



There is no ques tion about real hog cholera being infectious, and that it may be easily and unsuspectingly transmitted, as in this case. The moral of this is: Allow no stranger to visit the pens of healthy hogs; or still better, do not let him come on the place unless he can give ample assurance that he could not by any possibility have been in contact with cholera hogs. Hogs must be protected from this contagion as the members of the family would be protected from smallpox. 
