The conclusions reached are directly opposite to those of the report of the court of inquiry submitted to congress The synopsis is as follows;

The report contains declarations made by ocular witnesses and experts. From these statements it clearly de. duces and proves the absence of all those attendant circumstances which are invariably present on the occasion of the explosion of a torpedo.

The evidence of witnesses comparatively close to the Maine at the time say no column of water was thrown into the air, that no shock to the side of the nearest vessel was feld, nor on land was any vibration noticed, and that no dead fish were found. The evidence of the senior pilct of the harbor states that there is abundance of fish in the harbor, and this is corroborated by witnesses. The assist ant engineer of works states that after explosions made during the execution of works in the harbor he had always found dead fish. The divers were unable to examine the bottom of the Maine, which was buried in the mud, but a careful examination of the sides of the vessel, the rents and breaks in which all point outward, shows without doubt that the explosion was from the inside.
