of progress and prosperous development. There is not a city or important town in Texas that has not been virtually built up by corporate effort and enterprise. By no other means could capital, even though plentiful and willing, have been yielded as a developing agency so efficiently as through the corporation. Lacking soul, according to popular repute, the corporation has, no doubt, committed its quota of sins, but it has rendered compensation. It is now an essential principle or feature of organized society—the agent alike of trade, capital, industry, literature, art, morals, even of law. Six thousand corporations are worth something to Texas, for taxation alone. As agents of progress and development their value is hardly to be computed. Certainly it far outweighs possible deleterious influences or tendencies.
